

Jarring video surveillance video captures the last moments in the lives of Russell Maffei and Marie Tauro, two fixtures of the close-knit Hudson County Republican party who were killed in a hit-and-run crash Sunday night. Maffei and Tauro were headed toward the Coach House Diner and a meeting with around 25 fellow Republicans gearing up for this fall's legislative election. As President Donald Trump plans to push for his \$1 trillion infrastructure bill, Chaser Sibile is looking for solutions to fix NJ Transit after the train derailment on Monday that injured five people and created massive commuting headaches for thousands of people over the past couple of days. Governor Chris Christie told NJ Transit officials to stop payments to Amtrak until an independent inspection can confirm that Amtrak's Northeast corridor is in a state of good repair. Sibile asked commuters to share their thoughts about NJ Transit's management, and asked My9 VP & station manager Dianne Doctor to weigh in. Meanwhile, the Federal Railroad Administration said it is "concerned" over two derailments in as many weeks at Penn Station. Investigators are working to detect the cause of Monday's derailment, but Amtrak's president and chief executive said Thursday the cause was a weakened wooden railroad tie. Chaser Alex spoke to Martin Robins, former deputy executive director at NJ Transit, who directed the aborted Access to the Region's Core Tunnel Project. He said if the ARC tunnel had been in existence it would have allowed NJ Transit a "completely alternative route" to move passengers.

'CONTINGENCY PLAN' HELPS IMMIGRANTS STAY IN THE US

EXCLUSIVE INTERVIEW WITH PATERSON MAYOR JOEY TORRES

HOW ONE WOMAN SAVED 1,400 LIVES WITH A HANDFUL OF PHONE CALLS

A small pocket park amid the warehouses and commercial offices of a Meadowlands industrial park is the only reminder of a century-old act of terror and the courage of one young woman who ensured no one was killed. In the first of an occasional series, Alex goes to the sites of forgotten history in the tri-state area, telling the stories of moments in time that have passed from popular memory. The Kingsland explosion happened on January 11, 1917, just three months before the US entry into World War I. In what is today Lyndhurst sat a 30-building complex making shells and explosives for the Allies, which made the place a target for German saboteurs. The fire they started blew up one building and quickly spread to all the rest, but 1,400 lives were saved by Tessie McNamara, a telephone switchboard operator who called each structure with one message: "Get out or go up!" Lyndhurst honored Tessie with a plaque at the small park, but her name has all but disappeared from history.

Some of the city's bike lanes don't connect, the community garden is far enough from the center of town a car is needed to get there, and a project to turn a capped landfill into a solar farm has stalled. However, the city is replacing its street lights with LED lighting which uses just 12% of the power, an exchange so residents reuse their stuff, and a recycling center for yard waste and tree trimmings. In any city, Lecuona said, change can start with the residents rather than the government. "We are expecting the big change in the big corporation. The city doing this and that," she said. "But the resident can also be educated so things are being done at all levels."

TV EXECUTIVE'S DAUGHTER ALLEGEDLY MURDERED BY ESTRANGED HUSBAND

Flowers and a heartfelt note are all that remain outside a New Rochelle, NY, townhouse where a father allegedly murdered his 7-year-old daughter. It happened Tuesday when the babysitter found the girl, Gabrielle White, unresponsive in bed. Police believe Neil White suffocated his daughter and are now charging him with second degree murder. The Westchester Medical Examiner continues to investigate the cause of death. Gabrielle's mother is NBC executive Michelle Hord-White, who filed for divorce from Mr. White two months earlier. Friends and supporters have taken to social media to publicly show their sympathy for the grieving mother. Some are expressing condolences by changing their Facebook profile picture to a picture of Michelle and Gabrielle. Known as a mentor to black women in journalism, Michelle had earlier established The Hord Foundation which seeks to "help others realize their dreams." She and her extended family communicated through a gofundme page that if anyone is interested in memorializing her daughter Gabrielle's life that they can make a donation to the foundation. The money raised will go towards celebrating the dreams of young people who will have an opportunity that Gabrielle will not have to pursue higher education and make a difference in the world.

BLACK FATHER GRATEFUL FOR COPS NOT SHOOTING SON

A father whose son is on trial for assault, robbery and resisting arrest came to court Thursday and watched as the prosecution and defense gave closing arguments. Keith Downs, a retired Army sergeant first class whose namesake son is on trial, believes police officers from Bordentown Township gave his son a beating following a 2014 police pursuit which ended when the son collided with another car.

"He said, 'They beat the hell out of me,'" the elder Downs said. "I said, 'What happened to you?' and he said, 'They beat my ***.'"

But the retired sergeant had a surprising reaction to the actions of Officer Frank Nucera, who made the arrest and admitted striking the younger Downs twice with his police baton. "He could have shot him right there," the elder Downs said. Bordentown police said they received no complaints about the methods Nucera used to make the arrest. Nucera is the son of former Bordentown police chief Frank Nucera. Jurors will get Downs' case Friday.
