ISSUE: The anger invading American politics, rising interest rates and national debt

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 1/2/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Peter Wood, author of the book, "Wrath:America Enraged" discussed the dangerous anger that has pervaded American politics. Wood says that both people on the right and left are now using anger and outrage as a way to motivate their base. Wood says this trend is an alarming change from past methods of motivating voters and policy makers. Eric Riedle of the Manhattan Institute discussed the impact of rising interest rates on the national debt and how inflation is growing at an alarming rate. Riedle says these pressures are combining to hurt ther US economy.

ISSUE: Impact of technology on teenagers

PROGRAM: Family Talk DURATION: 26 min.

AIRED: 1/3/22, 730 and 1130 pm (part 1);1/4/22, 730 am and 1130 pm (part 2)

DESCRIPTION: Host Ryan Dobson and Dr. Kathy Koch, author of "Screens and Teens: Connecting with Our Kids in a Wireless World" discussed the impact smart phones are having as more teens see them as their best friend and safety blanket. Koch says research shows that 56% of teens associate the absence of their phones with at least one of these three emotions: loneliness, feeling upset or anxious. Koch says parents should set reasonable limits of time on their phones and to remind them that the phone is not theirs, it is their parents'. She says parents should insist on phone blackouts and encourage teens to engage with them, play board games, do puzzles, read and do outdoor exercises.

ISSUE: Automatic IRA programs, COVID causing moving to less restrictive states

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min AIRED: 1/9/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry and John C. Scott of the Pew Charitable Trusts discussed the automatic IRA programs, allowed in 8 states and two American cities as a way to make retirement plans available to employees who are not otherwise offered retirement account options and are automatically enrolled in these programs at the default contribution rate. Scott Parkinson from Club For Growth discussed the 2022 Congressional agenda and its impact on America. Eric Boehm from Reason Magazine discussed the trend of people moving from COVID restrictive states to less restrictive states and how it is changing the politics and economy of these states.

ISSUE: Winter gain management for cow-calf producers

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 1/9/22 1030 pm

DESCRIPTION: Aaron Berger and Karla Wilke, Cow-Calf Specialist at University of Nebrask, discussed the importance of proper cow-calf supplementation through the winter for Spring born calves. They discussed a study that suggests that targeting winter gain of 1.5 pounds per day is most likely to result in added body weight that is maintained throughout subsequent phases, including summer grazing and feedlot finishing and can be an economical practice. Wilke says the data suggests that spending money to supplement cattle at a low rate of gain and having that weight advantage lost in subsequent phases is costly to producers.

ISSUE: Rescuing children from sex trafficking

PROGRAM: Family Talk DURATION: 26 min.

AIRED: 1/11/22, 730 am; 1130 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Dr. James Dobson and Congresswoman Linda Smith discussed the problem of sex trafficking of children. Smith says she traveled to the brother district in Mumbai, India on a fact-finding mission and was horrified by the brutal reality she saw and was motivated to leave Congress to start an organization called "Shared Hope International" to rescue, help and heal those who are being exploited or enslaved by people using them for sex trafficking. Smith says the first essential is to assist people in identifying individuals in their communities that may be trapped in sex trafficking. Smith offers online resources at sharedhope.org to assist people wanting to help and influence legislation to fight trafficking. The online site also has educational videos and training materials to assist those wanting to help, as well as a network of people who can share in communication to help fight trafficking.

ISSUE: Voting rights bill, causes of inflation

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 1/16/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Keith Naughton of Silent Majority Strategies discussed President Biden's posture toward the emerging potential crisis that could lead to conflict between Russia and Ukraine and perhaps other countries in the former Soviet bloc. Scott Parkinson of Club For Growth discussed the challenges to state's rights by federal laws that are being presented as the voting rights bill in Congress. Parkinson says the bill is divisive and could take voting laws out of the hands of states, giving less control to the voters. Eric Boehm and Joe Lancaster of Reason Magazine discussed the negative economic impact inflation is having on families and the whole US economy.

ISSUE: Managing cow herds PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 1/23/22, 1030 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, Nebraska Beef Educator, discussed the 2021 North Dakota Livestock Research Report which contained information on the CHAPS data recording software program that works with cow-calf producers to enter and store cow herd production information and then provides a framework to analyze and compare data to other herds in the program. Berger says this program can greatly assist producers in managing, planning and comparing the productivity of their cow herds in a centralized, national program.

ISSUE: Federal Reserve raising interest rates, US Supreme Court vacancy

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 1/23/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry and David Beckworth of the Mercatus Center at George Mason University talked about the economic impact of the Federal Reserve plans to raise interest rates. Scott Parkinson of Club For Growth discussed the impact of filling the vacancy in the US Supreme Court and possible choices that may be considered by President Biden.

ISSUE: China's human rights violations, national debt

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min AIRED: 2/6/22, 10 pm.

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Olivia Enos of the Heritage Foundation discussed China's human rights violations and the need to hold them accountable at the Winter Olympics. Enos saays athletes should be able to speak out and express violations they see or experience. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the skyrocketing federal debt, now at 28.43 trillion dollars. Parkinson pointed out that this debt and its continued expansion is not sustainable and must be curtailed by making hard budget choices and by not adding to it by the stalled federal budget proposals.

