CBN News Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: More than 400,000 Americans are now testing positive for COVID-19 every day. The surge after the holiday weekend has shattered all expectations, and it includes a spike in the number of children infected, just as millions of them are returning to schools. Johns Hopkins University reported a million new cases Monday on its COVID dashboard. The massive spike is, of course, due to the rapid spread of the omicron variant, combined with a backlog of cases not reported over the holiday weekend. But with more than 400,000 Americans testing positive for COVID-19 every day, that's a 200 percent increase since before Christmas. And it's a new record high that health experts predict will get worse before it gets better. Currently, more than 100,000 Americans are hospitalized with the virus. While that's up 130 percent from two months ago, the peak was 137,000 set one year ago. Right now, 17 percent or roughly 18,000 of those hospitalized are in the I.C.U., but deaths, which are a lagging indicator, are down about 3 percent since two weeks ago. Children's hospitalizations are up 66 percent over the week before: 378 were admitted last week, which the CDC says is a new pandemic record. One of those youngsters is Sarah Barlow's two-year-old daughter. The FDA on Monday authorized booster shots for 12 to 15-year-olds just as most kids head back to the classroom despite the surge in cases. Some school districts like Atlanta, Milwaukee, and Newark are going back to distance learning for now.

CBN Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: According to reports from major cities across the U.S., murder rates rose from coast to coast in 2021. Experts say the spike in homicides began at the height of the COVID-19 pandemic. The disturbing trend continues to grow driven by restrictions and a host of other factors. A member of the Violent Crime Working Group with the Council on Criminal Justice, Criminologist Dr. Alex Piquero's analysis blames the current mix on the ever-present pandemic, social unrest, and division combined with the usual gang and drug problems. In 2021, Chicago, a city long plagued by deadly gun violence saw its deadliest year in 25 years with 797 murders. Los Angeles counted nearly 400 deaths in 2021 and 134 in Oakland. Both California municipalities' murder rates reached 15-year highs. And Austin, Texas, recorded an unprecedented number of murders last year. It is an issue that hits close to home for Sylvia Bennett-Stone. Her daughter, Krystal Joy, and her daughter's best friend died as random, innocent victims from a single bullet after gunfire erupted outside a Birmingham convenience store in 2004. In the wake of the Defund the Police movement, vulnerable families in communities across the country are experiencing the loss of family members and community safety. As the director of Voices of Black Mothers United, an anti-violence initiative of the non-profit Woodson Center in Washington, D.C., Bennett-Stone now helps others who have lost children to violence. She's on a mission to make communities safer by supporting intervention and sensible police reform and pushes back against calls to defund the police. Clarence Page, a journalist and syndicated columnist at The Chicago Tribune, said that defunding police is nonsense because communities need the police. Conservatives blame Democratic leadership in big cities and movements like Defund the Police for the rising crime, an issue that is likely to be front and center in the 2022 midterm congressional elections. Meanwhile, Piquero said while all may not agree on how to solve the problem, there is one thing that everyone can agree on.

CBN News Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: If you need medical care in a hospital for something other than COVID, it could be hard to find, depending on where you live. Even as the Omicron surge is declining, it's still undermining care for other health problems. The good news is that the number of COVID-19 cases is finally falling in the United States. Omicron cases are dropping or leveling off in more than half the country. Dr. Anthony Fauci says the current wave could peak in February. But some hospitals are still overwhelmed, like Mercyhealth Hospital in Wisconsin. In some states, it isn't letting up at all. In Alabama, for example, cases have doubled in the past week. The U.S. recorded over 18 million new cases in the last month alone. That's more than a quarter of the nation's total number of confirmed COVID-19 cases reported since the beginning of the pandemic. Amid the surge, the FDA has expanded the use of remdesivir, an expensive and controversial treatment. And health officials are still saying your best defense is to be vaccinated. But on Friday, a federal judge in Texas issued a nationwide injunction barring the government from enforcing President Biden's vaccine mandate for federal workers. The Justice Department plans to appeal the decision. Overseas, protests are expanding across Europe over vaccine mandates. Now, France and other governments are showing signs of backing down. In the U.K., with 74,000 NHS workers facing firing because they won't get the jab and British Prime Minister Boris Johnson fighting for his political life amid a scandal called "Partygate," Johnson has lifted restrictions including COVID-19 passes, mask mandates, and work-from-home guidance. Ireland is also dropping its COVID restrictions, saying boosters helped it weather the Omicron storm. Here in the U.S., demand for testing is on the rise, but the delivery of at-home rapid-tests has been delayed by ongoing supply chain issues caused by a combination of workers calling out sick with Omicron and bottlenecked warehouses.

