MOST SIGNIFICANT ISSUES - RESPONSIVE PROGRAMMING

ISSUE: LOCAL POLITICS

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIRS

July 2nd, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 7:26minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Oregon Governor Tina Kotek. Kotek reflected on the challenges of her first legislative session as governor. Oregon lawmakers ended their session in a hurry, racing through hundreds of bills, making decisions likely to affect critical issues, like homelessness and housing, fentanyl and opioid abuse, ranked choice voting and a new state child tax credit. Governor Tina Kotek says in regard to her top priority, now that the session's over, more of the hard work starts, putting hundreds of millions of dollars to work to solve housing and homelessness. She reflected on the challenges of her first legislative session as governor, especially with the republican and independent senate walkout: The governor also talked about investments in early education.

Guest: Dr. Maxine Dexter, Oregon State Representative, from Portland. Oregon's just ended legislative session, including big investments in housing and homelessness. And Oregon lawmakers say they heard about that concern more than any other, from voters. They include doctor and state representative Maxine Dexter. She ended up leading the house committee on homelessness and housing. She said the need was great, solutions varied, and the price tag was steep:The state representative from Portland also spoke about introducing and championing a bill, called the Opioid Harm Reduction Package, which passed with bi-partisan support and headed to the Governor's desk.

Guest: Dr. Lisa Reynolds, Oregon State Representative, from Washington County. Reynolds is the chief sponsor of Oregon's first ever child tax credit. She says in her work as a pediatrician, she sees how vulnerable children are, especially to the consequences of poverty, and hunger. The Oregon kids' credit will provide one thousand dollars per child, for working parents, to help them cover costs like rent, food, utilities, and child care. The Oregon Center for Public Policy expects about 55,000 children statewide and their families will benefit from this credit.

Guest: Kim McCarty, Director, Community Association of Tenants and Stable Homes for Oregon Families. McCarty is among advocates for the homeless who say there were some big wins this session. Stable homes for Oregon families is a group made up of 30 organizations including the Community Association of Tenants: McCarty points to the reinstatement of a pandemic era policy that will start right away, preventing many evictions. McCarty also says capping rent increases should help with the crisis: She talked about what this Oregon legislative session did when it came to keeping people housed: one of the biggest issues facing the state.

Guest: Jessica Maravilla, Policy Director, A.C.L.U. Oregon. Oregon lawmakers took on another tough issue: the state's lack of public defenders. It's a cascading chain of problems: not enough public defenders to represent criminal defendants, and then, cases getting dismissed, hurting both the accused and the crime victim. Maravilla describes lobbying efforts to fix this problem and solve the shortage of public defenders in Oregon.

Guest: Dr. Christopher McKnight Nichols, Political Historian, Professor and Author. Political historian and author Dr. Chris Nichols: follows Oregon politics, and points out some of the notable events of this year's legislative session. He points to the walkout by Senate republicans as a trend that could influence other states. He also talks about some of the ways that Oregon typically leads with new, innovative policies on issues like homelessness, early childhood education, and drug abuse.

Guest: Summer Sheyer, Skamania County Sheriff. Despite many difficult obstacles, an army of firefighters are making some headway on the Tunnel 5 Fire in Skamania County, as people remain under evacuation orders. For days people near the fire heard the sounds of planes dropping water, as flames snapped and crackled over more than 550 acres, destroying dozens of buildings and homes. In the Columbia River Gorge, more than 460 firefighters finally made progress by late this week, increasing containment to 20 percent for the blaze. But it's burning on steep terrain, threatening more homes, vineyards and power lines. Evacuation orders have shifted: increasing to the west, decreasing to the east.

Guest: Cody Accord, Operations Section Chief, Tunnel 5 Fire. As for what's happening on the front lines, Operations Section Chief Cody Accord, explains why it's such a difficult battle, for the fire fighting force which has now grown to more than 460 people, fighting this wildfire that's destroyed homes and forced people to evacuate from Skamania County. Hundreds of firefighters and emergency workers, were out trying to save a community and its environment, during what's normally time for 4th of July festivities and observances. And over the course of the week, they made remarkable progress, saving lives, and containing major parts of the fire.

