CODY MAY LOSE ITS V-F-W HALL. MEMBERS HAVE PUT UP THE BUILDING FOR SALE OR LEASE. THEY'RE JUST NOT BRINGING IN THE MEMBERS CONTRIBUTIONS THEY USED TO GET. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS ON THEIR EFFORTS TO SAVE THE GATHERING PLACE. (CG: January, 2014) (Nats) This is the VFW Post 2673 Honor Guard. They perform military honors at veteran's funerals for free.(nats) They're also holding a benefit barbeque and skeet and trap shoot to pay for a wounded veteran's home. (CG: Bill Buntyn, Sr. Vice Commander VFW Post 2673) :22 "We're helping and raising money to pay off their house that the association is building." When a vet comes to town without a dime..."We'll go ahead and help him right out of our own pocket." But, the VFW Post that gives to others is having financial problems of its own. To make ends meet, they've put the building up for sale, or lease. The older active members are leaving..."A lot of those have passed away. And the younger ones, they're coming back from the Afghanistan war, they're coming back from the Iraqi war. They're having difficulties trying to make a living for their families." Sr. Vice Commander Bill Buntyn says the large building is paid for. (CG: Penny Preston) 1:06 "This is a gathering place for veterans, but not only for veterans." (nats) It's used by outside groups, like the Park County Republican Party, for gatherings. Buntyn says this part of the hall could be leased to a business. In the meantime, they're trying to raise money. "Wednesday, May 14th, the Honor Guard is buying all the food to have a barbeque here at the post, and it's open to the public." They're also hoping just a little more participation can save the building. Buntyn says if members would just spend five dollars a week at the post, they can keep it. "We want to stay here." DESCRIPTION: NOVEMBER'S ONE CENT TAX VOTE

CASPER COUNCILMAN KEITH GOODENOUGH SPOKE WITH NEWS 13 AND SAYS SOME VOTERS HE HAS HEARD FROM PLAN TO TAKE OUT THEIR FRUSTRATIONS WITH CITY COUNCIL ON NOVEMBER'S ONE CENT TAX VOTE. CASPER MAYOR PAUL MEYER SAYS HE IS CONFIDENT VOTERS WILL APPROVE THE ONE CENT TAX, BUT OTHERS IN CITY HALL ARE GETTING NERVOUS AS THE VOTE NEARS. "They see the city and the county not being deserving of extra funds." NOVEMBER'S ONE CENT TAX VOTE COULD BE IN JEOPARDY IF CITY RESIDENTS DECIDE CITY COUNCIL IS NOT FOCUSING ON CITY BUSINESS... AND SOME CITY COUNCIL MEMBERS SAY FRUSTRATIONS IN THE COMMUNITY ARE BECOMING APPARENT. "People have said that voting no on the one cent is the result of discontent of government and government actions, local government actions, so for example if people are irritated with the city manager and don't agree with some of his approaches they can't vote the city manager out because he is not an elected official." BUT GOODENOUGH SAYS THEY CAN VOTE NO ON THE ONE CENT TAX. "A no vote would cause significant, substantial alterations to the operation of the city." "I'd think we see cut backs in most of the recreation venues, the hours they are open and the employees they have. I think we would probably have to there is almost no doubt we'd have to increase sewer and water rates substantially." PATTERSON SAYS MANY OF THESE CUTS WOULD BE SEEN IMMEDIATELY IF A NO VOTE WINS OUT ON ELECTION DAY... MAYOR MEYER THINKS THE CITY COULD RUN EFFECTIVELY FOR ABOUT A YEAR.. BUT SMALLER



MUNICIPALITIES WOULD TAKE A TREMENDOUS HIT. "We do have a fairly substantial, as a matter of fact we have reserves that almost every city in the country would envy to have." "I'm nervous in the sense that we want to make sure that we follow the same pattern and same program that we used last year." GOODENOUGH IS SURE THAT AS CITY COUNCIL CONTINUES TO HAVE AN ISSUE WITH THE HEDQUIST SITUATION TURMOIL IN THE COMMUNITY WILL CONTINUE TO BUILD. "I believe that comes out when people go and have a choice whether to go raise taxes or not." GOODENOUGH SAYS HE THINKS VOTERS WANT TO SPEND ONE CENT MONEY ON REQUIRED PROJECTS RATHER THAN OPTIONAL PROJECTS SUCH AS HOGADON. MAYOR MEYER AND CITY MANAGER JOHN PATTERSON BOTH SAY THIS TAX HAS CHANGED THE CITY TO WHAT IT HAS BECOME OVER THE LAST FORTY YEARS AND THAT MUCH OF THE FUNDS ARE DRAWN FROM VISITORS TO THE AREA.

WITH SCHOOL OUT AND KIDS HANGING OUT AT HOME MANY FAMILIES ARE GEARING UP FOR LONGER VACATIONS THIS YEAR AND SOME STUDIES SAY THEY WILL SPEND MORE THAN LAST YEAR.

