This one-of-a-kind program features the most breathtaking and spectacular sights in Arkansas. There's extreme adventure like hang gliding, kayaking, rappelling, rock climbing, wild caving and not to mention some of Arkansas's best kept secrets such as secluded and scenic waterfalls.

Chuck has been exploring Arkansas for more than 40 years and continues to surprise and entertain viewers with his sights and subjects. His philosophy throughout the years has always been to illuminate the culture and heritage of Arkansas, in addition to conservation and preservation of the pristine outdoors of the Natural State. Exploring Arkansas was the 2009 recipient of the Sierra Club Conservation Award. Chuck says he's always trying to promote our great state in any way, shape, or form that he can.

Homegrown

Arkansas PBS launched its original series "Homegrown" celebrating the people, places and stories of Arkansas, Thursday, Sept. 28, at 7 p.m. and livestreaming at myarpbs.org/live.

"Homegrown" is a tribute to the essence of Arkansas – an exploration of remarkable individuals, their narratives, and the rich heritage they contribute to their communities. Hosted by Dawn Scott, the series will take audiences on a journey through the lives of difference makers, innovators, families, and rural communities, delving into the diverse tapestry of life in The Natural State.

Each episode of "Homegrown" will spotlight a unique theme, interweaving stories previously showcased through various Arkansas PBS productions. By adding fresh insights and perspectives, Scott will breathe new life into these segments, giving them a broader platform and reaching a wider audience.

Indians, Outlaws, Marshals, and the Hangin' Judge

Airdate: November 29, 2023

Airtime: 7:00 p.m. Program Length: 60 minutes

"Indians, Outlaws, Marshals and the Hangin' Judge," a film by Larry Foley, will premiere on Arkansas PBS and myarpbs.org/live Wednesday, Nov. 29, at 7 p.m. The film tells the story of the wild and violent frontier days in and around Fort Smith, Arkansas, and Indian Territory, when Judge Isaac C. Parker sent 79 convicted felons to die on the gallows.

The award-winning film, released in 2020, blends a first-person narrative by actress Jennica Schwartzman playing Ada Patterson, a reporter for the now defunct St. Louis Republic, with documentary storytelling featuring scholars from eastern Oklahoma and western Arkansas. The real Patterson interviewed Parker, played by Bill Rogers, who was bedridden with kidney disease.

Because he had access to the microfilm of the original 1896 article written by Patterson archived at the Museum of Missouri History in St. Louis, Foley said he felt the best path to recount the events was to combine the storytelling elements.

"I can't improve on this," Foley said, referring to the St. Louis Republic article. "This could be bad if we got bad actors, but I knew Jennica would be perfect for Ada Patterson and Bill Rogers, who I've known for many years, was what I believe to be an accurate portrayal of Judge Isaac Parker.

"I wanted to be precise with everything, and I knew techniques shouldn't take away from the story. I knew if we could get the right actors, then this would be a great film."

Foley went through additional extensive research in an effort to make the film as accurate as possible, "digging into photos at Fort Smith and the National Cowboy & Western Heritage Museum in Oklahoma City" as one example.

Encore presentations of "Indians, Outlaws, Marshals and the Hangin' Judge" will air on Arkansas PBS Sunday, Dec. 3, at 10 a.m. and Monday, Dec. 4, at 8 p.m.

Foley received the Mid-America Regional Emmy Award for Best Director for "Indians, Outlaws, Marshals and the Hangin' Judge."

Arkansas Treasures

The all new, original special "Arkansas Treasures" premiered on Arkansas PBS and at myarps.org/live Monday, Nov. 27, at 7 p.m. "Arkansas Treasures," filmed during a two-day event in August 2023, showcases the wonderful, weird, and wild collectibles and antiques found throughout the state.

"As 'Arkansas Treasures' graces our screens, we invite viewers to delve into the enchanting realm of Arkansas's hidden gems," Arkansas PBS Executive Director and CEO Courtney Pledger said. "This series will be a celebration of the extraordinary narratives that reside in the nooks and crannies of Arkansas.

