Duval County Circuit Judge Henry Davis oversees numerous juvenile delinquency cases. Judge Davis feels Duval County schools are incapable of protecting students who want to go to school and learn.

He says things haven't changed for the better as he continues to see children come into the courtroom dealing with the same problems over and over again. Judge Davis says we're losing too many good teachers because of the behaviors of some students. He says we're at the point that everyone needs to realize that the teachers cannot educate children in this type of environment where they're constantly fighting with each other. Judge Davis believes that education is simply not part of everyone's culture. We cannot let those who are not interested in graduating prevent those who are interested in graduating.

Ted Carter is the Director and CEO of Jacksonville's Office of Economic Development. He says this city is certainly ready to welcome the One Spark participants. He has been in planning meetings for the last several months with JSO, the fire department, the Special Events office and the One Spark team to anticipate and plan for the event. The event will now be even more accessible than last year as they have shrunk the event in terms of radius. By doing so you give people more access to the creative zones. Ted says Jacksonville has a growing and emerging small business and entrepreneurship culture. He says the team at One Spark really sees this city as their home port.

He says DCF gets 30,000 abuse and neglect cases in this region a year. The skate ramp situation is an ongoing investigation. They interview all parties including child, parents, neighbors, and teachers. They have 60 days to complete investigation. He says if anyone sees abuse you should call and report it.

The next guest is Michael Binder of the UNF Political Science department. The Quinnipiac poll results show Rick Scott is trailing Charlie Crist. He says any time you're an incumbent governor and your approval ratings are below 50% you have to worry. He says people in the state of Florida are electing people who will make decisions for the next four years. Michael said that Rick Scott had problems with the ability to connect with his electorate.

Ascertainments show that local citizens are very concerned with the prevalence of child abuse. Also, the results of polls give insight into the state's governor race.

Pastor John Guns and former police officer Ken Jefferson serve as chair and vice chair of an anticrime group called "Save our Sons". It's designed to help prevent black on black crime and specifically targets young African American males. They want to show them good role models and help prevent young teenage boys from getting mixed up in the wrong crowd and not realizing their own potential. The group counsels these young men, holds several events, and hopes to serve as role models in our community.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about the high rate of crime especially involving young African American males as well as black on black crime.

News Stories

A teen shot in the head while riding his bike has died from his injuries. The shooting happened a week ago in Northwest Jacksonville on 27th and Fairfax. The Jacksonville Sheriff's office says no arrests have been made in the shooting death of 18-year-old Darryl Arnold.

Rayne Perrywinkle was in court Tuesday for a custody hearing after being Baker Acted over the weekend. Two of her children were removed from her custody following the murder of her daughter 8-year-old Cherish Perrywinkle. Aaron Pearson, Perrywinkle's ex-fiance was also in court and confessed his drug use to a judge. He told our partner Action News he's cleaning up his drug habit to get his kids back. The state requested reduced visitation by both parents.

A tragic end to a hours long SWAT standoff in the Mayport area. Police were called to Darlene Drive... just off Mayport and Wonderwood after a woman is apparently beaten by her husband.. something neighbors tell our partner Action News they're used to seeing. Police obtained a warrant to arrest the suspect and approached the home. Melissa Bujeda with JSO says SWAT later entered the home and found the suspect dead of an apparent suicide. Surrounding homes were evacuated for hours during the investigation and two local schools temporarily placed on lockdown because of the police presence

The couple accused of using a westside home to grow marijuana was denied bond today. Melissa Dorta and Zeydel Curbelo made a first appearance in court today. Police say the pair was renting a home from a Navy family to run a growhouse.

Police are investigating a drive-by shooting in Northwest Jacksonville that sent a teenager to the hospital. JSO tells us it happened just before 3pm near MLK parkway and Pearce Street. Officers say someone driving a white car fired three shots at the 16-year-old striking him in the hand and calf. He's expected to make a full recovery.

A Jacksonville police officer was hit by a car and thrown 50 feet on eighth and Laura street. JSO tells us the officer was responding to a narcotics suspect who took off when he was struck by an oncoming car. The officer is expected to be okay, the suspect is in police custody.

Christ Catelli says many boating accidents can be prevented just by people taking a safety course before they go out on the water. You need to be prepared for any type of emergency out in the water. 73% of people involved in an accident had never taken a boating safety course. We encourage people not be to under the influence while boating. Pamphlets can also be picked up at the sheriff's office which gives you a lot of handy information. Make sure you have a VHF radio on the boat which can be used in an emergency. You need to know where the safety gear is stored and how it's used. Evening hours are when many boating accidents happen. Operation Dry Water happens June 27-29th. This is an event where they specifically target boating under the influence cases.

Ascertainments show many people are concerned about the dangers of careless boating especially during the Summer.

News Stories

We've just learned a woman struck by a train in downtown St. Augustine told police she was on the tracks taking photographs of the train. St Johns County fire and rescue tells us the call came in around 2pm. It happened on Palmer Street. Amazingly, 33-year-old Sonnie Lee Smith only suffered cuts....she was flown to the hospital in serious condition.

A Southside homeowner is OK--but his house is not. New this morning--firefighters investigating what caused a house fire on Bowden Circle.

We're told the man was asleep at the time--he got out OK. His wife is out of town.

A rough day for one St Johns County school bus driver who could now face charges stemming from a crash. We're told the bus rear ended a car which then hit another on 4 mile road at Kenton Marrison road. A total of five people involved... although no major injuries have been reported.

We're following a crash on the Matthews Bridge taht we're told involves a JTA bus. Sgt. Dylan Bryan with Florida Highway Patrol confirming that JSO is working a bus crash eastbound on the Matthews Bridge. We've had no indication of any injuries and we've reached out to law enforcement and JTA to find out more.