Guest: Dr. Chris Nichols. This brief talk was about how Independence Day originated and developed into one of America's major holidays and observances. The resolution creating independence was actually passed on July 2nd, 1776. July 4th is the ratification date. After the war of 1812 is when the celebration became more regular and meaningful. The modern independence day as a federal holiday didn't happen until after World War II.

Guest: Olivia Bonsay, Stephens Creek Crossing resident. Olivia is a Portland mother of two children who lives in Stevens Creek Crossing, an affordable housing community with an on site child care and early education center. She describes how this opportunity to live in affordable housing that offers early education and childcare has changed her family's lives for the better and without it they risked falling into homelessness.

July 16th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 3:52 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Chris Chiacchierini, Executive Director, Neighborhood House. Chiacchierini, is the Executive Director of Neighborhood House, a non profit focused on child care and Head Start programs. He gives an overview of Stephens Creek Crossing. It's an affordable housing development that replaced 60 dilapidated apartments in southwest Portland. It offers 122 apartments, an 11,200 SF LEED Gold Opportunity Center, and a 7,200 SF Children's Center Head Start School. The Opportunity Center features management offices, public computers, a classroom, and a community room.

July 16th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 3:30 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Ivory Matthews, C.E.O. and Executive Director of Home Forward. Matthews is the C.E.O. and Executive Director of Home Forward, which is a public corporation which contracts with the federal government to administer housing programs. As she explains, it operates independently with a board of commissioners and provides services throughout Portland, Multnomah County and Gresham. She also confirms a link between a lack of affordable housing, a lack of child care, and the risk of homelessness for local families.

Guest: Oregon Congresswoman Suzanne Bonamici. Bonamici has introduced the Build Housing with Care Act, into the U.S. House. This piece of legislation would encourages the development of affordable housing connected with child care centers. The idea is to help working families access affordable housing and child care. The Act would invest \$500 million to construct child care centers in affordable housing buildings and cover the costs of retrofitting to help family child care providers operate in housing developments.

Guest: Oregon U.S. Senator Ron Wyden. On the Senate side, Oregon U.S. Senator Ron Wyden introduced legislation, which would give priority to projects that are located in child care deserts or rural communities, including qualified Head Start providers and providers primarily serving low-income children. Wyden, is the chair of the U.S. Senate Finance Committee, and he has introduced the Build Housing With Care Act into the U.S. Senate.

Guest: Andrea Bell, Director of Oregon Housing and Community Services. Bell, the Director of Oregon Housing and Community Services, expresses her support for both state and federal legislation that would co-locate affordable housing, with early childhood education and child care centers.

Guest: Nancy Grace, Veteran Prosecutor. The deaths of six women, whose bodies were found within months and miles of each other in the greater Portland area, have raised lots of questions, including: about whether they are linked. On July 17 we got confirmation from the Multnomah County District Attorney that a person of interest is linked to at least four of the women, Kristin Smith, Charity Perry, Bridget Webster and Ashley Real. They did not connect another woman whose body was found in Clark County, Washington, Joanna Speaks, or an unidentified woman whose body was also discovered, within the same area and time frame. This is the third time I have talked to Grace about these cases, and the first in which her initial theory that the cases are linked, was confirmed. She believes that a car is linked to the crimes as well.

Guest: Jarrett Farentino, Prosecutor. He explains why Jesse Lee Calhoun, a man with an extensive criminal history, who'd been let out of prison on early release due to COVID-10 and his work fighting wildfires, is being called a person of interest and not a suspect at this point and compares that to other cases. He compares it to other cases in which even when a person of interest confessed to killings, they still were not referred to as a suspect, to grant investigators more leeway in their strategy of solving a crime and bringing charges. He also notes that Calhoun is unlike serial killers he has prosecuted because Calhoun is out in the open as a career violent criminal who tried to choke and kill a police dog, and has a record of fighting and escaping from police.

