

The following is a summary of Issues/Programs as presented on WBYA, Islesboro, ME

From May 8-May 26<sup>th</sup>, this station embarked on the Operation Help Our Heroes campaign to raise awareness for and benefit House in the Woods, a non-profit organization based in Maine that offers rest, respite and outdoor opportunities such as hunting, fishing, canoeing and hiking. The mental health of those that served, often in combat roles, is a serious issue, with the oft-cited statistic that 22 veterans commit suicide every day in the United States. House in the Woods gives veterans, active duty military and Gold Star families an opportunity to connect and be in nature, converse, and heal. Feedback from some participants say it was life-affirming and sometimes, life-saving. Every weekday morning featured a testimonial story from a veteran or House in the Woods participant on the impact the experience had for them.
