Among those officers being transferred are quality of life officers and the community coordinating officers who have meetings with community groups and more. Part of the initiative also includes hiring back officers who left in good standing as part time officers to patrol the streets. This new imitative will start after Mardi Gras.

Jeff Adelson is on the show to discuss police response time in Orleans parish. It was reported months ago, that response time averaged over an hour for police responses to overall 911 calls. This week the police chief held a conference, and he had more encouraging numbers. He announced that since October 2015, *emergency* 911 calls went from about 20 minutes to about 11 minutes. It is an improvement, but it could still get better. The department has been making changes to lessen response time such as moving non-emergency calls to a phone-in system where people can take down reports over the phone which frees up officers on the ground. The NOPD also reassigned a number of non-patrol officers to patrolling duties and so on. Hopefully response time continues to decrease.
