Nearly all cases of cervical cancer are caused by persistent infection with high-risk types of human papillomavirus (HPV). Cervical cancer screenings can help detect abnormal (changed) cells early, before they turn into cancer. There are two types of screenings: The Pap test (or Pap smear) is a procedure used to collect cells from that cervix to find precancers cells. The human papillomavirus (HPV) test looks for the virus that causes cervical cancer. The American Cancer Society (ACS) estimates about 13,960 new cases of invasive cervical cancer will be diagnosed in 2024 and 4,310 women will die</p>

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			from the disease. Yet cervical cancer is one of the most preventable cancers

According to the American Thyroid Association , 1 in 10 people suffer from a thyroid disorder. They also found that at least 1 in 8 women will develop a thyroid disorder during her lifetime. More than half of the people in America that suffer from a thyroid disorder are undiagnosed. The thyroid gland is a butterfly-shaped endocrine gland located in the lower front of the neck. The role of the thyroid is to make thyroid hormones and these hormones are secreted into the blood stream. The Thyroid controls the body's metabolism, increases heart rate and affects how fast things move through the body such as food, bone loss and sugar.

This puts them at risk for heart disease, stroke, kidney failure, dementia and more. High blood pressure is a major risk factor for heart disease. It is a medical condition that happens when the pressure of the blood in your arteries and other blood vessels is too high. The high pressure , if not controlled,

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			<p>can affect your heart and other major organs of your body, including the kidneys and brain. High blood pressure is often called a “silent killer” because it usually has no symptoms. The only way to know whether you have high blood pressure is to measure your blood pressure. You can lower your blood pressure with lifestyle changes or with medicine to reduce your risk for heart disease and stroke.</p>

In most cases heart disease is preventable when people adopt a healthy lifestyle, which includes not smoking, maintaining a healthy weight, controlling blood sugar and cholesterol, treating high blood pressure, getting moderate physical activity a week and getting regular checkups.</p>

Several studies have also shown that people who exercise regularly are less likely to suffer a sudden heart attack or other life-threatening cardiac event. While exercise has benefits in and of itself, the best way to prevent heart disease is to combine exercise with a healthy diet. Exercise alone can help with weight loss over a long period of time. But a short-term approach is to reduce the number of calories you take in through diet, while increasing the calories you use through exercise.

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			<p>When you make coffee, the filter keeps the coffee grains inside, but allows water to pass through. The two main risk factors for kidney disease include: diabetes and high blood pressure; or if there is a family history of kidney failure. Of the 26 million American adults estimated to have kidney disease, most don't know they have it. That's why taking care of your kidneys, especially if you are at risk for kidney disease, is vital</p>

The cells travel with iron and hemoglobin, which is a protein that helps carry oxygen through the bloodstream to your organs all through the body. When someone develops anemia, they are said to be "anemic. According to the National Heart, Lung, and Blood Institute, Anemia is the most common blood disorder, affecting more than 3 million Americans with women, seniors, African Americans, and Hispanic Americans more likely to have anemia or be anemic. Several signs and symptoms occur in all types of anemia, such as fatigue, shortness of breath and feeling cold.</p>

Most colorectal cancers develop slowly over several years. Risk Factors for colon cancer are: Age – More than 90 percent of colorectal cancer cases occur in people who are 50 years or older. Personal history of an inflammatory bowel disease such as Chron’s or ulcerative colitis increases your risk of colorectal cancer. Family history of colorectal cancer or colorectal polyps. Colorectal cancer is the third most common cancer type worldwide; last year, almost 2 million cases were diagnosed. It is the second most common cause of cancer death, leading to almost 1 million deaths per year. African Americans are about 20% more likely to get colorectal cancer and about 40% more likely to die from it than most other groups.</p>

Glaucoma is a common age-related eye problem that affects an estimated three million Americans. It is the second leading cause of blindness after cataracts. More serious Glaucoma is a group of eye conditions that damage the optic nerve, the health of which is vital for good vision. This damage is often caused by an abnormally high pressure in your eye. Glaucoma is one of the leading causes of blindness for people over the age of 60. It can occur at any age but is more common in older adults</p>