"The number of people who are traveling continues to increase, but that is to be expected with the growth in the population of Casper and Natrona County, and the central part of the state." THE BEST WESTERN RAMKOTA'S SPOKESPERSON SAYS WITH THE ECONOMY REBOUNDED, MORE FAMILIES ARE TAKING TRIPS. A SURVEY BY AMERICAN EXPRESS SHOWS PEOPLE WILL SPEND MORE THAN 12-HUNDRED DOLLARS PER PERSON THIS SUMMER ON GETAWAYS. "People have realized it's more important to take a vacation than not to." BUT IT SEEMS THESE VACATIONS CONTINUE TO GET MORE EXPENSIVE EACH YEAR, AND WITH 30-PERCENT OF AIRLINE TICKETS ALREADY SOLD FROM NOW UNTIL LABOR DAY, DON'T EXPECT THOSE PRICES TO GO ANY LOWER. STAND UP "If you want to save money before showing up at the airport a CheapoAir study suggests buying your tickets 55 days on average before your flight departs. You can also save money in your pocketbook by leaving on a Tuesday or a Wednesday." "The more people travel relative to the number of seats available the price goes up; the deeply discounted seats are the first ones to go." AND ONCE YOU GET TO YOUR DESTINATION, YOU'RE LIKELY TO SPEND MORE FOR A HOTEL ROOM. THE AVERAGE HOTEL RATE THIS YEAR HAS GONE UP FIVE PERCENT, A NIGHTLY AVERAGE HOTEL COSTING 115 DOLLARS. "Hotel rates are climbing all over the United States. We are not like New York at 500 dollars a night, but I would say the average in Casper in the summertime will be around 119." PENTON-JONES SAYS THE RAMKOTA IS PREPARING FOR A RECORD SUMMER. SHE SAYS MANY WYOMINGITES ARE CHOOSING TO TRAVEL WITHIN THE STATE AND VACATION LOCALLY. JANUSKA SAYS THE AIRPORT HAD JUST OVER FOUR-THOUSAND PEOPLE TRAVELING TO LAS VEGAS BEFORE ALLEGIANT OFFERED FLIGHTS FROM CASPER TO LAS VEGAS AND NOW CLOSE TO 23-THOUSAND FLY TO LAS VEGAS YEARLY.

WOLF NUMBERS ARE UP. CATTLE LOSSES ARE DOWN. WYOMING GOVERNOR MATT MEAD POINTS TO THOSE STATISTICS AND SAYS WYOMING WOLF MANAGEMENT IS SUCCESSFUL, AND CONTENDS THERE IS NO NEED FOR WOLF PROTECTION UNDER THE ENDANGERED SPECIES ACT. PENNY PRESTON SPOKE WITH NORTHWEST WYOMING RANCHERS WHO AGREE. PACKAGE DURATION: 1:31(CG: Near Meeteetse) :03 Meeteetse is big cattle country. Ranchers here have had losses from wolf depredation for several years. The Meeteetse Museum features a rancher's perspective on wolves.(CG: Penny Preston, Reporting) :09 Joe Thomas manages the Turnell Cattle operation. He says wolves have killed about fifteen of his cows since reintroduction. He agrees with Governor Matt Mead's assessment that Wyoming's Game and Fish do a better job of managing wolves. (Full Screen CG: On the Phone: Joe Thomas, Manager Turnell Cattle Company "As soon as they know there's an issue, they'll be here.") :25 "I at least know who to go to and who to contact to get them here. And as soon as they know there's an issue, they'll be here." (nats) Wyoming has been trapping, collaring, and monitoring wolves for two years. That's how they determined the state's wolf population increased seven percent from 2012 to 2013, with 199 wolves. The state's large carnivore supervisor, Dan Thompson, says the science of wolf management is easy. (CG: Dan Thompson, WY G&F Large Carnivore Supervisor) :57 "Biologically, we can do a lot of great work to manage the species." Thompson says the social drama is harder. "There's so much different public sentiment when it comes to all large carnivores. Everybody has an opinion, but nobody has the same opinion, quite honestly." Wyoming management was delayed for years, because the federal government didn't like the state's dual listing. Between Cody and Meeteetse, for instance, Highway 120 is the dividing line. On the west, wolves are classified as trophy game, and hunted only in season. On the east side of the road, wolves are classified as predators that can be shot on sight year around. As to Wyoming's unique dual listing status....one former Meeteetse and Montana rancher, Ken Beers told us it works.Will the hunt quotas change, as it did last year? "I do expect some variations and quotas for next fall. But we don't know exactly yet since we're meeting with the regions and the administration. And then those will be made available to the public on May 1st. From Meeteetse, Penny Preston, News 13. THOMPSON SAYS SIX WOLVES WERE POACHED IN THE LAST TWO YEARS. This is what the Cliven Bundy's of the world want you to think that this is all their land. but most of it is out land. AND RANCHERS IN WYOMING, LIKE NEVADA, HAVE TO LEASE THAT LAND from the federal government FOR livestock GRAZING..."I'm the third generation, so we pay a lease on that BLM and they tell you how many livestock you're going to run up there and how many" **THOUGH THE LEASED FEDERAL AND STATE LAND IS STILL LAND THE PUBLIC CAN USE.** "we like that, the oil and gas industry, the



hunting public, they have the right to go out on public land." "If the sage grouse is listed that will have a detrimental effect on all land. Deeded land, weather we can have oil and gas development, weather we can run cattle out there." HE SAYS NO MATTER THE LAND, WYOMING HAS THE RIGHT TO HELP THE ITS CITIZENS "We outta drill on it, we outta find minerals on it to help our citizens. at the same time we outta have livestock on it to feed out citizens." MOST LAND ON THE EASTERN SIDE OF THE STATE WAS HOMESTEADED IN THE 1930'S BECAUSE IT WAS MUCH MORE FERTILE. BACK TO YOU TONY.