Jacksonville Fire & Rescue are investigating the cause of a mobile home fire that killed four people. The fire started last night on Palmetto street on the Northside. Three children under the age of five were killed along with a grandmother. The cause of the fire is under investigation.

A South Florida family is suing a host of pool companies over the electrocution of their 7-year-old son . He died while swimming in their pool. Calder Sloan was killed April 13 when a pool light overheated, causing the wiring to fail and send electrical currents through the water.

Tony Allegretti is the new Executive Director of the Cultural Council of Greater Jacksonville. He said he loves downtown and he is also the co-owner of a business in the downtown area for almost 10

years. He thought that the One Spark event was a brilliant idea and the fact that over 250k people were downtown without incident and very few issues was impressive. He said he only sees good things for the future of the downtown area. He said his team is working with retailers so they can move into the area. Tony also said one of the biggest things downtown Jacksonville needs is more residential areas.

Ryan Backman was also featured. He is a local advocate with Compassionate Families. His father was murdered in Jacksonville back in 2009 and it is still unsolved. He met with lawmakers in Washington DC this week as he would like to see a nationwide database that hold information on unsolved murders. Right now, Ryan says there is no place to get a hard number on how many unsolved murders there are. He said that Colorado passed a law back in 2007, the cold case initiative. This created a taskforce that would reinvestigate old cold cases and a database where unsolved murders would be listed. His goal is to get the nationwide database going.

City Councilman Matt Schellenberg says the administration got ahead of themselves by spending more than \$300,000 on two water taxis without city council approval. They weren't prepared as they should have been. City council was not involved in the discussions with about the water taxi issues. He says there is a problem with communications between the mayor's

office and city council and this is where most of the issues arise. Local businessman Harry Frisch has stepped up to purchase the two boats that the city bought that they no longer want. Former U.N. Ambassador Nancy Soderberg says what's happened in Iraq is tragic. She says unless we act Iraq will be home to the next terrorist who will threaten us. She states that we can't stay there forever but we need to finish up. She says you need a leader in Iraq who will work with us in repelling the extremists.

Ascertainments suggest that the citizens of Jacksonville have an interest in what will happen with the water taxis that they used on the river. Also, the situation in Iraq is of great concern with the people of Jacksonville.

News Stories

One-point-six Billion dollars of Jacksonville's pension liability is not funded. It's the single biggest obstacle facing long term reform. Jacksonville Mayor Alvin Brown tells us the city is looking at ways to generate money for the bill... but one option is out...He says the city is looking at ways to get a reform plan back on the table as soon as possible... ongoing litigation would mean a plan is more than a year down the road.

You're spending more money to protect the Governor and other notable politicians than any time in the past eight years. A new report shows Florida tax payers spent more than 2-and-a-half million dollars on security between July 2012 and June 2013. The increase largely blamed on the protection needed for Republican governors who attended the Republican National Convention in Tampa... although Governor Rick Scott and his wife got the largest portion of that... with round-the-clock protection

It looks like the improvements at EverBank Field are not only moving on schedule... but being embraced by fans. We've confirmed that ALL of the new North end cabanas, including those with pool access, have sold out for the entire season

Florida is expected to receive a substantial share of a national settlement to resolve allegations that SunTrust underwrote and provided faulty mortgage loans. SunTrust has agreed to pay nearly \$1 billion. As much as \$220 million could come in to Florida. The three-year settlement provides direct payments to Florida borrowers for past foreclosure abuses, loan modifications and other relief for borrowers. The Attorney General's Office thinks more than 8,000 homeowners who lost their homes to foreclosure from 2008 to 2013 will be eligible for a payment.

What you may call the hurricane tax--is ending next year. Florida is ending the charge on insurance bills that has been used to pay off claims related to Hurricane Wilma. It will no longer appear on policies renewed or issued on or after Jan. 1, 2015.

Lynnsey Gardner is joined by Division Chief of Operations with the Jacksonville Fire and Rescue Department Kurt Wilson. Kurt says that around 2004 there was a study that identified all the chemicals that were found in house fires. He was shocked to find out how many chemicals were present in house fires. He says it was a wake up moment for him; it was shocking. There are dozens of chemicals in house fires that cause cancer in humans. Kurt started a class called Surviving Your Career. They taught the class throughout the state of Florida as well as other states. 1,500 Jacksonville firefighters have gone through the course. The course is teaching firefights better processes for fighting fires. A process called Overhaul, which is when firefighters go into a structure once the flames are out, and they knock out the walls and attics, that's when the chemicals danger. Once the fire is out you go cool down and take the heavy gear off. This process is called Rehab. They've now changed how they manage the second part of the fire. Now for the second part of the fire they're sending in fresh firemen, people who weren't part of the fire fight, people who can wear their gear and thereby protecting themselves from the cancer causing chemicals.

Paige Kelson spoke with Dr. Kelli Wells, Director for the Florida Department of Health's Duval County Office. She believes disease spread because we don't do everything we can to be precautionary mentions. MERS(Middle East Respiratory Syndrone) spreads via respiratory droplets. When you cough or sneeze, it enters the air and can be inhaled or by touching those surfaces without washing your hands you can be infected if you touch your mouth nose or eyes. It requires prolonged, close contact. Dr. Wells says we all need to be aware. She wants to revisit our basic control measures and preventions measure for all communicable diseases.

Ascertainments suggest that the citizens of Jacksonville are concerned about the welfare of its local fire department. Also, the outbreak of a communicable disease so close to this city is of interest.