Guest: Caryn Stark, Psychologist, Trauma and Crime Expert. She believes that a serial killer had practice on doing this and there are probably more bodies and evidence. She explains killers practice until they know what they're doing until they really get to know what they are doing.

July 23rd, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 7:55 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Sheryl McCollum, Crime Scene Investigator, Cold Case Investigative Research Institute Founder. She explains why she believes the person of interest and the women who are now dead in the Portland area, are likely linked via drugs, and that Calhoun had an extensive record of dealing drugs and addiction himself. She says it's imperative that every missing person's case in the time frame get a second look in case they are also related to this person and case.

July 23rd, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 3:35 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Dr. Todd Barr, Forensic Psychologist. He explains how forensic anthropologists can determine through clues on victim's bodies to identify the age and race of victims, how a radiological examination of the skeleton can help investigators determine a cause of death.

ISSUE: MEDICAL

July 30th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 17:35 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Dr. Dennis Crawford, Oregon Health and Science University. An Oregon Health & Science University doctor is among those celebrating the Food and Drug Administration's approval, of the first new treatment for knee arthritis, in half a century, and he was involved with the research to get it approved. It's the new MISHA knee arthritis device, and there are estimates that it could help millions of people. Dr. Dennis Crawford tells us it's a shock absorber for the knee, and has worked for his patients who are too young for a knee replacement surgery, but still want to remain active while living with arthritis. He's a professor of orthopaedics and rehabilitation in the O.H.S.U. School of Medicine.

ISSUE: ENVIRONMENT

July 30th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 7:45 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Jamie Peng, Oregon Environmental Council. Peng is a lawyer and lobbyist who has worked for several years on "Toxic Free" legislation in the state capitol in Salem. She explains her work on new laws that require more disclosure of toxic chemicals found in cosmetics, hair care products, and children's toys and clothing.

August 6th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 9:37 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: U.S. Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack. Vilsack, a member of President Biden's cabinet, says his heart goes out to the families in Oregon who've lost homes in the current four wildfires that are burning. Also he says his heart goes to the firefighters, and talked about increasing the availability of mental health counseling for them. He announced \$250 million dollars in Community Wildfire Defense Grants are open for bidding. He says in the last round of funding they gave out money for 134 firesheds across the country, including 18 in Oregon, which are the areas considered most at risk. He says the goal is speeding up the ability to work in forests. He says Oregon is a leader in finding ways to use the wood in construction projects, including one of the first in the nation in Oregon, a mass timber project at PDX airport. Also he says this helps the middle class with better jobs, tp be more competitive, rebuild infrastructure and build clean, sustainable economy, including in rural areas. Zip codes should not matter. The American Rescue plan, the bi-partisan infrastructure plan, and the Chips and Science Acts will help craft a new world economy. Farm economy had record income last year but who got the money? Mostly the top 150,000 of 2.5 million farms, but 87%didn't join in the prosperity, fifty percent lost money.

ISSUE: WEATHER / WILDFIRE

August 6th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 2:13 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Oregon Governor Tina Kotek. The Governor says Oregon saw its hottest day ever, drought is hurting farmers, and there's an urgency to rebuild the economy for resiliency. She says it will take a whole of government to reverse effects of climate change. Wildfire suppression, response, landscape resilience, building out home hardening and other efforts to help communities prepare. Readiness will take a statewide approach. Rural areas face the same challenges as urban areas but with fewer resources.

ISSUE: WILDFIRE / GRANTS

August 6th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 2:48 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Community Wildfire Defense Grants. The pain of these fires has etched into us in the last few years. He says we must up the ante in the fight to prevent fires. He mentioned the Agriculture Secretary talked about sustainable aviation fuels. Wyden says he wrote tax credits for fuels like it. In southern and central Oregon, there's no law that perfectly tells people to use common sense, and make sure people don't fly drones near where firefighters are working. There are tremendous opportunities, lots of help wanted signs in rural areas, paying better than firefighter jobs. He's working for a bump for firefighters' pay so they can support their families. He wants yo professionalize firefighters to be year round positions, because firefighting season is now year round. His first priority for this fall is getting firefighter pay increased.

