Health	4/7/19	17:00	54:01:00	Latino USA: Last year, a 65-year-old grandfather was attacked and fell onto the New York City subway tracks—which eventually led to his death. He was punched from behind by a young man with schizophrenia who shouted that he was the devil. This isn't the first time this has happened, a similar situation played out 19 years earlier. So why does the cycle continue? Latino USA examines how and why someone with serious mental illness falls through the cracks of the nation's mental health system.

At the time, there were very few clues as to who the remains belonged to. The investigation spanned five years but ultimately, it took the skills of a forensic anthropologist from Puerto Rico to get answers—and simultaneously, reveal the difficulties of identifying Latino remains in the United States.

And it was based on real-life events. Latino USA heads to Grant County, New Mexico, to uncover the history The Empire Zinc Strike, to find out how a sleepy mining town erupted in protest, and if almost 70 years later anyone still remembers.
Crime	5/12/19	17:00	54:01:00	Latino USA: In 2017, a young woman was found dead on the campus of the National Autonomous University of Mexico with a telephone cord around her neck. The police viewed her death as a suicide. Not everyone agreed. Latin America has some of the highest rates of femicide in the world, and when a woman is killed, it barely makes a blip in the news. But that's not what happened in the case of Lesvy Berlin.

Immigration	6/2/19	17:00	54:01:00	Latino USA: Huntsville, Alabama has a small, but growing Latino population. It's where Teresa Matias, a single working immigrant mother from Guatemala, lived with her five sons. In 2015, she joined a local Catholic church. Although the members from the church were strangers, some of them became her kids' godparents. Over the next year, a series of events unraveled. Without fully understanding, Teresa had given up complete parental rights to her youngest son. Latino USA heads to Huntsville to chronicle the events of a life-changing decision Teresa Matias made without full consent and proper translation.
Immigration	6/9/19	17:00	54:00:00	Latino USA: Since the beginning of the Trump administration, the U.S.-Mexico border has been front and center of the public conversation. However, a humanitarian crisis at the border is nothing new. Jeh Johnson was Secretary of Homeland Security during President Obama's second term. He ran the agency during a tense period—when tens of thousands of unaccompanied migrant children, and families were arriving at the border. Latino USA's Maria Hinojosa sits down with Jeh Johnson for a candid, and at times tense, conversation.
Government	6/16/19	17:00	54:00:00	Latino USA continues its coverage of the field of candidates for the 2020 Democratic nomination with a conversation with Senator Cory Booker. Booker has come a long way since 1995 when, while attending law school at Yale, he moved into a housing project in Newark to help the community. He became mayor of the New Jersey city in 2006, then went on to become a U.S. senator. Latino USA's Maria Hinojosa sits down with Cory Booker for a candid conversation on immigration policy and his response to critics—and, he even shares his feelings for his girlfriend, actress Rosario Dawson.
Environment	6/23/01	17:00	54:01:00	Latino USA: Los Angeles, you might be surprised to learn, sits on top of the largest urban oil field in the country and has been the site of oil extraction for almost 150 years. Today, nearly 5,000 oil wells remain active in Los Angeles County alone, many operating in communities of color, often very close to homes, schools and hospitals. Latino USA visits a neighborhood in South Los Angeles, the epicenter of an anti-oil-drilling movement that is gaining momentum. We meet Nalleli Cobo, the 18-year-old who's working to shut down the oil industry, one well at a time.

After Mauricio's sister was killed by members of a gang and Jorge's young cousins were killed by a rival gang, Jorge and Mauricio decided to flee the country. They both applied for asylum in Mexico. But only Jorge's application was approved, forcing them to navigate Mexico's complex asylum system.
