Topic: Healthcare Costs and Access

Guest: Dr. Daniel Kantor Dir, Comprehensive Multiple Sclerosis Center University of Florida in Jacksonville

Duration: 22 minutes, 07 seconds

Our conversation with Dr. Kantor focused on what changes people may see in their medical coverage from recently passed votes in Washington. We also spoke about how people’s coverage may be affected by the new Affordable Care Act. Advances in new medications, new technology in the medial field, and what people may be able to do to get a healthy start in 2013

were also discussed. Dr. Kantor also stressed the importance of personal medicine in the future, and how Dr.s will be able to fight serious child hood diseases in the near future.

Ascertainments show that many patients in Duval County may not be 100% informed of what recent changes in healthcare mean to them. The best way for them to get informed is to talk to their primary care physician. Also, there are many breakthroughs in medicine and treatment that are being implemented by healthcare professionals today.

He talked about how listeners can get more information on the new health care plan and how it will affect them. He also talked about Florida's Medicaid program and how if the Federal government gets involved it could create confusion and leave many doctors not getting paid for their services, which in turn could create a mass exodus of doctors who leave Florida for states that don't have similar issues.

different races perceive race relations in Jacksonville which also impacted the results of their latest study. WOKV put a link to their findings on our website so listeners could easily access the information.

Education was stressed by both guests. Learning as much as possible about the steps and procedures of buying a house and keeping payments up-to-date is the key to success. Both the Jacksonville Urban League, and Wealth Watchers, Inc. offer many educational seminars to the public.

Another very important topic was budgeting. Keeping children involved and informed about the household expenses was stressed by both guests.

He says many people think the other folks who use the food from the food bank are homeless, but in fact most are working but just don't earn enough money to keep a roof over their head and food on the table. He says they need donations and volunteers and let listeners know how they can help or get help from their website and local locations.

He says more needs to be done to ensure that all students in Duval and neighboring Counties have access to quality free public education. But he says there are several obstacles in doing that, including a lack of trust in the system itself and a lack of uniformity in how we teach our children. He invited listeners to join their group and to volunteer in local schools in order to help students who may fall behind in their studies. He also gave out contact information and website information so listeners can get more information on the status of our education system and how it compares to other districts of its size in the state and throughout the nation.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about the state of education in Jacksonville and want more to be done to ensure that more students graduate and have the tools they need to be successful in business and life.

Duration: 27 minutes, 07 seconds

Our conversation with Dr. Roche Green centered on children's overall well-being in school, including proper diet, and a regular exercise routine. Dr. Roche Green gave startling statistics about the national percentage of children who are considered obese, and went so far as to call it "an epidemic". Many factors come into play, but educating our children about the food they eat (or don't eat) and maintaining 60 minutes of exercise a day is the short-term goal.

New federal nutrition standards are helping to insure better, healthier foods being served to our children at school, but that's only part of the equation. There is also a push to double the current amount of Physical Education (exercise) in schools from the current number of 150 minutes a week. Another hurdle is the lack of public access to school facilities after regular school hours. Logistics and potential law suits are currently keeping many schools from being open after school. Dr. Roche Green also discussed the legislative push to make CPR training a mandatory requirement for high school graduation.

Ascertainments show that proper diet and exercise is critical for one's well-being. Educating our children about healthy habits and routines needs to be done early in their development if we are to effectively battle the national child obesity epidemic.

The program is offered through a foundation provided by businesses on the first coast and concentrates mainly of veterans who are either just back from serving their country overseas or are working at a job that's out of their normal field.

Delaney also talked about how ,while he was Mayor of Jacksonville, he made a deal with the Police and Fire Unions and how that 30 year deal is now outdated and needs to be reformed in light of the struggling economy.

With Mrs. Gianoulis being featured on this segment of First Coast Forum we focused on Public education. She highlighted the importance of growing teachers, so they can help their students grow. We spoke about the problem with teachers leaving that career too early, and there is not enough teachers to go around. There was also a brief discussion on why Florida ranks very low compared to other states when it comes to funding for public education. One thing that stood out in our conversation was a poll conducted by UNF where %64 of residents would support a property tax increase if it were to go to schools.

Ascertainments show that with the focus on growing teachers just as much as students, it can lead to a better future for our local teachers, and those who aspire to be teachers. Also, residents of Jacksonville acknowledge a need to increase funding for education.

The main topic of the interview was to learn what developments Jacksonville is making as a city and how it plans to shape its identity in the future; as well as how this ties into education. *Ascertainments show that an organization called Jax 2025 is learning what our challenges are as a city and what we want to be. We are learning how to define what we could and should be. Our area is a national leader in volunteerism. Also, civic involvement meets education. Duval County graduation requirements are higher than other counties, funding has been decreased for schools, school days were shortened, but despite these obstacles, we've seen a steady increase in graduation rates over the last six years.*

Guest: Eric J. Friday, criminal defense attorney & firearm expert - attorney representing Florida Carry

Duration: 29 minutes, 44 seconds

Our discussion began with Mr. Friday giving the specific definition for the term “Assault Weapon”, and why it is being considered for banning. He also described the difference between automatic and semi-automatic weapons, and what is legal or illegal in the state of Florida. Mr. Friday gave the position of *Florida Carry* in relation to President Obama’s new gun law proposals...specifically how banning certain firearms and limiting rounds in magazines will not aid in lowering the incidents of gun violence. Enforcing the laws currently on the books would be a better approach, according to Mr. Friday and Florida Carry.

We also talked about the need for proper Mental Health screenings for anyone applying for a firearm. General gun laws in Florida were discussed, including who can own a gun, where they are allowed to transport the weapon, and how it is to be stored. We also discussed the “Stand Your Ground” law, and when it may be applicable.

Ascertainments show that owning a firearm is a serious matter, requiring training, experience and responsibility. Serious talk regarding firearms and mental illness is needed to reduce or eliminate attacks such as the one in Connecticut.

Rutherford also talked about having to lay off officers in light of budget cuts and how that is impacting response times. He says Jacksonville is making progress in reducing crime, but there is more we all can do to look out for ourselves and others to help make the entire community safer.

Corey talked about the recent plea deal in the Cristian Fernandez case and how it was never her intention to prosecute him in the adult system. But she says he has to pay for killing his 2 year old half - brother and the plea deal gives him time behind bars while also getting an education and counseling. He will serve 10 years and if all goes well will be on probation after that.

It was implemented for instances of self-defense, not to be used as a “cure-all.” Background checks should be done before carrying or owning a firearm. Gun owners should be responsible and keep them registered and locked up properly. Other ascertainments show texting and driving is a big problem and very dangerous. Reduction of police due to budget cuts was also discussed.

Angela Corey is the State Attorney in Jacksonville and recently claimed hefty pensions for herself and her chief assistant state attorney but says she did it all legally and they deserve it because of the many hours they put in putting cases together against some of Jacksonville's most serious offenders. Corey talked about how much it costs her office to handle the Trayvon Martin case and other several high profile cases. She also talked about how her prosecutors have to make trips back and forth to the new County Courthouse from the old State attorney's office and how that makes her team of prosecutors work even longer hours for the same pay. Corey says many of her lawyers could have double what the state pays them for prosecuting cases and the pensions at least give them some incentive to stay on the job longer.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about pension reform and having enough funding to keep public safety measures and basic services in place despite budget cuts.
