RUTGERS LAWSUIT

A Middlesex County woman left paralyzed during back surgery by a Rutgers New Jersey Medical School doctor has received a \$5 million settlement from the state, her attorney said Friday. Jaime A. Doglio, now 42, underwent surgery to remove a portion of the vertebral bone in 2015 at Robert Wood Johnson University Hospital in New Brunswick to relieve middle and lower back pain and numbness, according to her attorney, Michael F. Lombardi of Edison. A person suffering back pain may experience relief when a laminectomy, also known as decompression surgery, enlarges their spinal canal. But when Doglio awoke in the recovery room, she was paralyzed from the middle of her back to her feet, Lombardi said.

New York City is one step closer to requiring all employees in the city get paid vacation or personal time. Back in January, Mayor Bill de Blasio and Public Advocate Jumaane Williams proposed an expansion to the already in place Earned Wage and Sick Time law. The added paragraph to the law, also expected to be renamed, would require employers with more than 5 employees to give their employees one hour of personal or vacation time for every 30 hours worked. 20 YEARS YOUNGER?

A 69-year-old Dutch "positivity guru" who says he does not feel his age has started a battle to make himself legally 20 years younger on the grounds that he is being discriminated against on a dating app. Emile Ratelband told a court in Arnhem in the Netherlands that he did not feel "comfortable" with his date of birth, and compared his wish to alter it to people who identified as transgender. Ratelband said that due to having an official age that did not reflect his emotional state he was struggling to find both work and love. Dangerous algae bloom in Lake Hopatcong can give you rashes, but that's not keeping people off N.J.'s biggest lake. State environmental officials have a simple warning for anyone who lives near or uses Lake Hopatcong - stay away from the water. Days after harmful algal blooms found in the water closed two beaches at the state's largest lake, the Department of Environmental Protection is calling for access to the water to be shut down altogether because aerial surveillance showed large areas of Lake Hopatcong are experiencing cyanobacteria blooms. Several people have already gotten mild skin rashes from touching the water.