THE SITUATION AT THE BUDGE DRIVE HILL SIDE IS GETTING **WORSE...** AND NOW CREWS ARE **FORCED** TO STOP STABILIZATION EFFORTS BECAUSE OF **TOO** MUCH MOVEMENT. A GEOLOGIST SAYS THE HUNDRED-FOOT HILLSIDE IS UNLIKELY TO COLLAPSE AT ONCE BUT COULD START FALLING IN LARGE PIECES. A ROAD HAS BUCKLED.... AND SEVERAL HOMES AND BUSINESSES ARE THREATENED. THE LAND MOVEMENT HAS INCREASED ITS SPEED FROM AN INCH TO A FOOT PER DAY. PHIL CAMPBELL FROM OUR SISTER STATION K-P-V-I IN POCATELLO WAS AT THE SCENE TODAY... AND HE REPORTS A LOT OF PEOPLE JUST CAN'T LOOK AWAY FROM THE SLOWLY MOVING HILLSIDE. Whether it was standing on a park bench or watching from your car, the crowds grew throughout the day. Even our four legged friends were curious as evident by this herd of deer. "I woke up this morning and we were watching the live feed and then my phone rang and my buddy is like, 'Dude, we are watching that house break apart right now, get down here,'" said Jackson Resident, Josh Smith. But not everyone who was watching this came from another section of town. Taylor Currier was one of the evacuees. He spent the first three nights in a hotel and has since been given the all clear to return home. However because of the slide, he says he doesn't have running water or electricity. "This is kind of a big deal for the town," said Currier. "This new business is going to be taken out. Everyone wants to see this happen. Broadway could get shutdown. You never know. It's a big landslide." And it's that uncertainty that keeps people staring at the side of the mountain. "There definitely is an entertainment value to it," said Trish Ireland of Jackson Hole. "It's hard to not be entertained by watching what's going to happen next." Of course you don't have to drive to Jackson to watch this unfold. You can see it all by following a link on our website. (Nat) "Spectra Energy has a pipeline system that runs through Casper, and has storage facilities here in Casper as well." BECAUSE SPECTRA HAS OIL STORAGE AREAS UP RIVER, THEY WANT TO RESPOND RIGHT IF OIL EVER SPILLED INTO THE WATER. John Dalton, EPA - "the thesis of the exercise is that an oil spill has occurred up river on the north platte, the oil has escaped containment activities there, has entered into Casper creek and is now floating down the north platte river." THE DRILL SIMULATES CONTAINMENT PROCESSES THAT WOULD BE PUT IN PLACE ACCORDING TO E-P-A STANDARDS. John Dalton, EPA - "there are three boom sites being put up, this being the first of three, the boom will be put up to contain the oil spill and in the eventuality of such an oil spill, would contain it remove it and cart it away for disposal." Stand-up "These barriers behind go all the way across the river so if there ever was an oil spill, they would catch the oil that would be floating on top of the water." Dalton - "the boom is then reigned in and the oil is pumped off and siphoned into containment trucks." THE EPA, SPECTRA ENERGY, AND MORE THAN TWO DOZEN FEDERAL, STATE, COUNTY, CITY AND PRIVATE ORGANIZATIONS PARTICIPATE IN THE EXERCISE. West - "It's also very important to maintain relationships with the local first responders and we have employees that live and work here to, we want to protect the environment, we want to make sure we do this right and we operate our pipeline safely so this is very important to us." THE EXERCISE IS IN COMPLIANCE WITH REQUIREMENTS OF THE OIL POLLUTION ACT OF 1990 FOR SPILL-RESPONSE READINESS. BACK TO YOU LYDIA.

THANKS WENDI. SPECTRA ENERGY OFFICIALS SAY AN ACTUAL OIL SPILL IS UNLIKELY AND THEY HAVE NOT HAD ONE TO DATE.

PROMPTING THE QUESTION: COULD CASPER SEE SOME FLOODING IN THE NEAR FUTURE.... NEWS 13 FINDS OUT THE ANSWER. "NATS" (RIVER FLOWING) "There's still a lot of space in those reservoirs that will catch all that water that is coming down." STAND-UP: WYOMING IS COMING OFF ONE OF ITS WETTEST SPRINGS IN THE LAST FEW YEARS... CAUSING FLOODING ALONG PARTS OF THE NORTH PLATTE RIVER, BUT OFFICIALS SAY HERE IN CASPER THEY'RE NOT WORRIED. 'The past two years, 2012 and 2013, were such poor water years. It depleted the reservoirs, especially Seminoe and Pathfinder our two big buckets on the North Platte and there's a lot of capacity still in those reservoir.' "They extended the height of the spill way at pathfinder, which even increase the capacity even more. So at this time we're not concerned. BUT THE CITY IS ONLY ONE THUNDERSTORM OR SLOW-MOVING RAIN STORM AWAY FROM SEEING... A FLASH FLOOD. "With those slow moving ones with the ground so saturated up the mountain all that water is going to come off and it's going to come off on the burn scar, it's going to come off on all the creeks and drainages that go to the Platte." "NATS" RUNNING WATERMOUNTAIN SNOWPACK ALSO CAUSED A LOT OF RUN-OFF INTO WYOMING WATER WAYS ... CAUSING SOME RESERVOIRs TO ALREADY SPILL-OVER... "The reason Glendo is so full is because of all of the precipitation that we got in between Alcova and Glendo and Glendo was actually in the flood pool for a few weeks in may because there was so much that came down from those tributaries." IF WYOMING SEES ANOTHER SPRING NEXT YEAR LIKE IT DID THIS YEAR... IT COULD BE A DIFFERENT STORY. "Yes that's a possibility for next year, but hopefully just as in 2011 we were able to manage fairly well." AND IT ALL COULD DEPEND ON WHAT THE DEMAND FOR WATER IS... HUNDREDS OF MILES AWAY. "It'll depend on how much water they're going to need downstream in Nebraska and that with the irrigation with the farming communities down there to how much water that draws off to how much room is left at the end of the season to where they stop asking for water." WHILE LOOKING AT THE NORTH PLATTE RIVER YOU MAY SEE THAT FOR THIS TIME OF YEAR IT IS ACTUALLY LOW... BUT SMITH SAYS IT'S DOWN BECAUSE THE DEMAND FOR WATER IS LOW BECAUSE OF ALL OF THE PRECIPITATION.

