SUPERINTENDENTS OVERPAID

With just 566 students, Mendham Borough is one of the smallest school districts in the state. But thanks to bonuses and perks, Superintendent Mitzi Morillo's compensation package last year was one of the most expensive. That \$203,000 total includes \$5,046 in additional health benefits beyond what teachers in the district received, \$20,237 in performance bonuses, and a whopping \$43,170 in expense allowances, the most for any superintendent in the state and nearly \$7,000 more than the second-highest. In all, Morillo's compensation bypassed the state salary cap for superintendents of districts the borough's size by \$68,000. The superintendent salary cap is one of Governor Chris Christie's landmark reforms from his first term. Since it went into effect in 2010, it has been fiercely opposed by superintendents and school boards as an obstacle in attracting and retaining talented school administrators. But like Christie's other key law, the property tax cap, which provides for a long list of exceptions that allow municipalities to raise taxes by more than the advertised 2% limit, the superintendent salary cap has its own holes. YOUR PUPPY CAN MAKE YOU SICK

A multistate outbreak of campylobacter infections initially linked to contact with puppies sold through Petland, a national pet store chain, has spread to 55 people in 12 states and is resistant to common first-line antibiotics, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention announced last week. Campylobacteriosis is a common bacterial infection that can cause diarrhea, abdominal pain and fever. It's usually easily treated with common oral antibiotics, but the CDC said clinical samples taken from puppies and people sickened in the outbreak show signs of antibiotic resistance. However, the CDC says that most people infected with campylobacter need only supportive care, such as fluids and electrolytes, to recover. TAX PLAN

After Congress approved the sweeping tax overhaul last week, the city will allow residents to prepay their estimated tax bills before the end of the year. While only tax bills are prepared for the first two quarters, city officials said residents can pay more than those two quarters if they wish. Property taxes have been entirely deductible, but starting next year taxpayers will only be allowed to deduct \$10,000. Hoboken joins Jersey City in allowing residents to take advantage of prepayments before the new year. The Republican tax plan signed into law by President Donald Trump is already trickling down to some lower-wage and middle class workers in New Jersey in the form of bonuses and pay raises. A number of companies with offices and operations in the Garden State announced that they would be passing the economic benefits of the corporate tax cuts to their employees and communities. New Jersey-based OceanFirst Financial Corp. said Friday it would raise the minimum wage of its tellers and customer service workers to \$15 an hour. That followed the same move by PNC Bank, which also said it would pay \$1,000 bonuses and \$1,500 pension contributions to their 50,000 employees. AFRICAN-AMERICAN BABIES MORE THAN 3X AS LIKELY TO DIE IN THE FIRST YEAR

Each year, nearly 500 babies in New Jersey die before their first birthdays. While that number is much lower than it used to be, it conceals a sad and enduring mystery: Children of African-American women are more than three times as likely to die in the first year of life as those born to white women, no matter what their mothers' income level or educational attainment. And that racial disparity is larger in New Jersey than anywhere else nationwide, according to state figures. Efforts to get pregnant women prenatal care and to give extra support to those facing high risks of complications or early delivery have helped to reduce infant mortality among all races. So have technological advances that give even the tiniest, most premature infants a better chance to survive. They've lowered the overall death rate for babies in New Jersey by nearly 25% since 2000. CHRISTIE'S PARDONS

Governor Christie on Friday pardoned a campaign donor who was convicted last year of tampering with public records. Christie issued clemency for Joseph M. Longo, a Morristown businessman who contributed \$500 to the Governor's 2009 campaign, according to filings with the Election Law Enforcement Commission. Longo pleaded guilty in June 2016 in Middlesex County to four counts of tampering with public records and information, according to court records. He was sentenced to two years of probation and a \$300,000 fine. Longo was represented by Jeffrey Chiesa, a close Christie ally who is currently in charge of a state takeover of Atlantic City, the court records show. Chiesa is a former state attorney general and U.S. senator. Another was former Mount Olive Police Officer Ryan Eastridge, who was forced to give up his job in 2014 after pleading guilty to releasing confidential law enforcement data to a neighbor. The former police officer, who filed for clemency 10 months ago and now works for the Mount Olive Department of Public Works, learned of the pardon Thursday night through his attorney, Lee Vartan, and former Morris County State Republican Assemblyman Richard Kamin. The pardon, one of the governor's most powerful tools, erases the conviction from Eastridge's history.