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CBN News Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: The Omicron surge is overwhelming America's front-line health care workers. The double dose of Omicron patients combined with a dire shortage of hospital workers is slamming hospitals nationwide, including Titus Regional Medical Center in Mt. Pleasant, Texas. Craig DeLisi, M.D., told CBN News that the hospital is admitting its highest number of COVID-19 patients since the pandemic began. Health care workers are struggling to fulfill their duties during this crisis that's dragged on for two years. Dr. DeLisi says his faith helps him cope. COVID-19 deaths in the U.S. are topping 2,000 each day, matching Delta levels. Doctors point out Omicron case numbers are five times higher than Delta's, meaning if Omicron had been as severe as Delta, we'd be facing upwards of 10,000 deaths a day. CDC research shows that while Omicron evades immunity in some people, those who are vaccinated and boosted are 90-percent less likely to land in the hospital if they become infected. Dr. Jav Grider, Chief Physician Executive at University of Kentucky HealthCare in Lexington told CBN News vaccination appears to protect people from the most severe illness. However, Dr. Grider said just because a person who tests positive for Omicron avoids the hospital does not mean they necessarily avoid a difficult time with the virus. Doctors are responding negatively to reports of so-called "Omicron parties" where people get together to intentionally catch Omicron, with the intention of recovering quickly and getting on with their lives. Instead, Dr. DeLisi urges vaccination combined with caution until this surge is over. Many are hoping the Omicron surge will be the last one, and after it subsides the pandemic will finally end.

CBN News Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: The U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention faces renewed criticism for its handling of COVID-19 pandemic guidance and information. This follows a New York Times article raising numerous questions, asking why the health agency has withheld or delayed releasing information to the public. The areas of this withheld information include COVID-19 hospitalization data including age, race, and vaccination status, as well as information about the efficacy of booster vaccines among people ages 18 to 49, the group least likely to benefit from the shots. Since the beginning of the pandemic, the CDC reportedly has also possessed data from some states and cities detailing the amount of coronavirus in wastewater but only recently began making that information available to the general public. While the CDC has not yet responded to CBN News, a spokesperson told the New York Times in part that the information "wasn't ready for primetime." The CDC's Kristen Nordlund said the agency must ensure details are "accurate and actionable." She also reportedly admitted concern the data might be misinterpreted, such as vaccines being ineffective. Political analyst Nathan Gonzalez, editor and publisher of "Inside Elections," told CBN News that Americans were already skeptical of government even before the pandemic. He said the idea that the CDC would withhold information from the public only deepens the problem. Gonzalez sees one main way the CDC can rebuild trust: tell Americans the whole truth. Former U.S. Food and Drug Administration Commissioner Scott Gottlieb, M.D., author of "Uncontrolled Spread: Why COVID-19 Crushed Us and How We Can Defeat the Next Pandemic" told CBN News the CDC demonstrated an inability to properly communicate to the American public during a pandemic. Study Reveals Antibodies from Fighting COVID-19 Infection Last More Than One Year. He says the CDC has a reputation of being slow at processing and sharing information. So while the COVID-19 pandemic presented brand new challenges to the CDC, critics say the agency should learn from its messaging mistakes and make fundamental changes before any future health emergency.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Over two hundred years ago, President Abraham Lincoln famously said, "Most folks are about as happy as they make up their minds to be." Is that even possible today in the midst of a global pandemic? Christian psychiatrist Daniel Amen, M.D. believes each of us can raise the degree of happiness we experience even in the midst of challenging circumstances like the ones we are facing today. The COVID-19 pandemic sent mental health crisis through the roof. Over the last two years, adult depression tripled while depression and anxiety disorders among children more than doubled. However, says it doesn't have to be that way. After studying more than 200,000 brain scans, Dr. Amen discovered neuroscience techniques that can lead to increased happiness. He then tested them on his patients and found an average 32 percent improvement after one month. In his book, "You, Happier: The 7 Neuroscience Secrets of Feeling Good Based On Your Brain Type," Dr. Amen prescribes different happiness strategies based on a person's personality type. He says there are 16 different types, which are combinations of five main ones. Dr. Amen says while he recommends a targeted approach to happiness based on a person's brain type, there are certain things everyone can do to raise their happiness level, regardless of their personality. The first step involves boosting your overall brain health. Believe it or not, our diet plays a major role in how well our brain functions. The types of foods and drinks we consume directly contribute to the way we think and feel through a complex system of neurotransmitters, hormones, and more. Dr. Amen says good brain health begins with minimizing the consumption of junk foods like sugary, processed foods and drinks that are loaded with chemical additives and lack fiber and other nutrients. Dr. Amen points out the very foods that comfort us while we are eating them, actually make our mood worse in the long run. Dr. Amen says much like junk food, some people tend to reach for alcohol to feel better at the moment, but in the long run, boozy beverages are best avoided. Dr. Amen says supplements can also help improve brain health. While making recommendations based on personality type, he adds just about everyone can benefit from heavy-hitters like a multivitamin, probiotic, vitamin D, and fish oil, as well as lesser-known supplements that really pack a punch. In addition to improving brain health, another key to boosting happiness levels is learning to control our thoughts. Dr. Amen suggests several techniques to identify thinking patterns that lead to unhappiness and how to reverse them. Dr. Amen recommends the Biblical practice of replacing negative thoughts with positive ones. Dr. Amen recommends limiting time online, pointing to research showing social media increases suicide risk in teenage girls, which he believes could be just the tip of the iceberg. Just like with social media, Dr. Amen says many people would likely be happier if they cut back on their consumption of negative news stories. So while genetics and circumstances can play a role in our overall happiness, it appears our choices and habits play even bigger ones.