WHICH IS WHY *WYOMING RURAL WATER SYSTEMS* IS LOOKING TO DEVELOP A NEW PROGRAM TO TEST ALL SURFACE AND GROUND WATER SOURCES IN THE STATE... IT WOULD NOT ONLY ALLOW COMMUNITIES TO IDENTIFY THEIR KEY WATER SOURCE, BUT ALSO POTENTIAL SOURCES OF CONTAMINATION. "Takes a complete inventory of your water, assess all the potential harm that can happen to it and address ways to mitigate the harm." "Certainly if we were able to get to a point where we had one catalog you could go to get it all, that would certainly be optimal." IT'S A LOT LIKE A CONTINGENCY PLAN FOR WYOMING... JUST IN CASE SOME TYPE OF



ACCIDENT WERE TO HAPPEN, CONTAMINATING ONE OF WYOMING'S WATER WAYS... THE STATE WOULD HAVE AN IDEA OF WHAT TO DO. "You pre-plan. It's like anything else you do in your homes. I have a snow shovel in my garage, it's not snowing, but I'm ready in the fall and the winter when it does. So I've pre-planned for that." *WYOMING RURAL WATER SYSTEMS* DOES DO SOURCE WATER PROTECTION PLANS FOR COMMUNITIES THROUGHOUT WYOMING... BUT IN ORDER TO DO A PROGRAM LIKE THIS, WHERE YOU'RE PUTTING TOGETHER A LIBRARY FOR THE WHOLE STATE...IT'S GOING TO TAKE SOME TIME. 'It's a massive undertaking to get 96 thousand square miles of information crammed into one place. So that's probably the only concern." AND THE DOCUMENTS WILL HAVE TO BE UPDATED EVERY FEW YEARS. "The local governments need to make local decisions that are right for them." "Were getting stuck, we either have to build something or find something to take it to." THE WYOMING DEPARTMENT OF ENVIRONMENTAL QUALITY'S PLAN CALLS FOR THE CLOSURE OF HALF OF THE STATES CURRENT LANDFILLS IN THE NEXT TEN YEARS. THE MEASURE IS NECESSARY TO PREVENT LEAKING INTO WATER SUPPLIES, BEGGING THE QUESTION: HOW WILL LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AFFORD THE FIXES? "When you have 99 communities in the state and 90 of those are the small communities that have annual budgets that are less than street projects that go on in some communities." SMALL COMMUNITIES IN THE STATE CAN'T AFFORD MODIFICATIONS TO THEIR LANDFILLS OR TO TRUCK TRASH AWAY, SO MANY SAY THE ONLY OPTION IS TO RAISE RATES TO PAY FOR A SOLUTION. "You may be paying 50 to 70 plus a month in garbage fees just to have the garbage taken away from your house." "In most communities rates were not established well enough to pay for the cost of capping their landfill." AND NOW THEY WILL HAVE TO ALSO PAY FOR THE COST OF TRANSFERRING THEIR TRASH, IF THEY CAN FIND A PLACE TO TAKE IT. SOME MAY EVEN HAVE ADDITIONAL ADDED COSTS TO CLEAN UP THEIR LEAKING LANDFILL. "One of the big solutions now is the regional approach, small communities getting together and sharing a regional landfill, but there are a lot of political hurdles to get through to do that." MATHEWS SAYS HE THINKS EVERYBODY AGREES THERE ARE PROBLEMS WITH LANDFILLS IN THE STATE, BUT ADDS NOT EVERYBODY AGREES WITH WHATS BEEN SAID ABOUT THEIR OWN CITY'S LANDFILL."Were moving the ball forward good things are happening, but they are not easy and that's why people are so concerned about how to do this." 21 FACILITIES HAVE BEEN DELEGATED AS PRIORITY PROJECTS. THE DEQ HAS OVER 20 MILLION DOLLARS AVAILABLE TO COVER UP TO 75 PERCENT OF THE TOTAL COSTS OF CAPPING LANDFILLS AND TRANSFERRING GARBAGE. CITIES SUCH AS WHEATLAND, LUSK, AND UPTON AMONG OTHERS COULD NOT MEET REQUIREMENTS BECAUSE OF A LACK OF GENERAL ACCOUNTING PRINCIPLES. THE WRECKAGE OF A SMALL PLANE CRASH IS FOUND NEAR YELLOWSTONE. BUT, RESCUE TEAMS HAVE NOT BEEN ABLE TO FIND THE PILOT 84 YEAR OLD ROBERT ZIMMERMAN OR HIS BROTHER, 86 YEAR OLD WARD ZIMMERMAN. THE MEN WERE TRYING TO FLY FROM CODY WYOMING TO TWIN FALLS IDAHO WHEN THEIR PLANE WENT DOWN. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS RESCUERS ARE RISKING THEIR OWN LIVES IN MOUNTAINOUS, AVALANCHE-PRONE AREAS TO FIND THE MEN. (CG: Courtesy Park County Sheriff's Office) :03 This is what a sixteen hour ground search found Sunday....deep snow, blizzard conditions, but no airplane. Park County deputy Lance Mathess. (CG: Lance Mathess, Park County Sheriff's Spokesman) :13 "The wind conditions were about fifty miles per hour yesterday. They were walking on top of snow with snowshoes anywhere from three to five feet deep." (CG: Shoshone National Forest, Near Yellowstone) :21 Searchers hiked in and out of the Kitty Creek drainage in the Shoshone National Forest. (CG: Penny Preston, Reporting) standup :26 "Yellowstone National Park is nine miles to the west. About four and a half miles up the mountain behind me is the last place the plane was tracked on radar." (nats) So, first thing Monday morning, a search and rescue helicopter flew to the site, and found where the plane had crashed. "It appeared to hit the side of a mountain, and it settled into a large ravine. Over this ravine is a large amount of snow in the shape of a cornice." (nats) That meant severe avalanche danger, which still exists in the snow covered mountains in northwest Wyoming. "And they performed a test on the snow itself, and determined that the avalanche danger was too great to drop down to the wreckage." So, the air National Guard sent a black hawk helicopter from Cheyenne to the Cody airport. "They have winching capabilities and we're going to see if it's going to be possible to winch rescue personnel down to the wreckage to at the very least determine the condition of the occupants."

