The main topic of this program was the crime in Jacksonville. We discussed how to avoid becoming a victim of theft, violence, etc. Securing your home to deter break-ins for the upcoming holiday season. How to get information on crimes that have taken place in the area via social media.

John Rutherford is Jacksonville's Sheriff and says he's upset that budget cuts are forcing him to put fewer officers on the street and as a result he fears that crime could go up. Rutherford talked about how citizens can help be the eyes and ears for JSO and how to report suspicious activity in their neighborhoods

Ascertainments show many people in Jacksonville are concerned at the number of violent crimes being committed and want to do something to reduce it.

Action News Sunday began with an interview with convicted murderer Charles Southern's fight to be released from a lifetime sentence for the murder of a friend. The decision on this appeal could affect other minors across the state who are currently serving similar sentences. State Attorney Angela Corey spoke about the need to keep Southern in jail for the duration of his sentence. Segment two featured the issue of Asian Tiger Shrimp, and invasive species that escaped from a South Carolina research facility during Hurricane Hugo. The species has since become a problem in Northeast Florida, eating the indigenous white shrimp, thereby causing hardships for local fishermen. The Tiger shrimp grow to an estimated 13 inches and weigh as much as a full pound. The final segment dealt with the delays and other problems surrounding Healthcare.gov, and what the Obama administration is doing to correct the debacle.

The main topic of this program was crime. We talked about recent crime trends and let listeners know what they need to do to avoid becoming a victim. We talked about bicycles accidents which are trending high right now, and what the road rules are for cars and bicycles. We also talked about crime during the holidays and how to stay safe.

Ascertainments are important for the Jacksonville community because in cases like this they inform citizens about how to stay safe.

#### **News Stories**

A meth house which has been known to attract crime in St. Augustine is getting torn down. Those who live in the area tell our partner Action News they're excited their Queens Road neighborhood can now move forward.

The Clay County Sheriff's office has just released a photo of a woman they believe is connected to a smash and grab car burglary at a local YMCA. Police say in October someone broke into a car in the YMCA parking lot in Orange Park and stole a woman's purse and her bank cards. Investigators say a woman used the victim's ATM card at a drive-thru bank recently. We've got a photo of the suspect up at WOKV.com

A judge issued rulings in the case of a man accused of gunning down a local teen at a Southside gas station. Spectators will not be allowed to wear items in support of either Michael Dunn or Jordan Davis. Davis's father will be allowed to remain in the courtroom throughout the trial and the jury will not be allowed to inspect the crime scene.

JSO is searching for a murder suspect this afternoon. Police are looking for 23-year-old Rayvon Sanders. He's wanted in connection with a murder on State Street Sunday. We've got his photo up right now on wokv dot com.

Updating you on the officer-involved shooting this afternoon on Katnack Road, which is near Dixie Highway in St. Johns County. The Sheriff's Office says they received calls about 64 year-old Rodney Stevens, who has outstanding warrants for grand theft auto, felony battery and tempering with a witness. Stevens was killed following a shootout with responding officers, none of whom were injured. The shooting is still under investigation.

The St. Johns County Sheriff's Office has just released a free app for mobile devices. Sgt. Catherine Payne tells us it allows them to directly communicate with the public about traffic, weather or safety issues. You can find the app by searching for "S-J-S-O" - Payne says you have to enable push notifications to receive their messages.

## **Traffic & Public Safety**

First Coast Forum Host: Scott Thomas Airdate: Saturday & Sunday, October 12<sup>th</sup> & 13<sup>th</sup>, 2013 Topic: Traffic & Public Safety Guests: Mike Goldman, spokesman for the Florida Department of Transportation, District 2 Duration: 27 minutes

Our discussion began with Mr. Goldman detailing the area covered by District 2 in Northeast Florida. We reviewed many of the current and future major transportation projects in North Florida, including 9B, Phase III, and the Overland Bridge. Mr. Goldman also discussed the drainage problems around town, and the contact information for reporting issues.

Our biggest topic of concern was the accident involving the Mathews Bridge. Mr. Goldman described the incident and the ongoing investigation, as well as the hopeful timetable of completing the repairs before the Florida-Georgia football game.

