Photos of New Jersey Governor Chris Christie sunning himself on one of the beaches closed during the state's shutdown Sunday sparked worldwide outrage and mockery Monday, as an image of the governor reclining in a beach chair became a meme on a sleepy, slow news July 4 extended holiday weekend. In Trenton, legislative leaders worked to break a deadlock over a bill that would restructure the board of insurer Horizon Blue Cross Blue Shield and allow the state to tap into its reserves. Christie had negotiated with Democrats on the bill, promising to allow millions in school aid to remain in the budget in exchange for approval of the Horizon bill. The bill was approved in the Senate, but remained stalled in the Assembly, where Speaker Vincent Prieto refused to allow it to come to a vote. In retaliation, about two dozen of Prieto's own caucus members abstained on the budget vote, meaning it was unable to pass and triggering the government shutdown for the first three days of July. As legislators and Horizon executives met Monday, Chasing News examined the "how" of the shutdown, and begins to probe the "why?" Could the furor over the Horizon bill be connected to two of the most powerful families in the region? Statehouse blogger Jay Lassiter weighs in.

But if you go through the same toll with an E-ZPass device issued in NJ, you may feel ripped off because you will be charged the higher cash rate, not the discounted E-ZPass rate. The MTA's dirty little secret was uncovered by AAA. From 2012 to 2016, more than 92 million drivers with out of state E-ZPass accounts were charged the cash rate at MTA crossings. Seventy million of those drivers were from NJ. "Discounts on MTA-operated crossings are available to all holders of an E-ZPass tag issued by New York, and a New York-issued E-ZPass is available to drivers regardless of the state in which they live," said MTA spokesman Christopher McKniff. LOCAL CREWS HEAD TO TEXAS TO HELP WITH HARVEY AFTERMATH

Swift water rescue units from New Jersey arrived in Texas Tuesday to aid officials there in the wake of the massive damage wrought by Hurricane Harvey, according to the state's Office of Emergency Management. The local deployment is just the first step in the response to help the people of Houston who have been inundated with more than 50 inches of rain.
