

Dropping the latest in a series of bombshells in the Bridgegate trial, defendant Bridget Anne Kelly testified Friday she notified Governor Chris Christie of what she believed was a traffic study for the George Washington Bridge in Fort Lee four weeks before it happened. Christie gave

his approval for the move, Kelly said from the witness stand, and talked with her about it again while the lane closures were happening. Governor Christie's spokesman Brian Murray issued a statement regarding Kelly's testimony early Friday evening, saying, "As the Governor has said since January 9, 2014, the Governor had no knowledge prior to or during these lane realignments, and he had no role in authorizing them. Anything said to the contrary is simply untrue." The questioning by Kelly's attorney Michael Critchley Sr. attempted to show the jury an ordinary working mother who was occasionally overwhelmed by her duties as Christie's deputy chief of staff and intimidated by the governor. Kelly recounted a time before an event when she was giving Christie advice and he snapped "What do you think I am a f-----g game show host?" and threw a water bottle at her, hitting her in the arm. Kelly was afraid of the Governor, she testified, sobbing as she said so.

The decision was especially a shock to the defense, with Kelly's attorney Michael Critchley saying he based his whole defense strategy on the belief the government would have to prove Kelly conspired to punish the mayor of Fort Lee for refusing to endorse Gov. Chris Christie for re-election. Leaving court Wednesday afternoon, Critchley was upbeat and said he did not need to revise his closing statement, scheduled to be delivered Thursday. Instead, Critchley said he was seeking guidance from the highest judge of all. "I just hope God gives me the ability to present this evidence the way it should be presented, to prove Bridget Kelly's innocence," Critchley said.

ROQUE BACK IN COURT

West New York Mayor Felix Roque has had a trying 18 months. His mother and father both passed away, his new son was born, he led volunteer charity missions to Cuba and Mexico, and buried the hatchet with a longtime political rival. During all that time, Roque was under indictment as part of state case against his pain management clinic. Roque, a doctor and Hudson County Democrat who was elected to a second term as mayor in May 2015 in West New York's nonpartisan elections, has pleaded not guilty and maintained his innocence. On the verge of a trial in Bergen County Superior Court Tuesday, his lawyers and state prosecutors sparred over the questions that will be used to select the jury starting Wednesday. The charges are separate from Roque's job as mayor. Prosecutors say he referred patients to medical imaging centers in exchange for a \$100 kickback. The owner of those centers, Rehan Zuberi, turned state's evidence in 2015 and named dozens of doctors. The prosecution believes it has a strong case with Zuberi as a cooperating witness, but Roque's lawyers claim the state can't even agree on the amount of money Roque received, saying it's been upped from \$6,000 to \$240,000. In 2013, Roque was found not guilty of federal hacking charges. In July, two out of three state charges against him in the most recent case were thrown out. And Tuesday, amid last minute preparations to start Roque's commercial bribery trial this week, state prosecutors did not have a great day.

It came at a time when Christie faces just an 18% approval rating, the lowest of any state governor in 20 years. It was also held just days after the NJ Legislature failed to pass a measure that would have allowed the governor to profit from a book while in office. That bill also would have given a raise to state officials.

Almost a year ago, retired homicide detective Gary Britton and Alex Zdan went to Gilgo Beach, Long Island on the trail of the Long Island Serial Killer. Scattered along the side of a windy beachfront highway, authorities had found at least 10 bodies, victims, they believed of that serial murderer. The mystery remained: who murdered women selling their bodies over Craigslist and dumped them along Ocean Parkway? Today there is yet another storm brewing on Gilgo, and another angle to investigate: police corruption. James Burke was the colorful and powerful chief of the Suffolk County Police Department. In November, Burke was sentenced to nearly four years in federal prison for the beating of a suspect who stole his gun belt, sex toys and other items from Burke's SUV and for getting other officers to lie about it. But just last week, we found that the corruption investigation may go deeper than we thought. Buried in a filing to expunge the conviction of the man Burke beat - Christopher Loeb - Loeb's attorneys say "numerous" other cops have been indicted and pleaded guilty, and that "their files are sealed as the investigation is still ongoing."