Alternative transportation sources were discussed, including car-pooling, mass transit, biking and walking. Finally, Mr. Goldman gave out contact information for listeners wanting to get involved or find out more information about the FDOT.

Ascertainments show that the planning is critical to meeting the transportation needs of the citizens of North Florida. Budgetary restraints are a concern, especially considering some of the decisions made in Tallahassee. Combining effective planning and alternative sources of travel will help to ease some of the shortfalls.

Lake Ray is a member of the State House of Representatives and also a traffic engineer. He says the recent accident involving a ship hitting the Mathews Bridge in Jacksonville could have been a major disaster. In fact it did cause the state to shut down the bridge for several weeks while repairs were made. He explained the damage and talked about the process needed to repair it and he says the bridge will be safe once it's reopened.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about transportation in Jacksonville and safety on the roadways and local bridges

This segment included tips for the holiday season when out shopping. From parking lot safety, in the store and overall awareness of your surroundings. Pedestrian safety is a large concern due to the recent deaths in the area. We discussed how to avoid cars when walking or biking.

#### **News Stories**

Governor Scott is calling for a cut in fees drivers pay to register their cars. Scott plans to ask state legislators to cut auto registration fees by more than 400 million next year. The governor's office estimates the cut would mean you'll pay \$25 dollars less for the registration of a typical automobile.

The UNF student at the center of a gun rights lawsuit says she's pleased with an appeals court ruling, allowing her to keep her gun locked inside of her car. Alexandra Lainez tells our partner Action news she's glad the appeals court ruled she does have the right to bear arms. It was previously against UNF's student policy.

It's a common sight as you drive into downtown Jacksonville...construction barrels. And the state transportation department plans to KEEP them around for the next several years. We've discovered a three year, \$136 million dollar plan to widen the Fuller Warren Bridge to four lanes in each direction. According to the state, 146,000 vehicles travel across the Fuller Warren every day. Construction would take about three years to complete, and would include building an elevated flyover ramp connecting I-10 to Roosevelt.

We're learning more about the challenge a pilot may have encountered Sunday when his plane crashed into a retention pond....killing all three people onboard. Sam Fischer is a pilot and tells our partner Action news landing is one of the most difficult parts of flying. A preliminary report by the NTSB is set to be released next week.

A Jacksonville roofing company has been fined more than 48-thousand dollars for violating safety rules set by the Occupational Safety and Health Administration. OSHA says North Florida Roofing and Repair didn't ensure their employees used fall protection on a job site. Other violations are classified as serious... and ones that could have risked lives.

## **Health Care**

Jax Journal Host: Roxy Tyler Airdate: 10/5/13 Topic: Health Care Guest: Dr. Sunil Joshi Duration 25:10

Dr. Sunil Joshi is Treasurer of the Duval County Medical Society. He says the new health care law has many local doctors concerned that they will see an influx of patients and won't be able to handle the extra load. He says there are also many questions and uncertainties surrounding the implementation of the new law and all the paperwork that will go along with it. He talked about patient concerns as well and how many people are finding the new affordable care act has them paying more for insurance now than they did before the law was enacted.

Ascertainments show many are concerned about the tight timelines to implement the new health care law.

First Coast Forum Host: Anna Airdate: Saturday, October 26, 2013 Topic: Healthcare Guests: Dr. Joshi Duration: 27 minutes

The main topic of this program was healthcare. We provided updates and accurate information on the new health care law and how it will affect listeners. Plus we informed listeners of how they can utilize the new health care system and how it will work.

Len Geiger is recovering from a little known devastating disease called Alpha One. It attacks your lungs and liver and can be fatal. He was lucky though and was able to get a new lease on life with a double lung transplant. Richard Johnson is a local father of two who just learned that both of his children have the disease and he is working to raise money and awareness to help researchers develop new treatments and hopefully one day a cure.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about diseases and want to know about any new health concerns that may affect them.

