- a. Health Tip From 88.1 the 'Burg: Avoiding attending off-campus campus parties to prevent the spread of Coronavirus and keeping yourself, as well as others, safe. (20 Seconds)
  - b. Health Reminder from 88.1 the 'Burg: 4 Ways to stop the spread of COVID-19. These methods include, sanitizing of surfaces, handwashing, 6 feet of distance between yourself and others, and wearing facemasks when in public. (20 Seconds)
  - c. Friendly Advice from 88.1 the 'Burg: Student counseling services are available for those struggling during the pandemic. Telecom meetings will be available to set up for those seeking help. (40 Seconds)
  - d. Quick Health reminder from 88.1 the 'Burg: There are changes on campus to avoid the spread of COVID-19. Some of these precautions are sanitizer outside of classes for those that have to attend in-person, as well as Plexiglas shields in common areas. (22 Seconds)
