Short-term movements in oil prices don't usually affect the offshore industry dramatically for a while, but if there is three to six more months of prolonged low prices, there could be an impact.

Because of the low oil and gas prices, the revenue projections for the state of Louisiana went down by hundreds of millions of dollars. This will mean mid-year budget cuts which the Governor is working on now, and Legislatures will take a look at that later this month. BP may be fined over 13 million dollars due to the Clean Water Act, but BP claims that their parent company may not step in to help pay the fines because of low oil prices. This may mean a lesser fine, with Louisiana getting less money from the Clean Water Act penalties. The state budget shortfall for next year is estimated to be 1.6 billion dollars. Some of this is due to the low price of oil, but much of the deficit is due to a structural problem, including state tax incentives that may not be helping Louisiana. There will be some very serious budget cuts in the upcoming future.

Explores how the British misjudged their opponent and miscalculated the complexities of the battle ground. The American triumph over the British built a sense of national pride and confidence for the young nation. The documentary brings together historians who recount the events of the British campaign along the Gulf of Mexico and south Louisiana as well as the impact of the outcome of the battle. Life in the city and areas south along the Mississippi River and Lake Borgne is also described. Interviews were conducted on-site at locations in existence during the time of the Battle of New Orleans including The Pitot House on Bayou St. John, Mary Plantation in Plaquemines Parish, Madame John's Legacy and the Old Ursulines Convent, both in the New Orleans French Quarter and the Sun Oak Museum and Guest House in the Faubourg Marigny. The Historic New Orleans Collection Williams Research Center, built in 1915, also provides an interview setting. Additional on-site taping was done at The Meraux Foundation's 'Docville' in St. Bernard Parish, just a few miles down river from the January 8th British assault.

A second generation of Italian Americans begins to enter the labor movement, politics, sports and entertainment. Fiorello LaGuardia becomes mayor of New York City. Joe DiMaggio, the son of a San Francisco fisherman, becomes a baseball powerhouse who becomes an American hero. But with the outbreak of World War II, loyalty to America is questioned and Italians are forced to choose between two nations at war. While many Italian Americans fight on the frontlines with valor and bravery, other Italian Americans are labeled "Enemy Aliens," including DiMaggio's parents. The war proves to be a turning point for Italian Americans as they begin to break out of their enclaves.

In post-war America, Italian Americans enter the middle class. Italian-American crooners define American cool, but even as Frank Sinatra skyrockets to fame, he is haunted by accusations of Mafia ties. Can Italian Americans fit into 1950s America or will the specter of organized crime always plague them? Governor Mario Cuomo, son of Italian immigrants, struggles to straddle both worlds, while his sons' success promises assimilation and acceptance. Antonin Scalia becomes the first Italian American appointed to the U.S. Supreme Court and Congresswoman Nancy Pelosi is the first woman and Italian American elected to Speaker of the House. Have Italian Americans finally shed the old stereotypes and become fully accepted in America?
