Section I. Issues.

The station has identified the following issues as significant issues facing our community this quarter:

- A. Environment & Science:** Dothan Area Botanical Gardens; Animals who paint; Zoos' role in a community; Hummingbird research; Science and Conservation Center's zoo and wild animal population control research and methods; Black Bears in Alabama; Preserving Alabama's Coosa River; Autauga Creek National Recreational Trail; Alfred Russel Wallace's Research in independently developing a Theory of Evolution; Hurricane Katrina Tenth Anniversary; Recovering from Natural Disasters; Using Theater to interpret the Hurricane Katrina experience; Coyotes in Alabama.
- B. Societal & Health Issues:** Human Trafficking; NATO's Partnership for Peace Initiative between the US National Guard and other countries; Expressing Grief through Art; the Storytelling tradition of the South; Native American Art; Discovery of Harper Lee's *Go Set a Watchman* manuscript and launch of the book; Consumer Education; Personal Debt and Bankruptcy; Student Debt; Cuba and a history of Prostitution; Payday Loans; Coming to America from Argentina during the Civil Rights era; Federal Reserve; Banned Books Week.
- C. Historical Issues:** How Andrew Jackson and Cherokee Chief John Ross shaped the South; American Fighter Aces receive Congressional Gold Medal; Pictograph Cave Native American Art; Artistic Civil Rights Legacy of Mose Tolliver and friends; William Levi Dawson's African-American musical legacy; Dothan Opera House; History of Radio in Alabama; History of Barbecue in Alabama; Mobile River and Native American prisoners; *Tuskegee Rising* play.

Section II: Responsive Programs.

The station has broadcast programming on each of the above-referenced issues. Programming on *In Focus*, with host Carolyn Hutcheson, dealt with the issues in nine and five-minute time frames, beginning at 12:08 p.m. Central time, weekdays.

A. Environmental Issues:

-Broadcast on July 8:

An on-location visit to Dothan Area Botanical Gardens with guests Paul Angelof, vice-president of the nonprofit gardens, and Devon Ellis and Cheryl Hatcher, Wiregrass Master Gardeners, who serve as “plant parents” who help maintain the gardens. A tour by the group highlighted the importance of plants in the environment.

-Broadcast on July 16:

An on-location visit to the Montgomery Zoo with guest Ken Naugher, conservation and enrichment manager, about zoo animals who paint, as part of their mentally stimulating enrichment activities. Tina the elephant was painting.

-Broadcast on July 20:

An on-location visit to Zoo Montana in Billings with guest Jeff Ewelt, executive director, who brought the city zoo back from the brink of insolvency with his emphasis on educating the public about North America’s wild animals and their role in the ecosystem.

-Broadcast on July 21:

A discussion by phone with guest Fred Bassett, master bird bander and researcher, about his findings on hummingbirds in the Western US this summer. He has been studying their nesting patterns and has located a number of previously banded hummingbirds.

-Broadcast on July 22:

An on-location visit in Billings, Montana, with guest Kim Frank, coordinator of the Science and Conservation Center, about their animal population control work worldwide. Kim cited the center’s population control methods that are used by zoos and wild horse herds, as examples.

-Broadcast on July 23:

A discussion with guest Thomas Harms, Mobile Tensaw Delta area biologist and large carnivore coordinator for the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, about the increasing numbers of black bears in Alabama and how the public can coexist.

-Broadcast on July 30:

An on-location visit adjacent to the Coosa River north of Wetumpka with guest Lonnie Carden, about his fight since the 1970s to preserve the ecological health of the endangered river for recreational use and the benefit to communities through which it flows. Carden is a local businessman, canoeing and kayaking instructor, and longtime river advocate.

-Broadcast on August 6:

An on-location visit on the banks of historic Autauga Creek in Prattville, AL, with guest JoAnn Johnson, outgoing president of the Autauga Creek Improvement Committee, about the community effort it took to preserve the creek for families to enjoy. Recently the creek was designated a National Recreational Trail and was the site of the River Kids Alabama 4-H educational programs to teach children kayak safety and paddling skills.

-Broadcast on August 15:

A discussion by phone with guest Dan Sutter, Troy University professor in the Manuel H. Johnson Center for Political Economy, about his research on the economic impact and subsequent recovery efforts from Hurricane Katrina in the past ten years. Sutter has had a lifelong interest in natural disasters.

-Broadcast on August 18:

A discussion by telephone from British Columbia with guest Avi Sirlin, author of *The Evolutionist, The Strange Tale of Alfred Russel Wallace*, about the British naturalist, who independently arrived at the theory of evolution and was given credit jointly with Charles Darwin. Wallace's most noteworthy fieldwork took place in the Malay Archipelago.