Mathess says the guard tells him they will be able to lift their men out of danger if the avalanche releases during their rescue effort. THE ARTICLE LISTED A NUMBER OF THINGS THAT COULD CAUSE STRESS...FROM UNEMPLOYMENT TO POPULATION DENSITY....BUT LOCAL COUNSELORS ARE SAYING THERE'S MORE TO IT THAN WHAT WAS STUDIED. OUR TONY CEDRONE LOOKS INTO SOME OF THE MORE IMPORTANT FACTORS THAT CONTRIBUTE TO A STATE'S STRESS LEVEL. Crystal Balerio, Central Wyoming Counseling Center Counselor: "Saying that Wyoming is the least stressful state in the United States is very shocking actually because we are one of the highest ranked in suicide rates." COUNSELORS DISAGREE WITH THE SURVEY BECAUSE IT'S BASED ON FACTORS LIKE UNEMPLOYMENT RATINGS AND HEALTH INSURANCE POLICIES... AND THERE ARE OTHER THINGS THAT COME INTO PLAY THEY SAY WERE LEFT OUT OF THE STUDY. Paul Demple, Central Wyoming Counseling Center Clinical Director: "Obviously towards the top of the list is death of a child, death of a spouse, through divorces, getting a mortgage...even winning the lottery." WEATHER IS IMPORTANT WHEN DETERMINING THE STRESS LEVEL OF AN ENTIRE STATE... AND COUNSELORS SAY LIVING IN WYOMING CAN SOMETIMES BE TOUGH TO HANDLE IN THAT REGARD. Balerio: "It could go from extremely windy to snowing, to being sunny to being rainy. And with all of that, it's hard for us to cope with that." THE SURVEY NOTES POPULATION DENSITY AS A MAIN CONTRIBUTING FACTOR WHEN COMPARING THE STRESS LEVEL OF ONE STATE WITH ANOTHER... BUT COUNSELORS SAY THAT'S LIKE COMPARING APPLES TO ORANGES...Demple: "To say that somebody that lives in New York necessarily is, by default, more stressed than somebody who lives in Casper just wouldn't be accurate." AND TO REALLY FIND OUT WHAT'S CAUSING STRESS IN ANY GROUP OF PEOPLE... POPULATION SAMPLING WOULD BE MORE EFFECTIVE. Demple: "Actually go and measure within the population things that are stressful, you know, to those individuals and then rank it that way." DEMPLE SAYS THERE'S NO WAY TO AVOID FEELING STRESSED THROUGHOUT THE DAY... BUT LEARNING HOW TO MANAGE STRESSFUL SITUATIONS IS KEY. Demple: "Not do things to relieve stress such as using alcohol or drugs or those kind of things, but try to deal with them in a healthy way." TC NEWS 13 CASPER. COUNSELORS SAY IF STRESS IS SOMETHING THAT OVERWHELMS YOU THROUGHOUT THE DAY, SEEK IMMEDIATE HELP BEFORE IT CAN CAUSE HEALTH-RELATED ISSUES. PARK COUNTY WANTS REASSURANCE FROM THE FEDS THAT STATE EDUCATION LAWS WILL BE HONORED IN YELLOWSTONE. SO, THEY DELAYED A DECISION THAT WOULD ALLOW WYOMING TO PAY FOR YELLOWSTONE PARK CHILDREN'S EDUCATION. PENNY PRESTON REPORTS. At issue is 37 students, who live in Mammoth, Yellowstone. The Park used to pay Gardiner Montana's school district to educate them. But, the Department of the Interior now says it can't legally pay for students who live in a county that receives payment in lieu of taxes. Mammoth is in Park County, Wyoming which receives PILT money. Wyoming's constitution says the state must provide a school district, and educational funding for all children in the state. Park County's boundary board was asked to extend Powell's district boundaries to include Mammoth. Powell is ready. "We believe they're Park County kids, Wyoming kids, and we'd certainly welcome the opportunity to get them that education. "A lawyer representing the state said the funding would come from Wyoming, not Park County. "The federal government holds no right nor obligation to educating kids in Yellowstone National



