2nd QUARTER 2012 ASCERTAINMENT MEETING

Concerns:

1. Crime and Public Safety

- a. Drugs, both illegal and prescription are creating an atmosphere of violence on the First Coast and can lead to homelessness and other problems. Some say there is a meth epidemic in Jacksonville that needs to be exposed.
- b. Easy access to guns allows dangerous weapons to get into the wrong hands.
- c. Child abuse and sexual abuse are becoming too common. More needs to be done to protect innocent children and defenseless women.
- d. Gangs are becoming a big problem in Jacksonville as kids get drawn in to a cycle of crime by drug dealers recruiting them with flashy cars and clothes.

2. Education

- a. Too many students are failing the standard testing because they are not learning the basics, then they get behind and end up dropping out of school which causes low graduation rates.
- b. Schools need to communicate better with parents when their child is falling behind to give parents time to help students succeed.
- c. Every school should be on the same curricular programs so if a student moves, they can pick up at their new school where they left off in their old school.
- d. Too many budget cuts are causing vital after school programs to end and putting many sports, music and art programs at risk.
- e. Lack of text books and basic classroom supplies create obstacles for learning.
- f. Lack of discipline in schools disrupts the education of students who don't misbehave.

3. Economy

- a. Unemployment rate is higher in Jacksonville than the state or nation. We need to help broadcast more information about new job opportunities.
- b. Jacksonville has one of the highest foreclosure rates in the nation. We need to help educate listeners on how to manage their money and prepare for the unexpected.
- c. Gas prices are higher than they've been in a long time and people need information on how they can conserve gas and get the biggest bang for their buck.
- d. Highlight programs that help people struggling financially to avoid foreclosure and bankruptcy
- e. Many homeowners in Jacksonville are underwater on their mortgages and need information on how to improve their financial situation so they will be able to keep their home.
- f. Have on-air discussions about the connection between personal financial problems and higher crime and divorce rates in Jacksonville.

4. Health and Well Being

- a. Encourage more exercise and alert listeners to current health problems in the community.
- b. Educate listeners on proper nutrition and how eating right can improve their quality of life.
- c. Support a bill moving through the state legislature requiring schools to open the gates to their playgrounds after school to encourage exercise and promote healthy lifestyles.

- d. Talk to School leaders about improving the nutritional value of school lunches so that students can fuel their bodies with quality foods with vital vitamins that can help motivate students to want to learn more.
- e. Do reports about how some after school programs like PAL are facing major funding cuts and how the programs can help guide children down the right path.

5. Fiscal Responsibility in Government & Downtown Development

- a. Educate community on how their tax dollars are being spent so they can decide if it's the best use of their money.
- b. Hold local lawmakers accountable for their decisions to use incentives to attract new businesses and jobs especially in parts of town like north Jacksonville and downtown.
- c. Expose money pit projects that take funding away from other more important areas of concern.
- d. Talk about how a thriving downtown is essential to building up the tax base. It accounts for 17% of total city revenue.
- e. Keep listeners informed as to the plight of the homeless and how it affects downtown development.
- f. Outline traffic and road projects that now in progress, how much they cost and who will benefit.

CRIME AND PUBLIC SAFETY

First Coast Forum

Topic: Crime

Guest: Ken Jefferson – Retired JSO/now serving as crime analyst for WJXT.

Duration: 28 minutes

The main topic of the interview was to learn more about public safety in Jacksonville; what kind of crimes are on the rise and what people can do to protect themselves.

Ascertainments show that pedestrian accidents are on the rise. Ken suggests that people should pay closer attention when crossing busy intersections, utilize all crosswalks and crossing lights. Drivers, of course, should also pay attention in areas where pedestrians may cross. Texting and/or talking on the phone are also issues with driver distractions. Rising numbers in theft can also be a problem in the coming summer months and kids being out of school and bored. Ken suggests making sure you are cautious of your children’s friends. Don’t let kids you don’t know well in your home if you’re not home to supervise. Home burglary can happen so easily that way. Also, simple things like remembering to lock your car doors and putting valuables in the trunk or out of clear view will help deter a would-be thief from an easy snatch. We also discussed the drug problems in the area and what’s being done to control that.

Leslie Goller is a local attorney with the Terrell Hogan Law Firm. She is taking part in a major campaign to bring about awareness of the dangers of distracted driving. Goller is working with Jacksonville area High Schools to show students videos and take questions in meetings throughout the district. She says texting and driving is the most deadly form of distracted drivers and too often their law firm gets hired to pursue cases against distracted drivers that led to deaths on local roadways. She says taking your eyes off the road for texting, talking on the phone or even changing radio stations can be a deadly mistake. Her law firm is pushing to get support for new tougher laws banning distracted driving in Florida. She says our state is one of only a few that doesn't have strict laws on the books to hold distracted driver's accountable for their actions.

He says parents need to talk with their children and make sure they know who they are talking to over the internet, because he says sexual predators target children and too many times kids unwittingly give out too much personal information on various social networking websites.

Steinbach also talked about terrorism and what listeners can do to help them keep our community and our country safe from terrorists.

