Below is a summary illustrating how WMGC-HD2 addressed key community issues throughout the three month period ending September 30, 2016.

1. Economy

July 3, 6:00 am

The Peter Werbe Show

Les Leopold, author, *Runaway Inequality: An Activist's Guide to Economic Justice,* said that it's not only about fairness of compensation, but also that wealth inequality harms the economy. 25 min.

July 10, 6:30 am The Peter Werbe Show

Robin Hahnel, author, *Of the People, By the People: The Case for a Participatory Economy,* discussed the impact the British withdrawal will have on that country and the effect on the U.S. economy and cities like Detroit. 25 min.

Richard D. Wolff, author of the article, "When Systems Crumble: Looking Beyond Global Capitalism," said that traditional relationship of employer and employee has played itself out, now offering only crisis, and it is time to examine other ways to administer our economy. 25 min.

Chuck Collins, director of the Program on Inequality at the Institute for Policy Studies, and co-author of the report, "The Ever Growing Gap," outlined the huge disparity in wealth between the white population and minority communities. 25 min.

Norman Solomon, author, "The Most Important US Air Force Base You've Never Heard Of," in The Nation magazine described the role played by the Ramstein, Germany military facility in the many wars the U.S. is fighting abroad. 25 min.

Peter Kornbluh, Director of the Cuba and Chile Documentation Projects at the National Security Archives, and author, *The Pinochet File: A Declassified Dossier on Atrocity and*

Ferris State Professor David Pilgrim, founder and curator of the Jim Crow Museum, a 5,000 piece collection of racist artifacts, said the museum uses objects of intolerance to teach tolerance. 25 min.
