

THE AURORA PROJECT: WHO KILLED KARINA?

The case of Karina Vetrano, a Queens woman raped and murdered on an afternoon jog this past August, remains open and no arrests have been made, the NYPD says. In December, the NYPD released a vague profile they created of Karina's killer: saying that he would be familiar with the park but suddenly stop visiting after the crime. Retired homicide detective Gary Britton and reporter Alex Zdan wanted to dig deeper, so they consulted John Kelly, a nationally known criminal profiler who was the first to diagnose serial killing as an addiction. He and the profiling team at STALK Inc. devised a fresh, exclusive profile more detailed than what was released by the NYPD. Britton and Zdan went to Howard Beach to present the profile to Vetrano's father Phil. Phil Vetrano has been talking about a different profile: the telltale DNA left behind by his daughter's killer. So far, tests against all databases have come up short, but Phil wants a new process to be approved. Familial searching can determine if relatives of the killer are in the system, allowing police to focus on working a family tree. In New York State, however, a familial DNA search has to be approved by the state Commission on Forensic Science. The meeting for the approval in Karina's case, is meeting Feb. 10 in New York City. Phil is marshaling support to flood that meeting, which he says will be an important step on what's still a long journey to finding his daughter's murderer.

The federal investigation of Ocean County GOP chair George Gilmore appears to be widening, as subpoenas were served to at least eight towns and governing bodies Wednesday and Thursday. FBI agents arrived at clerk's offices from Jackson to Atlantic City armed with subpoenas demanding "all invoices and bills from" Gilmore's law firm Gilmore & Monahan, as well as payment records to the firm over the past seven years. Federal authorities also are seeking minutes and recordings of public meetings where Gilmore himself or a representative from Gilmore & Monahan was present. Gilmore's attorney Kevin Marino had called previous news of a federal probe a "tax investigation" after two contractors, one of whom had personally lent Gilmore money, were subpoenaed in late November. Marino was not available for additional comment Thursday. Chasing News has confirmed subpoenas were served to the custodians of records in Brick, Lacey Township, Jackson Township, Berkeley, Plumsted, Atlantic City, Little Egg Harbor Township and the Ocean County Freeholder Board. No charges have been filed and federal authorities have refused to comment on the investigation.

Deed records show Alexander's parents bought the house in 1961 when Alexander was a toddler and sold it in 1971 for \$33,000.

The investigation can proceed from there to lead them through the family tree to their ultimate suspect. Brian, an old pal of Levine since their days spent in Jersey City and Trenton in the 1990s, paid a visit to Levine on the eve of his great New Jersey grand opening.

BRENNAN'S BRIDGEGATE COMPLAINT DISMISSED

Barely two weeks after a Bergen County judge said there is probable cause to investigate New Jersey Governor Chris Christie for official misconduct over the Bridgagate scandal, the prosecutor's office "administratively" dismissed the complaint Thursday. The case made by former Teaneck firefighter and Democratic gubernatorial candidate Bill Brennan was that Christie committed official misconduct when he did not stop his aides' realignment of the toll lanes to the George Washington Bridge in September 2013. Though a judge twice found there was probable cause that Christie broke the law, the Bergen Prosecutor's Office said in January it would not investigate, and on Thursday quashed the complaint. Probable cause means there is a reasonable basis a crime was committed but not proof beyond a reasonable doubt.

THE AURORA PROJECT: THE OATH KEEPERS

They're lumped in with militia extremists and domestic terrorists by state Homeland Security officials, but members of New Jersey's Oath Keepers say what has been written about them couldn't be further from the truth. "We're not an armed militia, we conduct no military drills, we don't conduct any military exercises," said Dennis LaGrua, the Oath Keepers' New Jersey chapter president.. "We're pro-government, we want good government to be for the people. We're 100 percent supportive of law enforcement. We support the Constitution, we support the Bill of Rights." Chasing News' investigative series the Aurora Project received exclusive access to the closed-door Oath Keeper meeting in Hightstown, NJ and spoke at length with some of the members. The center of the Oath Keepers' philosophy is the actual oath taken by members of the military, law enforcement, and first responders: to "support and defend the Constitution of the United States against all enemies, foreign and domestic." Fealty to that oath above all others led to Oath Keepers' 10 Orders We Will Not Obey. They include refusals to seize Americans' weapons, imprison Americans as enemy combatants, or collude with foreign troops brought onto U.S. soil to keep the peace. However, it is this active recruitment inside law enforcement and military ranks that concern Homeland Security the most. The Oath Keepers say they are nonpartisan and dedicated to making sure the Constitution is upheld by elected officials.

Following court, Assistant Prosecutor Adam B. Wells said his aim is for Wheeler-Weaver to serve life in prison without the possibility of parole.

GRIFT FOR THE MILL?

More than \$200 million worth of state tax breaks are headed to Camden in the form of support for a new tower that will house the offices of South Jersey power broker George Norcross' insurance company, a state board decided Thursday. Conner Strong & Buckelew will receive \$86 million over 10 years to move its headquarters from Marlton to Camden, creating over 250 jobs as part of a deal with the New Jersey's Economic Development Authority. Conner Strong and two other companies will be housed in the new Camden Tower, where construction was underway Friday and is set to be finished in 2019. The administration of Governor Chris Christie has received criticism for using tax breaks to spur growth. The Bergen Record found Christie's administration has promised \$7.8 billion in breaks since the Governor took office in 2010. The tower project will receive \$245 million in total over 10 years and has promised to bring 869 jobs to Camden, resulting in a cost to taxpayers of \$281,703.11 per job.