Park."Mammoth parents spoke.(CG: Wade Vagias, Mammoth Parent) :58 "It is my daughter Brook's right to have an education, and to have that education provided by the state" But, Park County Attorney Bryan Skorik says Yellowstone was established before the state of Wyoming, and has...(CG: Bryan Skorik, Park County Attorney) 1:11 "In the year 1872, federal exclusive legislative jurisdiction." He's concerned Wyoming educational laws couldn't be enforced in the park. So, the county board delayed a decision, while Skorik plans to ask the governor to get what he calls jurisdictional relinquishment from the Department of the Interior. (CG: Penny Preston, Reporting) standup "They haven't scheduled the next meeting yet. They hope to have it by early June. From Cody, Penny Preston, News 13." AND ACCEPTING TO HEAR BOTH SIDES OF THE STORY THIS MONTH.. WAS A STEP MOST FELT WAS LONG OVERDUE. BUT MOST COUNCIL MEMBERS SAW THIS AS THE ONLY RESOLUTION THEY COULD GET ON THE ISSUE THAT'S DRAGGED ON SINCE LAST SEPTEMBER. COUNCILMEN GOODENOUGH AND SANDOVAL WERE THE TWO VOICES OF DISSENT -- MOSTLY TAKING ISSUE WITH THE IDEA OF REMOVING AN ELECTED OFFICIAL FROM OFFICE.. AND A GROUP OF CASPER CITIZENS VOICED THEIR DISAPPROVAL AS WELL. OTHERS WERE MORE SUPPORTIVE. HERE'S A GLIMPSE OF HOW THE DISCUSSION WENT TONIGHT. Don Ridgeway: people are tired of this, they want something done, and by God I think it's time we did it. Councilman Keith Goodenough: but I believe the city council leadership and the city staff did not adequately prepare for the arrival of Hurricane Hedquist. Pastor Craig Brandon: this is one of the strongest city governments I have seen in years, and I applaud you. Cindy Garving: this charade that has just continued to go on endlessly is ridiculous. "When you are raped by a fellow service officer it is like being raped by your brother and having your father or mother decide the case." SARAH PLUMMER, OR SEMPER SARAH, AS MANY KNOW HER, WAS THRUST INTO THE NATIONAL SPOTLIGHT JUST MONTHS AGO ADVOCATING FOR CHANGE IN THE U-S MILITARY'S HANDLING OF SEXUAL ASSAULTS, THE FIGHT WAS NARROWLY LOST ON CAPITOL HILL, BUT IT HASN'T STOPPED HER DRIVE TO MOTIVATE OUR NATIONS WOMEN WARRIORS. "I am taking a deep dive on feeding yourself mind, body, and spirit." PLUMMER, NOW A RECOGNIZED AUTHOR, SPEAKER, AND MOTIVATIONAL COACH HAS APPEARED ACROSS THE MEDIA SPECTRUM..AND SHE HOPES PART OF WHAT SHE IS DOING CONTINUES TO HOLD THESE DEFENSE COMMUNITY FLAWS IN THE FOREFRONT. "Really all we are asking for there are truly impartial, unbiased legal preceding, so just asking for the same rights that we have as normal citizens" AND SHE SAYS THE INJUSTICE IS NOT ONLY HAPPENING IN THE MILITARY, BUT ALSO ON COLLEGE CAMPUSES ACROSS THE COUNTRY. AND IT DOESN'T STOP THERE. PLUMMER WHO HAS BEEN DIAGNOSED WITH POST TRAUMATIC STRESS DISORDER HAS SEEN ALL THE DELAYS AND TACTICS WHICH V-A HOSPITALS ARE UNDER FIRE FOR RIGHT NOW. "I have had delay in care, I have been told to call back in a month to make an appointment and another month after that I would get it." AS HER TRAVELS CONTINUE TO TAKE HER ACROSS THE COUNTRY AND AROUND THE WORLD MOTIVATING WOMEN SOLDIERS, YOU CAN EXPECT HER TO CONTINUE SPEAKING OUT ABOUT WHAT SHE FEELS NEEDS TO CHANGE IN THIS COUNTRY, A COUNTRY WHICH SHE SAYS IS STRONGER BECAUSE OF OUR WOMEN WARRIORS. "You ultimately have the power to get beyond victimhood and move beyond just barely surviving to thriving and living a passionate life." PLUMMER SAYS SHE WILL CONTINUE TO ADVOCATE FOR CHANGES IN THE MILITARY AND EXPECTS MANY SENATORS ON CAPITOL HILL TO DO SO AS WELL.