"From quirky antiques to cherished artifacts, each item tells a unique story, weaving together a rich illustration of our cultural heritage. 'Arkansas Treasures' is not just a showcase; it's an exploration of the captivating and unexpected tales that make our state a treasure trove of history and character."

"Arkansas Treasures" features several professional evaluators meeting with individuals discussing the heirlooms, collectibles and garage sale finds that they're eager to learn more about, and viewers will get to hear the stories of how they acquired these items and how much each is potentially worth. Amory LeCuyer, owner and lead appraiser for Hampton House Auctions in Yorktown, Virginia, serves as lead appraiser for the production, while Danyelle Musselman, former TV sports reporter and wife of University of Arkansas Razorbacks men's basketball coach Eric Musselman, serves as host of "Arkansas Treasures."

More than 500 guests entered the Arkansas PBS studios in Conway during a two-day period in early August for an evaluation of their beloved items, including toys, instruments, paintings, quilts, baseball cards, jewelry, correspondence from former first lady Eleanor Roosevelt and more.

Two Arkansas appraisers who participated in the show, Kate Askew and Roy Dudley, will be live in the Arkansas PBS studios during the premiere of "Arkansas Treasures" on Nov. 27.

Join professional DJ and "Celebrating Arkansas: Holiday Traditions" host, Mario Luna, as he scours the state for the most interesting, time-tested Arkansas celebrations. In the Fall episode of this new series, Luna will get the inside information on the Hindu festival of Diwali, as well as the spooky details on Halloween and Día de Los Muertos in different communities across the state. Finally, Luna will compete a Turkey Crawl as he celebrates Thanksgiving a handful of different ways, while sharing the lesson – no matter the celebration, it's better together.

2. EDUCATION

Daniel Tiger's Neighborhood

Airdate: October 2 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 8:30 a.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

This weekday award-winning animated children's television series targets preschool-aged children. Two 11-minute segments are linked by a common socio-emotional theme, such as disappointment and sadness or anger, or being thankful and appreciative. The theme also uses a musical motif phrase, which the show calls "strategy songs", to reinforce the theme and help children remember the life lessons.

Sesame Street

Airdate: October 2 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 10:00 a.m. & 12:00 p.m.

Program Length: 30 minutes

This award-winning weekday series delivers academic and social education that prepares kids for grade school. Since its premiere, the show's base curriculum has been set by academic research on preschoolers. Encore episodes focus on music and art and how these tools can be used to develop the whole child – the cognitive, social, emotional, and physical attributes.

In addition, the "Elmo's World" segment looks at the world through the eyes of a three-year-old, continues as a featured segment. Themes include birthdays, pets, teeth, families, games and more.

Wild Kratts

Airdate: October 1 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 6:00 a.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

The weekday show's aim is to educate children about biology, zoology, and ecology, and teach kids small ways to make big impacts. The basic plot of an episode is usually to save the animals or an animal from a situation, be it villains, general human influence, or confusion on a baby animal's part.

Mystery League

Airdate: November 19, 2023

Airtime: 4:30 p.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

We're excited to share that our original show "Mystery League" – a new 20-episode, live-action series to teach kids in kindergarten through second grades about friendship and community –will premiere this fall on the statewide public media network.

"'Mystery League' showcases the remarkable production skills of our Arkansas PBS team and draws on our many relationships with the talented, larger Arkansas creative community."

"Mystery League" follows three fifth grade "detectives" – Millie, Mike, and Marta – as they solve the never-ending mysteries of the fictional, small, Arkansas town of Mulberry Springs. Each episode of "Mystery League" features relevant storylines that encourage Arkansas kids to problem solve and build relationships. Free resources will be offered to families and classrooms to support learning targets that align with Arkansas educational standards.