CBN Reporter Chuck Holton Reports: Since the start of the pandemic, nearly 200,000 Americans have died from drug overdoses, an alarming increase over previous years. The year 2020 alone saw a record 92,000 drug overdoses across the United States, and while final numbers have yet to be released for 2021, last year's total looks to be higher still. The crisis is being driven by a fairly new, ultra-potent drug: fentanyl. Only two milligrams of fentanyl can be lethal. In 2021 US Customs and Border Protection seized more than 11,000 pounds of fentanyl in the United States – enough to kill more than 2.5 billion people. The drug is being laced into less potent drugs like marijuana and heroin, often without the knowledge of the user. West Virginia saw a 40% increase in the number of overdose deaths just in 2020 alone. And Fentanyl played an increasing part in those 1,200 deaths. But if you talk to experts here in West Virginia, they'll tell you it's also the federal government's response to the pandemic that's to blame. One former addict, who is referred to as "Kristen" to protect her anonymity, agrees. The source of the fentanyl flooding America's streets might come as a surprise. According to data compiled by the Drug Enforcement Administration, illicit fentanyl is primarily manufactured in China and smuggled into the United States through Mexico. Some say this should constitute as an act of war. These experts fear Fentanyl may prove to be our adversary's most powerful weapon – defeating America from the inside out.

CBN Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: "Criminals," "addicts," and "mentally ill," are some of the ways people view the homeless. However, one Christian ministry in the fight chooses to label these people "children of God," Increasing crime in New York City's subways, including a tragic murder in which a young woman was pushed in front of an oncoming train allegedly by a homeless man, led Mayor Eric Adams to release the Subway Safety Plan in which city workers will relocate the vast numbers of homeless people living in the subways to shelters. In California, Gov. Gavin Newsom unveiled CARE Court which would create mental health courts in each county and offer treatment to homeless people with mental illness, and in some cases requiring people to submit to treatment. The measure has yet to be approved by the state legislature. While governments play a major role in addressing homelessness, Christian ministries, such as Dream Center Hampton Roads in Norfolk, Virginia, are also helping people who live on the street. Co-founder David McBride, pastor of New Life Church Ghent told CBN News, six years ago he was inspired to start the ministry by the parable of the Good Samaritan. Co-founder Nick Noel told CBN the ministry helps connect people currently living on the streets to various nearby resources such as shelters, employment training centers, addiction recovery programs, and mental health services. Another pillar of Dream Center Hampton Roads involves focusing on personal, long-term relationships. Church volunteers develop nonjudgmental, one-on-one relationships, with appropriate boundaries, with people who need help. Pastor McBride compares it to a mentoring program with the goal of helping people identify and achieve their dreams. In addition to sending homeless people to nearby services, Dream Center Hampton Roads also trains volunteers to offer certain services as part of the ministry. Noel says while crimes involving homeless individuals grab headlines, many people currently living on the street are not criminals, addicts, or mentally ill. Many people find themselves living on the streets through no fault of their own. A hot meal opened the door for Zach Sarro to accept help from Dream Center Hampton Roads. He got a job, an apartment, and gave his life to Jesus. So while government-sponsored shelters and services definitely help the homeless, Dream Center Hampton Roads shows the difference the church and Christians with a personal interest can make in the lives of those currently living on the streets.

CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: As violent crime surges nationwide, police departments are searching for solutions in order to mitigate violence in their communities. One enforcement tactic is the use of no-knock warrants, which too often has led to unintended consequences and death. No-knocks are a result of the Nixon administration's war on drugs. Now, nearly 50-years later, they're often requested for use in high-risk situations involving suspects wanted for violent crimes. The results, however, are questionable in terms of success and overshadowed by injury and death. Fresh on the mind of Americans is the death of 22-year-old Amir Locke on Feb. 2, 2022. Minneapolis police were granted a no-knock warrant, then quietly entered the apartment Locke was in. They announced themselves with guns drawn. Body camera footage shows that Locke was likely sleeping during the early morning raid, then reached for a gun before an officer shot and killed him. In this case, however, the warrant was for Locke's 17-year-old cousin and two other homicide suspects. Locke had a license for the gun that with within his reach. No charges have been filed in this case. The officer behind the gun is on leave as the investigation continues. A deep look into the history of no-knock exposes massive growth and a deadly past. Numerous studies estimate the annual number grew from 1,500 in the early 1980s to more than 20,000 today. And in just a six-year period, between 2010 and 2016, a New York Times investigation found that these raids led to the deaths of at least 81 civilians and 13 police officers. In 31 years on the force, Sergeant McGrew investigated some of Santa Barbara's most violent crimes. The former hostage negotiator and major crimes detective believes in the use of no-knock warrants. Still, Locke's death combined with the high-profile case of Breonna Taylor, shot and killed by Louisville police in her own home, has ignited the effort to ban them. Four states have banned no-knock warrants: Florida, Oregon, Tennessee, and Virginia, while 34 states have some restriction or limitation. Responsible for training Swat teams nationwide, Commander Thor Ells (Ret.) no longer teaches no-knock protocols because he feels the danger outweighs the benefit. He says there are alternatives. Still, he says nothing currently puts an end to the controversial policy. Even though a number of local and state governments have adopted safer alternatives, there is an effort to backtrack somewhat. A Republican-sponsored measure in Virginia's House of Delegates would repeal no-knock bans and work to fix a chaotic situation by implementing a fixed amount of time police should wait before entering. While declining an interview, the sponsor told CBN News it's unlikely to pass. Commander Ells argues it's time to implement safer tools for police to use in their investigations. The challenge, however, is the cost of trying to force a single playbook on the sheer number of agencies nationwide.

CBN News Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Most Americans, weary after two years of fighting COVID, are resigning themselves to a future that involves living alongside the disease indefinitely. A new Kaiser Family Foundation survey shows 75 percent in the US are "tired" of the pandemic and 77 percent believe most people will eventually get the virus. Still, a third of those surveyed see the pandemic as the country's biggest problem. Medical experts predict the end of the omicron surge may signal the transition from a pandemic to an endemic. When a disease is endemic it is no longer unpredictably disruptive to daily life. Stuart Ray, M.D., an infectious disease expert, and professor of medicine at Johns Hopkins University told CBN News Americans have built up a lot of immunity as a result of the huge wave of omicron infections. However, Dr. Ray points out that one of the challenges with thinking about an endemic state is that's not always a good thing. Right now, it's nearly impossible to get certain life-saving treatments, and that needs to change. As the coronavirus mutates, it tends to become more contagious, according to Jonathan Quick, M.D., adjunct professor of global health at Duke University and author of "The End of Epidemics: The Looming Threat to Humanity and How to Stop It." Often, like with omicron, more transmissible variants are less deadly, but not always. Health experts stress that while COVID-19 remains unpredictable, it will likely transition from a pandemic to an endemic in the months ahead. They warn future surges could be likely, but major restrictions may be less so.

CBN Reporter Brody Carter Reports: Inflation has hit a 40-year high, leaving little room for comfort in household budgets. Once again, the latest inflation numbers from the Labor Department were higher than expected – showing that the problem of rising prices is still far from over. So politicians, economists, and most of all consumers are hoping the Federal Reserve can put an end to it. Consumer costs rose the most in four decades, climbing 7.5% over the last year. Two of the most important categories saw big increases. Gasoline is up 40%. And prices for food at the grocery store soared into the double digits. And although wages have gone up for some – prices have climbed even more. That meant real wages actually fell by 1.7% last year. President Biden acknowledged the problem, using the latest numbers to once again, try and sell his spending plans. But critics say Democratic spending last year made inflation worse, and many in Congress are arguing for spending even more. Now the hope is that the Federal Reserve's plans to raise interest rates will bring inflation down. But those rate hikes could also weaken the economy, and it may take quite some time before they finally slow the rapid rise in prices.

