Kathy Finn is a guest on Informed Sources discussing the flooding impact on businesses in Baton Rouge. There will be a very large impact on the housing market at large, and FEMA has called this situation a housing crisis. An estimation of 140,000 homes have been damaged in some way. The rental market will also be affected in New Orleans and the surrounding areas. Rental occupancy is high, and there isn't much availability. There aren't nearly enough in the area to handle the influx right now. Rent was already high even before the flood, and it will probably increase. There will also probably be a labor shortage in Baton Rouge for rebuilding houses. 12,000 businesses are estimated to be out of business as well, which means employees don't have jobs, fueling questions of how will these people get the money to repair their houses.

Errol Laborde appears on Informed Sources to discuss women in Louisiana Politics, which has been a mixed bag of success. New Orleans City Council used to have a 6 to 1 majority on the council, now it's 4 to 3. It has to do with term limitations and other circumstances, but it could easily go back to a 6 to 1 majority at one point. There's never been a female mayor of New Orleans, but it may be because there's never been a very strong democratic female candidate. If you had the right person at the right time, you may see a woman get elected to mayor of New Orleans one day. There have been two women in Congress, and in both cases they succeeded a deceased husband which isn't uncommon. Lindy Boggs was one of them, and she became a major player in Congress and made a lot of changes. Women have been fairly successful in Orleans parish politics, but overall in women in Louisiana politics, other than Orleans City Council, are not faring well politically in terms of running for office. Louisiana has one of the lowest percentages of women in the Legislature.

Richard Thompson is on the show to discuss the University of New Orleans' recovery plan for declining enrollment. UNO delivered news this week that the fall enrollment is down for the seventh consecutive year. It's down five percent compared to last year. UNO's new president sees reasons for optimism; there has been an increase in number of new students and transfers. But even with those slight gains, there was still an overall drop in numbers for school enrollment. The president wants to develop a system that will focus on identifying difficulties that a student might be having and assisting those students. He also wants to improve marketing and branding the university. He wants to rebrand UNO to draw in students that live elsewhere, maybe in colder climates or on the west coast who are drawn to the prospect of living in New Orleans.