-Broadcast on August 26:

A discussion by phone with guest Kathleen Koch, award-winning reporter who covered Hurricane Katrina for CNN and is a Mississippi Gulf Coast native, about how coastal communities have managed their recovery efforts after the giant storm. Koch harnessed what she learned about disaster recovery and founded the nonprofit Leaders Link organization that connects mayors and public officials of communities hit by natural disasters, to share methods that work.

-Broadcast on August 27:

A discussion by phone with guests - playwrights Michael Marks and Mackenzie Westmoreland, who collaborated on *The Katrina Project: Hell and High Water*, based on interviews done by Marks' high school theater students in Mississippi. The play had its premiere in Hattiesburg, which was the southernmost delivery point for relief supplies for Katrina victims. Ten years after Hurricane Katrina, the play has been widely presented, with proceeds going to a disaster relief fund.

-Broadcast on September 23:

A discussion with guest Thomas Harms, Mobile Tensaw Delta area biologist and large carnivore coordinator for the Alabama Department of Conservation and Natural Resources, about the proliferation of coyotes in Alabama. Historically the coyotes came from Latin America and spread through the US. Harms talked about the differences between eastern and western coyotes, their habits, and how humans have learned to coexist with them.

B. Societal & Health Issues:

-Broadcast on July 1:

A discussion with guest Kym Klass, Montgomery Advertiser reporter, about human trafficking in the South, following her recent investigative report for the newspaper.

-Broadcast on July 6:

A discussion in Big Timber, Montana, with guest General John Prendergast, Adjutant General of the Montana National Guard, about President Bill Clinton's Partnership for Peace Initiative, implemented by NATO. In the early 90s, General Prendergast represented the US in Kyrgyzstan, as his National Guard members carried out projects for peace in that country.

-Broadcast on July 7:

An on-location discussion at the Troy Johnson Center for the Arts with guests Diane Orlofsky, Troy University professor of English and director of university choirs, and artists Jerry Johnson and Pam Allen of the Troy University Department of Art, about the concept of expressing grief through art. Each guest had lost loved ones, and Orlofsky and Johnson collaborated on the use of meditative verse with visual representation to depict grief. Allen's art depicted the journey of grief.

-Broadcast on July 7:

A discussion by phone from Alexander City with guest Catherine Burns about the storytelling tradition of the South. An Alabama native, Burns believes that storytelling is part of the Southern identity. She is artistic director of The Moth, a podcast and radio program that features stories told by people across the US.

-Broadcast on July 9:

An on-location visit to the Yellowstone Art Museum in Billings, Montana, with guest Robin Peterson, executive director, about several Native American artists who reflect tribal history in their contemporary artwork.

-Broadcast on July 13:

A discussion with guest Lee Sentell, director of the Alabama Tourism Department, about the discovery of the Harper Lee manuscript for *Go Set a Watchman*. He talked about the significance of the book and previewed the launch, which will take place in Lee's hometown of Monroeville, AL.

-Broadcast on July 20:

A discussion with guest David Smitherman, president and CEO of the Better Business Bureau of South Alabama, about precautions to use when staying at a hotel, to avoid becoming a victim of scams.

-Broadcast on August 12:

A discussion with guest Shay Farley, legal director for the nonprofit Alabama Appleseed Center for Law and Justice, about personal debt and bankruptcy and how Appleseed worked with the state legislature to bring debt relief to consumers who have been cheated by financial companies.

-Broadcast on August 17:

A discussion with guest Emma Cole, CPA and lecturer in the School of Accounting at Troy University, about ways to finance college. Cole's son is starting college, and she talked about how they made plans while he was in high school to tackle college costs, to prevent the accumulation of student debt.

-Broadcast on September 1:

A discussion with guest Tiffany Sippial, associate professor of history at Auburn University and researcher who has been traveling to Cuba for the past twenty years, about the history of prostitution in that country. She is author of *Prostitution, Modernity, and the Making of the Cuban Republic 1840-1920*. Sippial is a lecturer this month at Troy University for National Hispanic Heritage Month.

-Broadcast on September 3:

A discussion with guest Shay Farley, legal director for the nonprofit Alabama Appleseed Center for Law and Justice, about payday loans and predatory lenders. The loans can have triple-digit interest rates and sink consumers deeper in debt. The center is working to educate the public about payday loans and trying to effect a change in laws and regulations of the industry.

-Broadcast on September 8:

A discussion with guest Lila Quintero Weaver, who came to America from Argentina as a child with her educator father and artist mother and settled in Marion Alabama. She described being puzzled at the treatment of African-American citizens, since Perry County was a key location in the Civil Rights Movement. Weaver used her artistic talent to illustrate her book, *Darkroom: Memoir in Black and White*. She is a lecturer at Troy University during National

Hispanic Heritage Month.