CBN Reporter Mark Martin Reports: Skyrocketing inflation sent more Americans to dollar stores to buy the basics over the past year. But the tough economic climate is also forcing those businesses to raise prices in order to stay viable. When Iasha Williams made a recent trip to Dollar Tree, she was in for a surprise. The Virginia resident now plans to shop at Dollar Tree less often due the increase to \$1.25. Shopper Lee Dean feels the increase makes sense in light of supply issues and the pandemic, but he also sees the flip side. Dollar Tree issued a statement about the increase saying it was the right time to make the move in order "to continue offering extreme value to customers." The company called the decision permanent and said it wasn't a reaction to temporary or short-lived market conditions. CEO Michael Witynski said Dollar Tree's pricing tests showed "broad consumer acceptance" of the price increase. Still, industry tracker Coresight Research found Dollar Tree experienced a "meaningful decline" in shoppers after the price increase during a check around the Christmas holidays. As for competitor Dollar General, the discount story says 20-percent of its merchandise goes for a dollar or less.

CBN Reporter Dale Hurd Reports: You may have seen stickers at gasoline pumps with a picture of Joe Biden pointing at the high gas price while saving "I did that." This is probably one thing for which Biden doesn't want the credit. The White House is blaming skyrocketing energy prices on the war in Ukraine. Prices began rising, however, the day Biden entered the White House, with his cancellation of the Keystone XL pipeline and new moratoriums on oil and gas exploration. Critics accuse the White House of being secretly happy about record-high energy prices, as a way to force Americans off fossil fuels. This thought is catching on so much that now the media is calling it a conspiracy theory, like this USA Today headline: "Gas prices a plot to promote electric cars, conspiracy theorists say." Energy Secretary Jennifer Granholm says the White House is not happy about high energy prices but does see an opportunity. Biden made no secret of his goal to end the oil and gas industry. In one 2020 campaign appearance, Biden told a young reporter, "I want you to look at my eyes. I guarantee, I guarantee we're gonna end fossil fuel." And during a 2020 debate with Donald Trump, Biden pledged, "No more subsidies for the fossil fuel industry. No more drilling on federal lands. No more drilling, including offshore. No ability for the oil industry to continue to drill, period." And in just 14 months, America has gone from being energy independent under Donald Trump to a nation dependent on foreign oil, including Russian oil, even though the U.S. still has abundant energy resources. Despite White House rhetoric, critics say little is actually being done to bring down prices. Biden's Transportation Secretary says if you don't like high gas prices, you should buy a \$60,000 electric car. Steve Malloy, editor of the website Junkscience.com(http://junkscience.com/), says despite the White House rhetoric, Biden seems to be trying to keep energy prices high. He explains it here: "Biden's America-Wrecking Climate Agenda." House Democrats now want the White House to declare a climate emergency, banning all drilling on federal lands. Meanwhile, White House officials remain focused on transitioning to green energy. But Western Europe, which is much farther along in the transition to green energy, gasoline prices today are over \$9 a gallon. That's probably not the kind of energy future most Americans want.

CBN News Reporter George Thomas: U.S. Sen. Rand Paul (R-KY) believes what's happening on a growing number of college campuses regarding their COVID-19 protocols is over the top. At Princeton, fully vaccinated students were told in December not to even leave the county unless they were on a sports team. And at Johns Hopkins University, students are required to be triple vaxxed, wear N95 masks or double-masked, and test twice weekly. As the omicron variant continues to surge and universities double down on COVID restrictions. Paul and others say the science simply isn't there to justify the restrictions. The latest CDC numbers show 2,210 people between the ages of 15 to 24 died of COVID in the last 12 months. While 2,018 people died of pneumonia in the same age group. It's why Tyce Patt, and 14 of his fellow students, are suing Ohio University over its COVID protocols, including their vaccination mandate, claiming it's discriminatory. Patt argues the university's rules violate both state law and the Ohio Constitution by not allowing students to exercise their consent to medical treatment. Warner Mendenhall, Tyce's lawyer, has filed similar lawsuits against other Ohio universities. His clients have described to him what happens when students test positive on some campuses. Molly Noble, a parent of an Ohio University student has joined the class action lawsuit. Surveys show the pandemic continues to have a major impact on student's mental health. It's something Dr. Kelly Wolgast, who oversees COVID 19 protocols at Penn State, watches closely. CBN News also spoke to several students around the country who welcomed their universities' COVID protocols. For example, students at the University of Michigan have to be double vaxxed and boosted. Meanwhile, students at Penn State University aren't required to get the jab. Annalise Abraham, a senior at the University of Pittsburgh, said it's also important to consider all the people that students often meet on a regular basis. Mendenhall says it's time for the country to prepare for a potential new reality - that the virus is here to stay and that campuses should also rethink their battle lines going forward.