ISSUE: Planning for Spring annual forages

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min AIRED: 2/13/22, 1030 pm

DESCRIPTION: Aaron Berger, Nebraska Extension Educator and Jerry Volesky, Extension Range and Forage Specialist, discussed the need to get an early start on planning and thinking about any Spring annual forages that might be contemplated. Volesky says booking seed early is important. Volosky says for Spring and cool season forages, the planting period is late March to early April, when soil temperatures are in the 42-45 degree range. Oats are the most common cool season planting choice, however spring tricale or spring barley are similar small grain options that have been found to perform well. Volesky says herbicides may have been used on the field the previous year and some have long residuals that could hinder establishment even into this spring.

ISSUE: Inflation, Presidential job approval PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 2/13/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henery and Timothy Head of the Faith and Freedom Coalition discussed President Biden's low job approval and the issues that seem to driving the numbers down. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the skyrocketing inflation rate and contributing factors beyond control and things the Administration could do the bring relief and lesson the impact on the US economy and family budgets.

ISSUE: Opportunities in Wyoming

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon "State of The State" message

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 2/14/22, 2:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon of Wyoming presented a forward-looking agenda for 2022. He called for Wyoming to embrace new opportunities and innovation in energy, education and economic development. Gordon called for a frugal budget, stating the impact of inflation and President Biden's policies are hitting Wyoming's legacy industries. Gordon renewed his call for an "all-of-the-above" energy policy that includes 100 million dollars to uses as matching funds on Wyoming energy projects. Gordon also emphasized the need to address the state's medical system, bolster the state's outdoor recreation economy and invest in the Wyoming Wildlife and Natural Resource Trust.

ISSUE: Refugees from Afghanistan resettlement

PROGRAM: Life Issues DURATION: 27 min.

AIRED: 2/27/22, 10:30 pm; 3/5/22, 12 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Don Wight, Agusta Lind and Phil Jones discussed the problem of Afghan refugees that have been displaced by their need to leave their home country and the effort being made by Samaritan's Purse International Relief to encourage churches, employers and communities to assist in establishing families in their cities. Jones and Lind explained that the need is for financial support, housing and employment. Thos who are interested in helping would be asked to make a 90 day commitment to assist Afghan families in transition. They explained that the challenge of language barriers, limited resources and inflationary costs for food and housing add to the humanitarian crisis.

ISSUE: Alzheimer's disease prevention

PROGRAM: Family Talk DURATION: 26 min.

AIRED: 3/3/22, 7:30 am and 11:30 pm (part 1); 3 / 4 /22, 7:30 am and 11:30 pm (part 2)

DESCRIPTION: Host Dr. James Dobson and guest Dr. Richard Furman, a vascular surgeon with over 30 years of experience, discussed ways to prevent Alzheimer's disease. Dr. Furman says the Alzheimer's Association has stated that half of all Alzheimer's cases could be prevented. Dr. Furman highlighted the different stages of Alzheimer's and explained why taking care of our bodies by eating the right foods, exercising and sustaining a healthy weight are keys to prevention. Furman encouraged people to take the admonition from 1 Corinthians 6:18-20 to honor God with our bodies.

ISSUE: Cryptocurrency and its impact, powers of the EPA, university vaccine mandates

PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 3/6/22, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and William Luther of the Bitcoin Policy Institute discussed the role crytocurrency is playing in the US economy and in the Russian invasion of Ukraine, as well as its role in future economic policy and regulation. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the growing power of the Environmental Protection agency and the need to make sure regulations do not infringe on individual and corporate freedoms and common sense. Dr. Paul Kengor from the Institute For Faith and Freedom at Grove City College discussed the problems created by forcing students at universities to get COVID-19 vaccinations.

ISSUE: Calf health management

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 3/12/22, 10:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Connie Biehler and Aaron Berger, Nebraska Extension Educators, talked about sound calf health management prior to and during calving. They discussed the fact that the main economic driver of a cow-calf operation is the number of calves weaned per cow exposed. Biehler pointed out that a key component to getting a calves off to the right start is to ensure they receive colostrum within the first four hours post-calving. Colostrum is the primary source of of nutrients and immunity calf and is only obtained from the first milking after calving. They also discussed the importance of detecting abnormal signs and behavior of sick calves, especially in the first two months.

ISSUE: Runaway inflation causes, Ukraine war

PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min AIRED: 3/20/22

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Scott Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the causes of runaway inflation, the effect on the U.S. economy and the fact that it is not caused by the war in Ukraine and cost of importing Russian oil, as President Biden has been claiming. Thye discussed the many policy and regulatory decisions by the Biden Administration as the true cause the spike in inflation. Colin Hanna of Let Freedom Ring, USA discussed the controversy over sending Ukraine the weapons they need to defend against Russian military aggression against the people and infrastructure of Ukraine.

ISSUE: New antibiotic restrictions for livestock

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 20 min. AIRED: 3/27/22, 10:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, Nebraska Extension Educator, Beck Funk, DVM and Animal Health Teaching Specialist, along with Jesse Fulton, Director of Nebraska Beef Quality Assurance discussed the Veterinary Feed Directive #263, an FDA governed "guidance for the industry, which oversees and regulates medically important antibiotics delivered to livestock via feed and/or water, leaving a significant loophole for those products that were available over the counter. They pointed out that regardless of the delivery mechanism, the drugs need to voluntarily be brought under veterinary oversight or prescription marketing status and must contain the prescription statement, "Caution:Federal law restricts this drug to use by or on the order of a licensed veterinarian. The guests said that producers are required to establish a valid veterinary-client patient relationship as these products may no longer be on local feedstore or farm supply store shelves.