The series will be available digitally to families and classrooms across the state beginning in fall 2023. The statewide broadcast premiere of "Mystery League" on Arkansas PBS is slated for October 2023, with episodes also livestreaming at myarpbs.org/watch. The series will also be available on demand in the PBS App and at youtube.com/arkansaspbs, as well as via YouTube TV. In conjunction with the broadcast and digital distribution of the series, Arkansas PBS will offer activities for the classroom and at home.

America's Heartland

This weekly magazine-style series give consumers an inside look at the people and processes involved in bringing food, fuel, and fiber to those in the United States and around the world. The series' producers and reporters have brought viewers informative and compelling stories about farm families, agricultural technology, consumer issues, animal welfare, environmental concerns, organic farming, and crop sustainability to demonstrate the impact that American agriculture has on a global economy.

4. ENVIRONMENT

Nature

Airdate: October 18 – December 27, 2023

Airtime: 7:00 p.m. Program Length: 60 minutes

This award-winning wildlife television program consists of documentaries about various animals and ecosystems. Consistently stunning documentaries transport viewers to far-flung locations ranging from the torrid African plains to the chilly splendors of icy Antarctica. The show's primary focus is on animals and ecosystems around the world.

NOVA

Airdate: October 11 – December 27, 2023

Airtime: 8:00 p.m. Program Length: 60 minutes

This award-winning science series is the most-watched prime time science series on American television, reaching an average of five million viewers weekly. Now in its fourth decade of production, the series remains committed to producing in-depth science programming in the form of one-hour documentaries and long-form mini-series, from the latest breakthroughs in technology to the deepest mysteries of the natural world.

5. GOVERNMENT / POLITICS / LAW

Arkansas Week: 40th Anniversary Year

Airdate: October 6 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 7:30 p.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

Arkansas Week, an Arkansas PBS weekly production, is the longest running public affairs program in Arkansas, featuring veteran journalist Steve Barnes (supplemented periodically by journalists; Donna Terrell, Christina Munoz, and Dawn Scott) and a dedicated, distinguished group of Arkansas journalists, experts, newsmakers, lawmakers, government, business, and civic leaders giving knowledge and insight on the political, governmental, legal, economic, and social issues of interest to Arkansans in the news.

Every third Friday of the month a segment called "Good Roots" is devoted to the agricultural matters of Arkansas's largest industry. Episodes are repeated the following Sunday at 10:00 a.m.

BBC World News

Airdate: October 2 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 10:00 p.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

This series from the British Broadcasting Corporation features current political events around the world and in the USA from an international viewpoint.

PBS NewsHour

Airdate: October 2 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 6:00 p.m. Program Length: 1 hour

This award-winning program is known for its in-depth coverage of issues and current events with a highly objective and thoughtful approach and goes beyond the headline journalism of most broadcast television and partisanship of most cable news channels.

Washington Week

Airdate: October 6 – December 29, 2023

Airtime: 7:00 p.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

This long-running PBS public affairs series featured Washington's top journalists analyzing the week's top news stories, and their effect on the lives of all Americans.

Firing Line with Margaret Hoover

Airdate: October 1 – December 31, 2023

Airtime: 9:30 a.m. Program Length: 30 minutes

Firing Line with Margaret Hoover is a refreshing reprisal of William F. Buckley's iconic PBS program, a smart, civil, and engaging contest of ideas. The series maintains the character of the original, providing a platform that is diligent in its commitment to civility and the rigorous exchange of opinion. Firing Line with Margaret Hoover comes at a time when meaningful discourse is needed more than ever. Interviews and debates will highlight leading lights from the left and right, complemented by archival footage from the original Firing Line to remind viewers of longstanding conservative and liberal arguments, where they've been disproved or reinforced over time.

It is an opportunity to engage in the debate about the America that we want to create for the 21st century — and summon Americans of every political persuasion to a rigorous examination of the choices we must make together in the challenging years ahead.