CBN Reporter Charlene Aaron Reports: Several governors are taking an about-face when it comes to requiring masks in public schools, citing the rapid drop off in COVID-19's Omicron surge. The end to the mandates in New Jersey, Connecticut, Delaware, and Oregon will take effect between now and the end of March depending on the state. California announced plans to end its indoor masking requirement for vaccinated people next week, but masks will still be the rule for students. The current mask mandate in New York, once ground zero for the pandemic, is set to expire Thursday. Gov. Kathy Hochul is set to drop the state's indoor mask mandate according to the New York Times. But she is expected to keep the mandate in place for the city's schools. CDC Director Rochelle Walensky cautions against lifting the mandates saying the country isn't out of the woods yet. Still the battle is playing out in various ways across the country. In Chicago, a group of students recently walked out of a class after being told to mask up. Masking and other COVID restrictions are leading some families to leave the blue states for red states. Texas, Florida, and Arizona, all Republican-led states, have banned mask mandates and they are now seeing a surge in new residents. Karol Markowicz is a columnist for the New York Post and Fox News. A lifelong New Yorker, she recently relocated her family to Florida. She has written extensively about the issue of masking children during the pandemic and says many oppose New York's actions. Since moving to Florida, Markowicz said she has seen a big difference in her kids. Meanwhile, more states may follow suit in lifting mask mandates now that school age children are eligible for vaccinations.

CBN Senior Washington Correspondent Tara Mergener Reports: Parents from coast to coast are fighting school districts on everything from Critical Race Theory to mask mandates in classrooms. Backlash is also growing over sexually explicit content now available to children as young as kindergarten. Parents who first started packing schools board meetings to re-open schools are focusing on books with explicit and obscene content. That content in question includes sexually explicit books like "Gender Oueer," which is a recipient of an American Library Award. The story contains graphic text and illustrations depicting men having intercourse, children engaged in sexual acts, pedophilia, and the sexual fantasies of the then 14-year-old author. Since "Gender Queer" and other explicit books began popping up in more school libraries the outcry is growing louder among parents and politicians. Vowing to prosecute, Texas and South Carolina's Republican governors are demanding statewide probes into how books like "Gender Queer" got into school libraries. Virginia's newly sworn-in governor is using executive orders to help parents reclaim control over public schools. There are numerous efforts underway to recall school board members across the country. Some parents are even running for political office, including Brandon Michon who just entered Virginia's Congressional 10th district race. Several months ago, Michon's rant against school closures in Loudoun County, Virginia at a school board meeting went viral. Not long after, he says he was shocked when his kindergartner brought home a book on transgenderism from school. But resistance to removing these books is strong. Just last month, Virginia Senate Democrats unanimously blocked a bill that would have forced schools to warn parents about sexual content, citing First Amendment rights. Library groups are also weighing in. Members of the LGBTQ community argue the issue is about social justice and inclusion. But many child experts insist what matters most is the children. They warn sexual content for young audiences can have serious consequences. Others are concerned that children who view abusive and misogynistic acts will begin to see them as normal and acceptable.