Guest: U.S. Congresswoman Suzanne Bonamici. She says her district includes rural Tillamook and Clatsop Counties, rural areas. She's glad the focus of this meeting is on wildfires, after millions of acres were lost in previous years' Oregon wildfires. She saw berries that burned on the bush. In Congress she developed a climate action plan that was included in the Inflation Reduction Act with recommendations on reducing wildfire risk. Fish, filberts, fruit, wine, timber, are all part of the state's economy, past, present, and future.

August 6th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 11:33 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Sonia Kastner, C.E.O. and Founder, Pano A.I. She explains how artificial intelligence can be used to help detect wildfires. When bystanders call 911, only 1 in 20 calls are for actual wildfires. The technology she developed uses cameras that rotate constantly searching for whiffs of smoke. It is being used by Portland General Electric and several fire districts throughout Oregon. She visited the firehouse in Sandy where it is being used.

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 4:02 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Jon Epstein, Lost son to fentanyl overdose. The pain of losing a child. And in Oregon: in too many cases: it's linked to fentanyl. That's the issue that brought a member of the President's cabinet to Oregon. But first, we're going to hear from a father, Jon Epstein. The Beaverton dad and his wife Jennifer talked to a panel of local and federal leaders who focused on Beaverton Schools educating kids about the dangers of fentanyl, telling their story, their tragedy, of losing their son, Cal. He says Oregon is doing the right thing with promoting this educational effort.

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 5:30 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: She tells the story of how her son Cal came home from college and took a pill laced with fentanyl, which he mistakenly thought was an A.D.H.D. medication She describes finding Cal dead in the home, calling an ambulance, and how paramedics told her it's happened to many families in Oregon. She explains her family decided to turn the tragedy into a mission of educating other families and young people so it doesn't happen to them.

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 1:14 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Alexa Merriweather, Sunset High School Student. Merriweather, explains how she learned about the dangers of fentanyl through a Beaverton Schools project inspired by the tragedy of the Epstein family losing their son, Cal.

ISSUE: DRUGS / ADDICTION

KXL (FM) PUBLIC AFFAIR

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 8:15 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Dr. Todd Korthius, O.H.S.U. Dr. Korthius a Behavioral Health and Addictions Medicine Specialist, at Oregon Health and Science University. He offers his perspective on the impact of fentanyl in Oregon. He and his wife both work in addictions medicine and describe a spike in specifically young people seeking treatment for addiction to fentanyl and other opioids. He also notes how it has spiked as a leading cause of death for young people in Oregon, and seeks help from Secretary Becerra and other leaders, to address how to stop the trend of fentanyl taking lives.

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 4:07 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Xavier Becerra, U.S. Health and Human Services Secretary. Becerra, is a member of the President's cabinet who came to Oregon's Tumwater Middle School, to discuss the Beaverton School District's fake and fatal fentanyl awareness curriculum, created by Jon and Jennifer Epstein's advocacy after they lost their son Cal to fentanyl poisoning when he took a fake pill by mistake.

August 13th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 3:32 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: U.S. Congresswoman Suzanne Bonamici. Congresswoman Bonamici describes the Beaverton School District's Fake and Fatal Fentanyl awareness curriculum. She says this program was created with the help of Jon and Jennifer Epstein, who fought for it, after they lost their son Cal to fentanyl poisoning when he mistakenly took a fake pill. Congresswoman Bonamici says she will soon introduce legislation to support similar programming at schools across the country.

Guest: Kawika Kahoilua, Owner, Bamboo Grove Hawaiian Grill. Kahoilua is the owner of Bamboo Grove Hawaiian Grille, the primary Hawaiian food vendor at the Ankeny Aloha Luau that was planned for Portland this year to help improve conditions in Portland's Ankeny Alley area. But he changed that focus because he was born and raised in Maui, and he has family and friends that have lost everything in the wildfire and not all of them are accounted for at this time. Kawika reflects on his family ties in Maui and concerns about the future of the Polynesian/Hawaiian community.