First Coast Forum Host: Scott Thomas Airdate: Saturday & Sunday, November 30<sup>th</sup> & 31st, 2013 Topic: Healthcare Guests: Denise Marzullo-President & CEO of Mental Health America of NE Florida Duration: 26:50

My conversation with Ms. Marzullo centered around mental illness in America, and specifically, here on the First Coast. Statistics show that Florida is ranked 49<sup>th</sup> in the nation when it comes to Mental Health funding, and Jacksonville is last in the state. Recognizing the signs of mental illness is the critical first step in getting treatment to someone in need. Ms. Marzullo discussed the many different types of mental illnesses, from depression to bi-polar disorder to schizophrenia. She also gave helpful tips on how to broach the topic with someone suspected of mental illness. She gave the names and contact information of services available for someone with these conditions. Finally, we discussed the need to keep weapons out of the hands of individuals with mental illness, and the tragic results when procedures are not followed.

Ascertainments show that mental illness is a disease, and open discussion about the condition is a step in the right direction in eliminating the stigma associated with it. More funding is needed for preventative measures and for treatment, especially considering the repercussions of ignoring the problem.

#### Jax Journal

Host: Roxy Tyler Airdate: 12/28/13 Topic: Mental healthcare Guest: Ben Warner Duration: 25:21

Ben Warner is the President and CEO of JCCI, the local think tank for the city of Jacksonville. He says their group is getting ready to start a major survey and study on mental health. He says there are more suicides every year in Duval County than homicides. He adds the two major facilities that handle mental health problems are the Duval County School System and the Duval County Jail. Warner says we need to take mental health seriously and get rid of the stigma attached to those who suffer from mental illness. The study results will be released next Fall.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about the lack of mental health facilities and care available to local residents.

#### **News Stories**

We're following the arguments before the Supreme Court about the fight to legalize marijuana in Florida. One man tells our partner Action news he supports it. He signed a petition to put it on the ballot next year.

The nation's largest freight rail carriers announcing they'll provide health care benefits to the samesex spouses of their employees. This coming one day after legally married, gay engineers filed a federal lawsuit in Seattle against B-N-S-F Railway Company. A lawyer for the couples says the railroads' decision is a good first step, but doesn't compensate for the financial and emotional drain the engineers experienced while they fought for months to get B-N-S-F to have spouses added.

Senator Mary Landrieu says there are problems with the federal healthcare law... but those are problems that need to be worked through. She chairs the panel which heard concerns from small business owners today over the price of plans being offered. But tried to also focus on what she calls a more successful start for state exchanges.

The University of North Florida is going smoke-free. A new regulation will prohibit smoking on all University properties beginning in August of next year. Smoking related advertisements, sponsorships and sales will also be prohibited.

Smokers trying to kick the habit will find new regulations affecting e-cigarettes in Orange Park. The town council voted overwhelmingly to restrict the sale of e-cigarettes to minors--and retailers will be forced to move them behind the counter. Mayor Jim Renninger says he's OK with people using e-cigarettes as an alternative. Police say they'll be going to local stores today to educate employees on the new ordinance.

## Economy

First Coast Forum Host: ACTION NEWS SUNDAY Airdate: Saturday & Sunday, October 19<sup>th</sup> & 20th, 2013 Topic: Jaguars playing in London/Government shutdown/Obamacare Guests: President of Jaguars Mark Lamping/UNF's Dr. Matt Corrigan/Tonya Weathersbee & Gene Wexler Duration: 20 minutes, 31 seconds

Action News Sunday began with an interview with Mark Lamping, president of the Jacksonville Jaguars. Mr. Lamping discussed the Jaguars' struggles on the field, and how it impacts the fans. He talked about the business impact for Jacksonville in relation to playing games in London in the coming years. Improvements to the stadium and how they're being paid for were also discussed.

The government shutdown ends, and UNF's Dr. Matt Corrigan discussed the impact it had on the nation. He compared how both parties allowed the shutdown to happen, and how they can avoid a repeat in the future. Much of the shutdown revolved around the Affordable Healthcare Act and entitlement plans. Mr. Corrigan also touched on the Jacksonville city budget, and the importance of finalizing one.

