911. There are a lot of problems that affect the response time such as false alarms and taking people off the streets for unnecessary reasons. But there have been documented cases where in a life and death situation, police response time was terrible because of the back logs and other problems. The police department is coming up with new strategies to counter this problem such as "hot cars" which respond quickly at first and then allow other units to come in and take reports later, downgrading codes if a situation is not threatening to prioritize calls, and staggered shift changes so that there isn't a lack of response during shift change times. Response time seems to have improved since these measures have been in place.
