

Pete Hamouroudis sells ice cream for a living. His Cool Concessions Company, based in Brick, runs about a half dozen trucks. Talk to Pete and you'll get a good sense of how very competitive it is to even get permitted to sell ice cream in any given Jersey Shore town. He adds that licensing fees to pay to towns can run \$900 or more, a price he says he'd be happy to pay in the borough of Seaside Park. It also says you can't sell from within 25 feet of a stop sign on a street that intersects with Ocean Avenue. 2009 was the last year that ice cream vendors were licensed in Seaside Park, and those vendors were only allowed to operate pushcarts, not trucks.

DANGER DOWN BELOW

The March 22nd terror attacks on Brussels, Belgium, focused on two apparent soft targets to cause death and mayhem: the airport ticketing counter and the city's subway system. Chasing News previously examined security vulnerabilities at New York area airports. Any mass transit is a tempting target for terrorist bombs, but subways up the ante because the confined space constricts amplifies the devastating power of an explosion, said Brian Michael Jenkins, a former Green Beret who is senior adviser to the president of the RAND Corp. For an on-the-ground view, retired NYPD detective Mordecai Dzikansky went down into the New York City subways to advise on what to do in case of terror. He has simple rules that will help New Yorkers remain vigilant for terror.