Guests Tonya Weathersbee from the Florida Times Union and WOKV's Gene Wexler gave their takes on the government shutdown, and what congress must do to avoid a repeat of this scenario. They also debated the possibility of defunding Obamacare, and the impact it would have on the nation.

Action News Sunday began with an interview with the president of the *Jacksonville* Chapter of the *Southern* Christian *Leadership Conference,* Opio Sokoni, who gave his views about the proposed name change of Forrest High School. There is much debate about the actual history of its namesake Nathan B. Forrest, and his ties to the Klu Klux Klan and slavery.

Jacksonville ranked 7th on the top ten list. Salt Lake City was number one. Seattle, Austin Texas, San Jose California and Miami round out the top five.

After a disappointing Black Friday weekend for retailers, Cyber Monday sets a new record. According to Adobe, online sales increased by 16 percent from last year to nearly two-point-three billion dollars this year. A record 18 percent of sales were on smartphones. Physical stores suffered the first spending decline on a Black Friday weekend since 2009.

EverBank is laying off about 300 people in Jacksonville early in the new year. We're told this is a result of October's announcement that EverBank was selling off \$13 billion of its mortgage service rights and default service platform. The new company, Green Tree, is promising to hire workers when the deal is complete. Green Tree is also taking over several floors of EverBank's downtown office.

The holiday shopping season is right around the corner... and Florida retailers are expecting it to be a busy one. The Florida Retail Federation is forecasting a three to four and a half percent increase over last year with online sales expected to jump as much as 15 percent.

Big gains continue for Florida's tourism industry. Visit Florida says we've posted another record quarter in an otherwise record year so far. A total 72.6 million visitors have visited the sunshine state between January and September.

He says he will continue to try to keep taxes low while still providing all the needs of those in the community.

She's challenging people in the community to come up with unique ideas on how to improve education and thus the economy by graduating more students with specific job skills.

Ascertainments are important for the Jacksonville community because in cases like this they inform citizens about where their tax dollars are going and what is going on in the city.

#### **News Stories**

Tensions were high at last night's town hall meeting on the Westside about whether to spend taxpayer dollars to change the name of Nathan B. Forrest High school. One thing everyone at the meeting agreed on was maybe if the district is going to spend half a million on something, it should be a school marching band instead of a name change. Things did get heated between some audience members and the Jacksonville Progressive Coalition. Local historian Jim Schillinghaw tells our partner Action News the group is "a bunch of communists." Board members had to remind people why they came because things got so heated at one point.

Beyond just college football. The Gator Bowl is hoping its new division will be <u>what Jacksonville needs</u> <u>to bring in big name events</u>. Gator Bowl President Rick Catlett says they can work quicker on big events than the city can... and that's why they've created a new 501-c-3 branch focused just on recruiting OTHER events... like youth sports of a soccer tournament. Alan Verlander who will now head that division knows where the big money still lies. The Gator Bowl HOPES to announce a neutral site college football game within the next few weeks

The owner of the Jacksonville landing wants to re-shape the downtown landmark to make it more appealing and he wants to partner with the city to do it. Landing owner Toney Sleiman says architects, city leaders and others are expected to turn out for a workshop at the downtown library tonight to talk more about the possibility of revamping the landing and who pays for what. The meeting is set for tonight from 6 to 8 pm at the library on Laura Street.

WOKV was the first to tell you about Jacksonville's new push for funding through selling naming rights to the sports complex venues downtown. But now Mayor Alvin Brown says nothing will change on the OUTSIDE of the Veterans Memorial Arena. And he says the city will look at naming rights INSIDE of the venue... like for suites. This comes after local veterans started letting us know that taking away their tribute in the venue name would be an unacceptable change

Leaving open the possibility of a tax hike to get control of Jacksonville's shortfall in pension obligations. The city's Retirement Reform Task Force met Thursday to begin narrowing a list of options to deal with the nearly \$2 billion unfunded liability. Chairman Bill Shy tells our partner Action News the city MAY pay \$120 million in a one-time contribution, but more is needed. The question of whether taxes should be raised or how much city services should be cut to pay down the obligation was left open. The task force rejected using a 401(k) retirement plan for police and firefighters.