June first marked the start of the 2012 Atlantic Hurricane season and even before the season started Jacksonville got hit by Tropical Storm Beryl causing 400 thousand power outages, downed trees and so much damage to the Mathews Bridge that it had to be shut down for several days. WOKV's Roxy Tyler and the news team put together a special program to help listeners plan for possible evacuations, make sure they have a disaster preparedness kit and how to best monitor weather conditions so they can keep themselves and their family safe. This special program offered a wealth of advice from experts including the emergency operations director, home inspectors, tree surgeons and weather forecasters.

He says Tropical Storm Debby was a record breaker because she caused so much wide spread damage from flooding. Also because it was the first time ever we had such a busy start to our Hurricane season. Beryl also developed even before the season started. But Leetro says that doesn't necessarily mean we will have more hurricanes this season than last. He says there were several other factors that caused Tropical Storm Debby to remain stationary for so long which in turn caused most of the flooding here on the First Coast. Leetro says it's a good practice run for the season and now we all have even more reason to make sure we have our hurricane supplies ready because you never know when the next storm will develop and possibly threaten our area.

The Jacksonville Public Education Fund is a new organization. They're independent and nonprofit, dedicated to improving Duval Public Schools to help local students graduate college and career ready. They approach it by connecting research with civic voices, by conducting data and policy analysis, as well as engaging the community and advocating for best practices. Tutwiler says this is her passion because she's a Jacksonville native and teacher. She's also a mother with a child in the Duval school system, so she has a big interest in doing things for the best interest of Jacksonville kids. She has firsthand knowledge about education and believes it's an interesting time for Florida schools. She says there are a variety of things that are worrisome for local teachers, and people are working to make sure that local kids have the best outcomes – even if it means the teacher throws themselves into their work wholeheartedly. Trapp is also interested because she wants to be a teacher in the future and believes that education is power. Tutwiler has seen some alarming statistics, saying they move forward with their one-in-three let's solve our drop out crisis program, saying that one out of every three students that enters school as a ninth grader does not graduate. They also hear concerns from parents and students, who want to be set-up for success. Jacksonville Public Education Fund fills the gap by acting as a high power education fund to empower people to be advocates on behalf of Duval schools. They bring recommendations about the best practices for our schools to Duval and play a part in helping fulfill those needs. They do data and policy work to compile real-time information to give to various stakeholders, including their latest report about de-mystifying school funding. Their next area of work is advocacy and investment, where they identify causes to advocate and work to find the dollars they need to invest in those projects. Their other sector is community mobilization, to mobilize stakeholders and help people realize their voice is important, after identifying the needs of the community. They also mobilize community leaders to be a part of those decisions that impact local schools. The most visible thing they do is their one-by-one program, where they ask the community to be a part of a visioning process for Duval Schools. So far, they've held about 70 meetings.

Ed Pratt Dannals is the Superintendent for Duval County Schools. He says the standardized tests that the state uses to measure what students are learning has gotten much harder this year but still there are more schools in the county with passing grades. Dannals says he's leaving at the end of the year but will stay on with the District until his replacement is in place. Dannals says he's concerned that the quality of education may suffer in the years to come due to a class size limit that would require the school district to hire more teachers and offer students fewer choices when classes are too full to accept more students. He says State lawmakers need to step in and be realistic when it comes to class size and there's a chance the class size amendment or at least part of it could be repealed by the same voters who approved it several years ago. The issue will be coming up at the next legislative session in Tallahassee.

Dr. Harmon began our conversation with a breakdown of the recently released *county health rankings*. He discussed the reasons Duval County was ranked 44th out of 67 counties in Florida, and what we can do to improve those numbers. He stressed the importance of living a healthy lifestyle by incorporating regular exercise and eating a balanced, healthy diet. Food deserts, a term Dr. Harmon used to describe areas of town sans grocery stores or markets, are a large reason for the county's poor rankings. Residents in these areas have many fast food restaurants, but few healthy food choices. Price of healthy foods is also an issue. Despite the challenges, a healthy lifestyle still comes down to personal choices. Dr. Harmon also discussed the disturbingly high statistic of accidents and injuries among young people.

Ascertainments show that living a healthy lifestyle with diet & exercise can reduce the risk of many diseases. Individual responsibility and personal choices play the biggest role.

Dr. David Miller is the Stroke Director at the Mayo Clinic Comprehensive Stroke Center. He says they are offering free stroke risk assessments and screenings coming up on April 28th. He says stroke is the leading cause of death and disability in the U.S. and talked about the need to know the symptoms so you can respond quickly and get the person affected emergency medical attention as soon as possible. Miller says there are two types of strokes. One is when a blood clot blocks the flow of blood to your brain. The other is when a blood clot bursts and causes what many call a wet stroke. Dr. Miller says there are several new treatments that can save the lives of many who suffer strokes, but the key is keeping them to the E.R. as soon as possible. Miller talked about all the symptoms and outlined how you can determine your risk factor.

Dr. Kevin Kaplan is a surgeon at the Jacksonville Orthopedic Institute who also serves as the President of the Arthritis Foundation. He says 300 thousand people suffer from arthritis and the most common type is called osteoarthritis. Dr. Kaplan says most people will not need surgery for it, but there are cases when it's the only option to relieve pain and improve movement. Dr. Kaplan says in most cases the surgery works well to improve a patients' quality of life by restoring motion and allowing them to care for themselves and others. The Arthritis Foundation is hosting a fundraising walk in Jacksonville and Kaplan talked about how listeners can take part.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about health problems like arthritis and want to hear about the latest treatments and symptoms so they can best take charge of their own health.