A GEORGIA TRUCK DRIVER IS ACCUSED OF BEING AWAKE FOR MORE THAN 24 HOURS... WHICH RESULTED IN A COLLISION WITH ANOTHER VEHICLE THAT KILLED ONE AND INJURED FOUR OTHERS ON A NEW JERSEY TURN PIKE...IT'S BROUGHT TO LIGHT THE ISSUE ON TRUCK DRIVERS AND THE AMOUNT OF REST THEY MUST GET BEFORE STARTING THEIR DAY... WE LOOKED AT WHAT COMPANIES AND THE GOVERNMENT HAVE MANDATED."NATS" "A truck driver is a professional driver. He's been trained; He takes the exams that are necessary; He meets a medical physical every two years to make sure he is medically qualified to drive." AND THERE ARE LAWS IN PLACE TO MAKE SURE TRUCK DRIVERS ARE SAFE OUT ON THE ROAD... FEDERAL REGULATIONS STATE A DRIVER MUST REST AT LEAST TEN HOURS BEFORE HITTING THE ROAD AGAIN. "No more than 11 hours maximum driving time during the day and they are required to have ten hours off between shifts." "If they approach 70 hours in an 8 day period at some point they have to stop and take a complete rest. The federal government requirement, which is being discussed right now is a 34 hour rest break that includes two periods from 1 a.m. to 5 a.m." LAWS ALSO REQUIRE EVERY TRUCK DRIVER TRAVELING THROUGHOUT THE COUNTRY TO HAVE A LOG BOOK ON HAND... TRACKING THE AMOUNT OF TIME THEY'VE BEEN DRIVING AND THE AMOUNT OF REST THEY'VE BEEN GETTING. "It's a written book that they write the amount of time they're driving, the amount of time they're off duty, the amount of time they're loading and un-loading and taking rest brakes. Those are all captured on a daily 24 hour sheet." "If they went over their 11 hours driving time or had an out of service violation, they'd be out of service automatically for ten hours to reset the ten hour clock and then also get a 170 dollar ticket." ALTHOUGH, IT DOESN'T HAPPEN OFTEN, SOME DRIVERS MAY FEEL THE NEED TO FUDGE THEIR BOOKS TO GET TO THEIR LOCATION FASTER... BUT IT'S GETTING A LOT HARDER TO DO. "Our company has a GPS system in it so we can see what the truck is doing. So the paper logs have to match what the electronic logs show." AND THE HEAD OF THE FEDERAL MOTOR CARRIER SAFETY ADMINISTRATION HAS ALREADY GONE BEFORE THE UNITED STATES SENATE TO INTRODUCE A NEW TYPE OF TRACKING METHOD. "There is becoming a bigger push for electronic logging devices, ELDS, and in fact the federal motor carrier safety is in the process of making them mandatory for every truck to have an ELD in it." BOTH COHEE AND FOERTSCH (FUR-TSCH) SAY 70 PERCENT OF THE TIME WHEN AN 18-WHEELER IS INVOLVED IN A CRASH... IT'S THE PASSANGER CARS FAULT AND TROOPER KYTE AGREES AS HE SAYS MOST OF THE CRASHES HE'S RESPONDED TO IT'S THE MATTER OF THE TRUCK BEING IN THE WRONG PLACE AT THE WRONG TIME...