CBN Medical Reporter Lorie Johnson Reports: Before the COVID-19 pandemic even began, America began experiencing a health care worker shortage that's only grown in the last two years. This supply and demand imbalance is expected to get worse unless something changes. A major reason for this crisis is the record number of elderly people in America. This huge geriatric generation is experiencing ever-increasing medical needs. To make matters worse, the large number of health care workers in this age group are retiring in large numbers. Becky Sawyer, executive vice president for Sentara Healthcare, which employs 28,000 health care professionals in Virginia, North Carolina, and Ohio, told CBN News the health care worker shortage is built-in to the country's changing demographics. However, the health care worker shortage isn't just about aging baby boomers. Even before the pandemic, many people left the industry before retirement age due to high burnout rates. The pandemic only deepened this trend. Nearly 20 percent of health care professionals left their jobs in the last two years. Caitlin Krouse, DNP, an Indiana nurse practitioner, and health policy advocate, told CBN News that the pandemic created unprecedented stress levels for all health care workers, the relentless siege of COVID-19 patients has been particularly difficult for nurses, especially when their peers left the field because it caused those who remained to pick up the slack. The shortages run the gamut: lab technicians, aides, respiratory therapists, and more. The Senate Health, Education, Labor, and Pensions Subcommittee on Employment and Workplace Safety held a hearing on the growing shortage of health care workers at which time lawmakers were told the U.S. needs 200,000 nurses per year to meet the increased need and America is facing a shortage of up to 124,000 doctors by 2034. In one effort to get more doctors into the field, medical schools are accepting more applicants. However, that's only part of the solution, as there's also a need to increase the number of physician residency positions. Residency is the period of required training after medical school but before doctors get their medical license and can practice on their own. Resident physicians train for three to seven years, depending on their chosen field of medicine. The federal government covers the cost of training resident doctors for the most part. That allocation had remained largely frozen since 1997, which meant doctors were still not able to serve the public in high enough numbers. The bottleneck began to ease somewhat in December 2020 when bipartisan congressional leaders added 1,000 new resident positions. Congress is now considering adding 14,000 more, some specifically targeted for rural areas because, after residency, doctors often remain in the same location. Other incentives may alleviate the shortage of physicians and other health care professionals in rural areas. Telehealth, one silver lining from the pandemic, allows people in rural areas to get the care they need from doctors and other health professionals in distant locations. The nursing shortage might ease if restrictions regarding training were eased. Despite a national nursing shortage in the United States, over 80,000 qualified applications were not accepted at U.S. nursing schools in 2020, according to the American Association of Colleges of Nursing. The reasons include enrollment caps, not enough full-time faculty, and a lack of clinical sites. To fix this and get more nurses into the field, some states are raising those caps, allowing part-time faculty to fill the gaps, and letting nursing students substitute clinical training with simulation hours. Meanwhile, hospitals are doing all they can to keep the nurses and other health care professionals they currently employ.

CBN Reporter Heather Sells Reports: This week, a male collegiate swimmer who identifies as a woman will compete in the women's NCAA Div. 1 Women's Swimming & Diving Championships. Lia Thomas is the top seed in both the 200-yard and 500-yard freestyle races and will make history as one of the first openly transgender athletes in women's collegiate sports, no matter how he performs. The University of Pennsylvania swimmer previously competed for three seasons as Will Thomas on the UPenn men's swimming team but started competing on the women's team last fall. Thomas began taking hormone replacement therapy to lower his testosterone in May of 2019. Now, in Thomas' first year swimming against women, "Sports Illustrated" describes him as throttling the competition and says Thomas has "set pool, school, and Ivy League records en route to becoming the nation's most powerful female collegiate swimmer. Across the country, a few in the swimming world are daring to speak publicly about their concerns about Thomas in women's swimming. One of them is USA Swimming official who resigned in protest after 30+ years over NCAA and USA Swimming rules that have allowed Thomas to compete against women. Cynthia Millen made the decision late last year after learning that Thomas was competing in women's meets. She described being stunned after working for years to ensure athletes had optimal and fair conditions in which to compete. Millen says she has thrived as a USA Swimming official dedicated to attending to the smallest of details in order to create equal opportunities for all. In a December interview, Thomas told the SwimSwam podcast that he's been swimming since age 5 and has found swimming as a woman incredibly rewarding. He described strong support from both his coach and teammates. Millen said that initially, many in the swimming community thought officials would not allow Thomas multiple opportunities to compete in women's swimming. But those officials, coaches, and sportswriters have welcomed and paved the way for his participation. In January, the College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA) issued a statement of support and called on the NCAA to allow Thomas to compete in this year's NCAA women's championships even while it crafts a long-term transgender policy. In February, the NCAA announced it would hold off on adopting USA Swimming's new transgender policy, clearing the way for Thomas to compete. The University of Pennsylvania, Ivy League, CSCAA, and other swim associates have publicly encouraged support for Thomas and condemned any protests. Some UPenn swimmers and their families have raised concerns but have done so anonymously. The mother of an Ivy League female swimmer lamented on a feminist webinar that her daughter would have to compete against Thomas and potentially change in the same locker room. Longtime sports performance coach Dr. Linda Blade says decisionmakers at the highest levels are more afraid of being called transphobic than hateful towards women. There are a few exceptions. Notably, Olympic champion Michael Phelps questioned Thomas competing against women in a CNN interview. Erika Brown, a 2021 Olympic swimmer has also spoken out, as has former Olympic swim coach, Dave Salo. Thomas has told "Sports Illustrated" that he's aiming for the 2024 Olympics. In the meantime, he's expected to win individual titles and set new records at the 2022 NCAA Div. 1 Women's Swimming and Diving Championships March 16-19. The ripple effect? No titles for the women that would have otherwise won. Going forward, coaches like Salo and Blade are hoping for a re-organization of sports where those like Thomas can compete but not against women. In the meantime, Millen is watching out for the young athletes who are taking it all in.

