The sheriff of Orleans parish says he doesn't want to be in charge of electronic monitoring anymore. Marlin Gusman has been trying to back out of that program for a while even though it's been paid for by the city, proven effective, and practiced around the country. It's also a much cheaper alternative to locking someone up. New Orleans can't seem to get it straight. Gusman's claim is that the city has not paid over the last several months. The city says that Gusman refuses to sign the contract/agreement. If he doesn't agree to sign, there will be no electronic monitoring after October 1st. There are 55 inmates who are wearing the ankle bracelets, half of these are juveniles. No one knows what will happen to those inmates. Will those 30 juveniles be locked up because there are no more ankle bracelet program. The city is trying to work out a solution. There are some private companies that do electronic monitoring.

Paula Pendarvis, Marcia Kavanaugh and Tom Gregory just completed the half-hour special, AMERICAN GRADUATE: LOUISIANA OPPORTUNITIES, which took a look at a broad sampling of what has taken place in public education since Katrina and premiered last night. In the 2005 school year, only 35% of Orleans Parish students were proficient on their test scores. In 2014, proficiency was up to 62%. The gap between Orleans Parish and the rest of the state has gone from 23 points behind to now only 6 points. Proficiency among African-American students went from 32% to 59% and is now higher than the state average. The special repeats four more times; dates and times are given.
