Attached are listings of broadcasts or broadcast segments that, in the Station's judgment, reflect the Station's most significant programming treatment of ascertained issues during the preceding three-month period. The Station produced and broadcast a "Community Calendar" and public service announcements promoting local community events and campaigns. All of these programs are part of Station's plan to address issues of concern to our viewers.

FOCUS ON SOUTH FLORIDA – A half-hour weekly public affairs broadcast featuring panel discussions and interviews with community leaders, focusing on important issues of local concern. Broadcast dates and times as indicated in the report.

4 SUNDAY MORNING – A half-hour weekly public affairs broadcast featuring panel discussions and interviews with community leaders, focusing on important issues of local concern. Broadcast dates and times as indicated in the report.

GOVERNMENT/INTERNATIONAL AFFAIRS: Topics in this category included: Miami Beach mayoral candidates, anti-gay remarks, the National Hurricane Center, mandatory minimum laws, disaster relief, policing the police, the war in Iraq, war protests, recycling, police corruption, property tax reform, city redevelopment, Manuel Noriega, Broward mayor's controversial comments, immigration, university budget cuts, and PIP.

FOCUS ON SOUTH FLORIDA: 07/15, 1 PM. Miami Beach Mayoral Candidate Bill Smatt discussed his reasoning for putting up an anti-gay banner in front of his personal home. In another segment, Miami Beach Commissioner Michael Gongora discussed the legal issues involved with Smatt's anti-gay banner and told viewers why Smatt was forced to take it down. In another segment, Commentator Jim DeFede discussed the dismissal of National Hurricane Center Director Bill Proenza. 08/26, 1 PM. Former Prosecutor Katie Phang discussed mandatory minimum laws and a man sentenced to 25 years in prison for carrying his own prescription pain killers. In another segment, a local Haganah instructor discussed his training of the Coast Guard and helping protect them against potential terrorists. In another segment, Teo Babun of the Americas Relief Team discussed how you can make sure your donations are getting to the right hands when helping support relief after a natural disaster strikes in the U.S. and around the world. In another segment, self-proclaimed video vigilante Jimmy Justice discussed his policing of the police in New York City. 09/09, 1 PM. Sam Feldman of Veterans for Peace discussed the War in Iraq and about a march in the nation's capital to protest the war. In another segment, Miami Beach Commissioner Michael Gongora discussed his recycling initiatives for the city of Miami Beach and warns viewers that not recycling might be against the law in certain cities. In another segment, CBS4 reporter Gary Nelson and Commentator Jim DeFede discussed the case of two top cops caught in the act: Miami Chief of Police John Timoney and Broward Sheriff Ken Jenne. 4 SUNDAY MORNING: 07/01, 11 AM. Florida House Speaker Marco Rubio discussed property tax reform and what it could mean to homeowners. In another segment, Miami-Dade County Manager George Burgess discussed the County's budget cuts. 07/08, 11 AM. Neisen Kasdin of the Downtown Redevelopment Committee of the Miami Chamber of Commerce discussed plans to redevelop the Flagler Street business district. 07/29, 11 AM. Former U.S. Attorney Guy Lewis and Defense Attorney Frank Rubino discussed Manuel Noriega's legal future as the government attempted to extradite the former Panamanian dictator to France. In another segment, Broward County Commissioner Stacy Ritter and Nate Klarfeld of the Stonewall Library and Archives discussed Broward Mayor Jim Naugle's controversial comments about the gay community. 08/05, 11 AM. David Caulkett of the Floridians for Immigration Enforcement and Teacher Eric Krause discussed the debate over deporting the children of undocumented immigrants. In another segment, CBS News Correspondent Kelly Cobiella discussed life in Cuba one year after Fidel Castro turned over power. 08/12, 11 AM. Miami-Dade County Mayor Carlos Alvarez discussed the budget choices facing Miami-Dade County as a result of property tax rollbacks. 08/19, 11 AM.