CBN National Security Correspondent Caitlin Burke Reports: Cyber protection is no longer optional. The future is now, and the war in Ukraine has escalated the threat of destructive ransomware attacks to an all-time high. The intelligence community says it's focused on four potential scenarios. As the U.S. focuses on defense, private businesses and government agencies alike are on the offense, trying to hire nearly 600,000 people for cyber security. Jason Blessing, a Jeane Kirkpatrick Visiting Research Fellow and cybersecurity expert with the American Enterprise Institute, told CBN News, when it comes to this critical area, public and private sectors share the responsibility of protecting national security. A breakdown on either end, could have dire consequences. Cybersecurity and Infrastructure Security Agency (CISA) is tasked with key roles such as prevention and emergency response, yet, Jen Easterly, CISA Director, struggles to keep her agency fully staffed. Another challenge: competing with private sector salaries. Still, experts say the biggest overall problem is that there aren't enough qualified people to fill all the open positions. The numbers just don't add up: 50,000 people to fill nearly 600,000 jobs. So the tech industry is trying to help fill the void. Microsoft, for example, is providing free cybersecurity curriculum to all public community colleges. Kwame Yamgnane, the founder of Qwasar, noticed another problem is finding experienced educators to teach these skills. His company, Qwasar, provides courses for community college instructors, enabling them to teach what's needed to their students. The hard reality is that there's no immediate fix. In the meantime, however, the average American can be an important first-line of defense against cyber attack. According to Deloitte, 91 percent of cyber attacks start with a phishing email, a message designed to trick unsuspecting employees into divulging sensitive information. So the bottom line is that protecting sensitive data is no longer the sole responsibility of highly trained cyber security professionals, it's a job that falls to all of us.

CBN Reporter Heather Sells Reports: The national title Lia Thomas won in the NCAA Div. 1 Women's Swimming and Diving Championships has raised awareness of the threat that transgender athletes pose to women's sports, and the public outcry is escalating. Last Thursday, Thomas beat the University of Virginia's Emma Weyant by over a second to win the 500 freestyle, despite never qualifying for the Div. 1 championship during his three years competing on the University of Pennsylvania's men's team. Thomas is the first transgender athlete to win an NCAA swimming championship. Thomas transitioned to the UPenn women's team last fall, after beginning hormone therapy in May of 2019. Ironically, Thomas' victory comes on the 50th anniversary of Title IX, a federal civil rights law that Congress passed in 1972 to protect students against sex-based discrimination. Since Thomas began competing against women, much of the swim world has either publicly supported him or protested anonymously. But during the NCAA championships March 16th-19th, the public outcry accelerated. Outside the McAuley Aquatic Center in Atlanta, activists supporting Thomas drew attention as did those in opposition. Olympic coach Robert Fausett called on swim dads to protect their daughters, and he called on female swimmers to boycott the championship, saying swim authorities couldn't cancel everyone. One swim dad, Felipe Delgado, who's a former Olympian and owns a swim academy in southern California, tweeted support for his daughter in her race against Thomas and called on the NCAA to change its rules. A "Swimming World" editorial also took issue with current NCAA rules that allow Thomas to compete against women and called the championships a charade. One NCAA swimmer did protest publicly during the championship. Virginia Tech swimmer Reka Gyorgy came in 17th in the 500 freestyle, which took her out of the top 16 allowed into the finals. She issued a statement saying that while she respects Thomas she believes it's disrespectful for trans athletes to compete against women. Concerned Women for America (CWA) has filed a formal civil rights complaint under Title IX with the U.S. Department of Education against UPenn. Its chief issue: UPenn allowing Thomas to compete in women's swimming. It also cites reports of a hostile environment in the locker room from Thomas' female teammates. Whether or not it changes its rules on transgender athletes may depend on who speaks up. Penny Nance, CEO of CWA, says that Thomas may have unleashed a new wave of parents who won't keep quiet. The NCAA championships wrap up Thomas' collegiate career, but he told "Sports Illustrated" that he has his eye on a second act: the 2024 Olympics.
