4/6- Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and Delaware are beginning to pay out a record number of COVID-19 unemployment claims; 4/7- Some of the country's largest grocery store chains are testing one-way aisles, as a way to help encourage social distancing during the coronavirus pandemic; 4/14- The influx of online shopping during the pandemic has overwhelmed Reading Terminal Market, so the service is temporarily suspended; 4/20- Curbside pickup is now available at a number of Wine and Spirits stores in Pennsylvania; 4/24- Stimulus checks have already started to go out to many families, but 84% say they need another one; 5/1- Walmart is expanding its delivery service to include nearly 1,000 stores; 5/5- Supermarkets have started planning for panic buyers due to the meat shortage caused by COVID-19; 5/7- Whenever Six Flags Great Adventure is allowed to reopen, visitors will have to make a reservation before showing up; 5/12- Stores in some states are reopening, but weeks of shutdowns saw a big jump in people shopping online; 5/21- Pennsylvania restaurants can now sell cocktails-to-go; 6/1- Many businesses hoping to survive weeks of COVID-19 closures, were set back even more after their properties were ransacked by crowds this weekend; 6/8- The National Bureau of Economic Research now says the United States is officially in a recession; 6/12- Starbucks has changed its policy, after telling employees that they cannot wear Black Lives Matter paraphernalia; 6/16- Longwood Gardens will reopen Thursday on a limited basis and only to members; 6/17- Eastern State Penitentiary announced the coronavirus pandemic has forced it to lay off approximately 40% of its staff.

Royals are in lockdown like millions of other families around the world; 4/21- The Philadelphia Eagles are donating \$1 million to the city for COVID-19 relief efforts; 5/3- A family in Sewell, New Jersey is putting on a nightly light show in honor of essential workers; 5/6- A 1,000 pound, 15-foot tall bronze giraffe sculpture moved in to its new home, the Children's Sculpture Zoo in Haddonfield, New Jersey; 5/11- Philly's own Kevin Hart and his wife, Eniko, announced they are going to have a baby girl; 5/14- For the first time in two decades, AAA will not issue a Memorial Day travel forecast; 5/15- The Phillies are teaming up with Philabundance for a virtual food drive; 6/3- New Orleans Saints Quarterback Drew Brees is apologizing over comments he made about players kneeling during the National Anthem; 6/8- Phillip Angus, from Boyertown, just set the record in the Guinness Book Of World Records for the largest mouth gape at a whopping three and three quarters inches; 6/12- Parks On Tap is back in Philadelphia for the summer season; 6/16-The Roots Picnic is going virtual this year, and former first lady, Michelle Obama will be the guest host; 6/17- The World Championship Punkin Chunkin has been called off, but organizers are working on plans to allow teams to continue to compete.

**4/2-** The Philadelphia Streets Department says it's behind on picking up trash and recycling, as sanitation workers have been calling out sick amid the coronavirus outbreak; **4/7-** President Trump says he will look at freezing funding to the World Health Organization; **4/14-** President Obama released a 12-minute long video, endorsing Joe Biden; **4/15-** Massachusetts Senator Elizabeth Warren is the latest former Democratic presidential candidate to endorse Joe Biden; **4/20-** CNN is citing an anonymous U.S. official who said Kim Jong Un was in "grave danger" after an unspecified surgery; **5/1-** Joe Biden is denying that he sexually assaulted a senate staffer in 1993;

Members of the Coast Guard rescued two people after a fishing vessel ran aground off of the New Jersey coast; 5/13- The Wawa Welcome America Festival will be completely virtual this year; 5/17- 12 firefighters are recovering after they were hurt in an explosion and fire in Los Angeles; 6/2- About 50 young people peacefully marched down 52<sup>nd</sup> Street, one of the areas hit hardest by violence over the weekend; 6/5- Staring Monday, SEPTA riders will be required to wear a face covering; 6/8- The majority of City Council members in Minneapolis have promised to dismantle the city's Police Department and replace it with a new system of public safety; 6/12- A section of the Wildwood Boardwalk is finally back open after getting damaged during a storm; 6/15- Demonstrations against police brutality continue nationwide after officers in Atlanta shot and killed a man outside a Wendy's.