August 20th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 8:21 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Joshua Ryan, Ankeny Alley Association Event Manager. Ryan, the Event Manager, with the Ankeny Alley Association, says when he planned the Ankeny Alley Festival in February he thought a Luau-themed, beach party event would be fun, especially in August. What they didn't expect were the wildfires in Maui where many of the people gathering for the celebration are from. So he says, rather than just talk about the festival and celebration, and getting people to return to Downtown Portland in the hope of saving small local businesses, they also put together a fundraiser for family and friends on Maui. He points out though it seems we live in a big world, events like this remind us how small, tight-knit and connected we are.

August 20th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 3:40 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Dana Dashawn, Pediatric Nurse Practitioner. She explains why this time of year it's important for children to have a back to school checkup with their doctors or nurse practitioners, to make sure they're up to date on immunizations and to check on their growth and development. She says this year flu and COVID immunizations will be essential for kids to return to class safely.

ISSUE: HEALTH / ALLERGIES

Guest: Dr. Kelly Cleary, Pediatrician. She is with a non profit called F.A.R.E. (Food Allergy Research & Education) that focuses on educating people about food allergies in children, and her own children have food allergies as well. She says 85 million Americans including young children, adolescents, and adults, live with or are impacted by food allergies and intolerances. She talks about a report from the CDC finding that 1 in 13 U.S. children deal with food allergies. She says as school starts again, it is imperative for parents to prepare and understand the best measures that can be taken to help their children and classmates handle food allergies. The number of life-threatening – or anaphylactic – reactions to food has skyrocketed in recent years, which has driven innovation and calls for greater access to life-saving treatments.

August 27th, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 28:50 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Oregon U.S. Senator Ron Wyden. This week, as lightning and thunder jolted our skies, they sparked red flag warnings that the storms could inject extra fuel in already dry and windy parts of Oregon and Washington, where fires are burning, and more are anticipated. Across the country, 75 wildfires burn on more than 625,000 acres, in 14 states. This week I had a chance to check in with Oregon's senior U.S. Senator for a one on one interview. We talked about the wildfires, the firefighters, and the environment. And we also got to some other top.ics like fentanyl, getting internet service for rural areas, prescription drug prices, and the shortage of A.D.H.D. and other medications. He talked about his work on legislation at the federal level on all of these issues.

ISSUE: WILDFIRE

September 3rd, 2023 7 am to 7:30 am 4:28 minutes of a 30 minute show

Guest: Isak Hamilton, Clackamas Fire District 1. In just one week, the Camp Creek Fire started with a lightning strike, torching centuries worth of dead and dry fuel in an area that hasn't had fire in more than five hundred years. It's burning mostly in Clackamas County, but is starting to reach Multnomah County. Hamilton says his department hopes they won't need to use them on the Camp Creek Fire, but they're getting ready just in case: bringing in sprinkler kits, water tanks, and making evacuation plans.

She, and O'Neill say the drought is likely to have a significant economic impact on the farm, ranch, recreation, tourism and natural resources sectors. Drought also impacts drinking water, fish and wildlife, and important flows for public use. O'Neill expects extreme conditions to affect local growers and livestock, increase the potential for wildfires, shorten the growing season, and decrease water supplies. Despite the robust snowpack last winter, 51% of Oregon is in some form of drought due to below-average water year precipitation, high evaporation, and lingering water deficits from the previous 3 years. Southeast and south-central Oregon saw drought recovery due to well-above-average snowpack, spring precipitation, and low levels of evaporation. Central Oregon saw only partial drought recovery. This region has been at the epicenter of the current long-term drought cycle. Severe drought developed in northwest Oregon due to very low spring precipitation and high levels of evaporation.

Drought conditions have grown more severe since June. May—August was warm; more locations are dry than wet. A warm May created a "run on the (snowpack) bank," leading to: low June/July/August streamflow, low soil moisture, low reservoir storage in drought regions; however, this has improved farther in southern/eastern portions of the Pacific Northwest.

He says their drinking water is impaired due to drought, rapidly growing communities including Bend nearby, and the use of water by agriculture. He describes the history of treaty rights granted to his ancestors including the right to fish in their watersheds.