SCHOOL OFFICIALS SAY BEN'S CONDITION HAS IMPROVED BUT CANCER TREATMENT MEDICATIONS AND DOCTOR'S VISITS STILL HIT BEN AND HIS FAMILY HARD. RYAN: "Basically we've been doing is selling them for five bucks the cost was around a dollar fifty. All that profit is going to Ben. Hopefully we have a decent check for him." TWO AND A HALF YEARS AGO BEN WAS DIAGNOSED WITH A BRAIN TUMOR THAT ALTERED HIS ENTIRE LIFESTYLE. BEN: "That day changed my life forever. Here's the funny part though, I kind of self diagnosed it. I was getting all these headaches you know. I got on the computer one day and typed in headaches every single day. It came up with a brain tumor and I told my family and their like 'Oh stop it don't look up stuff'." THIS ISNT THE FIRST TIME NATRONA COUNTY HAS RAISED MONEY FOR BEN AND HIS FAMILY. RYAN: "We've sold t-shirts several times this year to try and support Ben and his fight against brain cancer. I'm wearing one today. I thought the t-shirt thing was kind of worn out. I thought, you see these we support the troops stickers all the time and magnets on peoples cars. I think that's a great way to get a message out." AND TREATMENTS IN DENVER AREN'T CHEAP. BEN: "The first time we went down Denver I didn't have any surgeries any chemo, nothing. It was about 22 grand. That was before insurance. My mom and dad have insurance but still it's outrageous." SOME ARE WORRIED THE MONEY RAISED ISNT ENOUGH TO HELP PAY FOR BENS TREATMENTS. RYAN: "This is the first time that I've tried to organize and do something like this. I think there's probably going to be some issues still. It's not going to go as well as I planned it maybe. Or maybe it will go better, I don't know." BEN IS STILL VERY ACTIVE MANAGING FOOTBALL, BASKETBALL, AND SOCCER. BEN: "I do bowl though. I love bowling. I'm so glad the coaches are willing to let me be a part of the teams still. I means a world to me. TEACHERS AND STAFF AT N-C HAVE SOLD ROUGHLY 35-HUNDRED DOLLARS WORTH OF MAGNETS. THE GROUP WILL CONTINUE TO SELL THE **BEN TOUGH** MAGNETS AT N-C-H-S SOCCER GAMES. THE LADIES OF BOSOM BUDDIES HAVE BEEN WORKING TO HELP BREAST CANCER SURVIVORS AROUND THE NATION. THE GROUP'S BEEN CREATING KNITTED *BREAST PROSTHETICS* FOR FIVE YEARS AND THEY HAVE EXPENDED THEIR SELECTIONS TO HELP ALL CANCER SURVIVORS. TYLER WEHR VISITED THE GROUP IN CASPER THIS EVENING. DIANE: "Our first thought was, we would find out how many women in Natrona County have had mastectomies in the previous year and we would knit that many pairs. That was our first challenge. It's just kind of gone from then." THE LADIES AT THE DANCING SHEEP IN DOWNTOWN CASPER WANT TO CREATE A CHEAPER ALTERNATIVE FOR CANCER SURVIVORS. LAUREN: "Breast cancer survivors have difficulty wearing the prescription prosthetics that they receive and they can be extremely expensive for people who don't have insurance." TYLER: "Bosom Buddies of Wyoming have been working on this project for the last five years and creating little bosoms that people struggling with breast cancer can use. But in the last year, they've seen an increased demand for what they're calling chemo caps. LAUREN: "We've knitted chemo caps for the children in Jason's Friends, associated with that group. Now we're also doing them for Hospice. So it has kind of been a pebble in the water that has truly rippled out." CREATING THE CAPS IS NOT JUST ANOTHER PROJECT FOR THE GROUP BUT AN ALTERNATIVE AID FOR ALL CANCER PATIENTS. LAUREN: "People's skin is sometimes sensitive when their undergoing chemotherapy. We said you don't need to buy it. We'll take care of it. What color do you want? We started knitting chemo caps." THEY ARE STILL A KNITTING GROUP, PASSING THE TIME WITH EXTRA



CRAFTS, WHILE THEY SEARCH FOR OTHERS TO HELP. LAUREN: "We keep a little bosom bank. We have a little store back there, and that's great, and that's not excessive. We always manage to find homes for them. If someone comes in the shop and their not sure what size they need. They have a whole bevy to choose from." TYLER WEHR NEWS 13 CASPER. IN THE LAST YEAR THE GROUP HAS KNITTED OVER ONE HUNDRED BOSOMS AND HAVE ACTIVE MEMBERS IN 21 STATES ACROSS THE NATION.

THE RESIDENT WHO FELL DURING THE EVACUATION ONLY SUFFERED MINOR INJURIES...MEANWHILE A FAMILY MEMBER OF THE PLUMBER WHO SUFFERED SECOND-DEGREE BURNS TELLS NEWS 13 HE IS RECOVERING IN COLORADO...AND IS BREATHING AND DRINKING WATER ON HIS OWN AS OF LAST NIGHT... BUT THIS COULD'VE BEEN A LOT WORSE FOR EVERYBODY INVOLVED. NATS :02

"PANDEMONIUM" THIS WAS THE SCENE FRIDAY SHORTLY AFTER THE GAS EXPLOSION AT MEADOW WIND ASSISTED LIVING. THE INCIDENT WAS CERTAINLY UNEXPECTED ... BUT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR ROB LEMPKA SAYS THEY WERE ALWAYS PREPARED FOR IT. Lempka, "We do fire drill on a monthly basis. Nobody likes them, but when it comes to something like this; everyone loves them." LEMPKA NORMALLY WORKS AT PARK PLACE, WHERE FIFTY OF THE MEADOW WIND RESIDENTS WERE RELOCATED... HE SAYS THE FACILITY WAS COMPLETELY EVACUATED IN JUST 10 MINUTES... THREE MINUTES *UNDER* THEIR TIME LIMIT. Lempka, "We did get the building evacuated so quickly." NOW THAT THE RESIDENTS HAVE ALL MOVED BACK IN TO MEADOW WINDS... LEMPKA SAYS A COUPLE OF THE RESIDENTS AREN'T IN THEIR NORMAL LIVING SPACES... AND THAT IS PRIORITY NUMBER ONE. Tammy Avey, "I haven't heard no negative feedback at all since I come back into work today. They've all been understanding and calm about it and really great actually." AVEY SAYS PART OF THIS IS THE COMMUNICATION BETWEEN THE STAFF AND RESIDENTS. Avey, "We kept them updated on every step that's going on here. "BUT RIGHT NOW... NOBODY KNOWS THE WHOLE STORY. Lempka, "We don't know what happened. It's all under investigation. We don't know the ignition source, we know there was gas in the room, and that's all we really know." NOW THE INJURED RESIDENT IS BACK IN THE CARE OF MEADOW WIND... AND THE BUILDING SUFFERED NO STRUCTURAL DAMAGE... BUT THEY CAN NOT MAKE CERTAIN REPAIRS UNTIL THE INVESTIGATION IS CLOSED...