-Broadcast on September 17:

A discussion with guest James Nathan, executive director of the Alabama World Affairs Council, about the September visit to AWAC by Atlanta Federal Reserve Bank president Dennis Lockhart, who is on the Fed's Open Market Committee, which sets interest rates. Nathan talked about the suspense surrounding the question of whether the Fed will raise interest rates, so Lockhart will be in a position to comment on the Fed's action when he addresses the council and those in attendance.

-Broadcast on September 30:

A discussion with guests Sara Kosiba, professor of English at Troy University, and by phone with her husband, Robert Trogdon, professor and chair of the English department at Kent State University, about the banned works of Ernest Hemingway and his contemporary John Herrman. The guests talked about the cultural standards of the early 20th century compared with today. Kosiba wrote the introduction to the newly published book by Herrman, *What Happens*, and Trogdon was an editor of the newly published *Letters of Ernest Hemingway, Volume 3*. This week is observed as Banned Books week.

C. Historical Issues:

-Broadcast on July 2:

A discussion by phone with guest Steve Inskeep, author of the book, *Jacksonland: President Andrew Jackson, Cherokee Chief John Ross, and A Great American Land Grab*. Inskeep traveled the South, delving into the historical incidents between the leader of American military forces in the early 19th century and his Cherokee counterpart, Chief John Ross. Those incidents shaped the South of today.

Broadcast on July 27:

A discussion with guest Lt. General Charles Cleveland (US Air Force ret.), President of the American Fighter Aces Association, about the awarding of the Congressional Gold Medal to the Fighter Aces in Washington, D.C. General Cleveland described the medal, gave an overview of the ceremony, and recounted a brief history of the Fighter Aces in several wars.

-Broadcast on August 4:

An on-location visit to Pictograph Cave in eastern Montana and discussion with guest Jarret Kostraba, naturalist and park manager, about the cave's unique Native American art, from both prehistoric and historic times, and the significance of the cave area to a north-south trading path and spiritual and cultural center.

-Broadcast on August 5

An on-location visit at the Troy University Rosa Parks Museum Exhibit Gallery in Montgomery with guest Felecia Bell, museum director, about the exhibit, *Mose T and Friends: Artistic Reflections of Civil Rights*. Bell pointed out that the artists, several of whom were self-taught, like Mose Tolliver, incorporated the Civil Rights experience into their art.

-Broadcast on August 11:

A discussion with guest Wayne Barr, director of choral activities at Tuskegee University, about the musical influence and legacy of composer William Levi Dawson, who taught music at Tuskegee University. Dawson preserved the “folk songs” of African-Americans in the immediate area of Tuskegee by incorporating them into his compositions, which received worldwide acclaim. The Tuskegee Golden Voices Choir regularly performs Dawson’s music.

-Broadcast on August 12:

An on-location visit to the Dothan Opera House and discussion with guest Shannon Johnston, stage manager of the Dothan Opera House, which is part of the city’s Performing Arts Department, about the Victorian architecture and the unusual history of the facility. The century-old opera house was built as Dothan’s City Hall, with the stage and auditorium on first floor and city offices on second floor. The mayor had a mural painted on the curtain, depicting himself, along with notable aspects of the town and its south Alabama setting.

-Broadcast on August 20:

On National Radio Day, a discussion by phone with two guests – Sharon Tinsley, president of the Alabama Broadcasters Association, and Harry Butler, east Alabama broadcaster and radio historian, about the advent of radio in Alabama, the role of Auburn University and Alabama Power Company in establishing radio stations, and the importance of radio today. Butler wrote *A History of Broadcasting in Alabama*.

-Broadcast on September 10:

A discussion by phone with guest Norton Dill, documentary filmmaker, about his film for public television, *Q:Alabama Barbecue Legends*. Dill traveled the state, interviewing proprietors of barbecue joints to learn about their differing styles and traditions of barbecue. He shared stories of notable characters he met.

-Broadcast on September 15:

A discussion by phone with guest John Sledge, author of the book, *The Mobile River*, about an incident in 1887, when Apache prisoners of war were transferred from a Florida prison to Mount Vernon, Alabama. The entourage included women and children and history’s most famous Apache Indian, Geronimo. Sledge talked about the experiences of the Native Americans while there.

-Broadcast on September 23:

A discussion with guest Dyann Robinson, creator of the play, *Tuskegee Rising*, about the travails of this African American community, which has survived like a “phoenix rising” in the face of adversity. Actress Robinson is founder and director of the Tuskegee Repertory Theater, and her play will be presented on Sept. 26.
