HOBOKEN TRAIN WRECK FOLO

Investigators continue to piece together what caused NJ Transit train No. 1614, a Pascack Valley line passenger train carrying 250 people, to crash into the Hoboken New Jersey transit terminal Thursday morning, killing one person and injuring more than 100. Tahir Qureshi, a passenger who was sitting right behind the engineer when the crash occurred, said it felt like an "explosion." Qureshi, who also survived the 9/11 terrorist attacks on the Twin Towers said, "Next thing I knew I was on the floor, basically the whole roof had collapsed and I was on the floor kind of lodged underneath." The event, however, has not detoured him from riding NJ Transit. Qureshi said because this was not a terrorist event, it was an accident, he expects to be riding the train again on Monday. Meanwhile Governor Chris Christie came to Annandale Friday for a town hall promoting the Fairness Formula, a school funding plan calculated on an equal per-pupil basis. The Governor opened his remarks with an update on the Hoboken crash. Christie confirmed the high speed as the cause but had no further details. He added it would take at least a week before investigators determine the cause.

The Bridgegate trial became about far more than just the George Washington Bridge lane closures on its 10th day Friday, as a star prosecution witness for the first time alleged potential criminal conduct by NJ Governor Chris Christie. GAS TAX APPROVED

NJ Governor Christie announced a bipartisan agreement to fund the barren Transportation Trust Fund at a last minute news conference Friday afternoon with Senate President Steve Sweeney and Assembly Speaker Vincent Prieto. The deal would impose a 23-cent tax hike on every gallon of gas sold in New Jersey, but the governor couched the proposal as a tax cut, citing a reduction in the state sales tax from 7 percent to 6.625 percent over the next two years. The bill would also eliminate the estate tax by 2018, raise the Earned Income Tax Credit for the working poor to 35 percent and provide personal exemption on state income taxes for honorably discharged members of the military. According to the Governor, the tax will add \$2 billion to the Transportation Trust Fund over the next eight years. The federal government will match those contributions, bringing the expected total to revenue to \$16 billion by 2024. The Legislature failed to pass a similar bill over the summer due to lack of support, but Speaker Prieto and Senate President Sweeney believe they have enough votes to get the bill onto the Governor's desk this time around.
