He talked about how DCF workers conduct surprise home inspections and take children out of homes where they may be endangered but also work with parents for training to try their best to keep families together if possible. But Harrell says they also need to depend on

Jacksonville citizens to who need to report any potential incidents they may see to DCF so they can send investigators out to due welfare checks on children.

Dr. Hallett admits he was skeptical at first but study after study that he's done proves that the program is helping to turn the lives of former prisoners around for good. McCoy says they use the buddy system and former inmates live together until they can get a job and earn enough money to make it on their own, which increases their chance of success in the real world.

thrown out due to bad jury instructions but the State Attorney plans to re-try Alexander who had been convicted and sentenced to 20 years

Angela Corey is the State Attorney for the 4th Circuit which includes Jacksonville, St. John's County, Nassau, Baker, Clay and more. She recently helped prosecute the murder case against 47 year old Michael Dunn. He's accused shooting and killing 17 year old Jordan Davis in an argument over loud music at a local gas station. Dunn was convicted on the lesser counts but the jury deadlocked on the first degree murder count and the Judge ordered a new trial on that charge only. Corey defended her office and how she and her attorneys handled the case despite many comparisons to the George Zimmerman case in which she also prosecuted. He was found innocent of murder in the death of Trayvon Martin. Corey says she prosecuted both cases to the letter of the law and explained what they were allowed to present as evidence and what they were forced to leave out. Corey also says there is no need for a new "warning shot" law now being considering in the state legislature. She says that is already covered by the self- defense law.

He says it's a crime not to stop and report any accident especially when it results in an injury or death. He says they are still looking for the driver who hit and killed a young girl as she was walking along a roadway in St. John's County. He says we must all work to pay more attention to driving when behind the wheel, not talking or texting or even adjusting your radio. Sgt. Bryan says troopers are also starting to crack down on careless or aggressive drivers as well as speeders.
