KLWD/KWCF PROGRAMS/ISSUES- 1ST QUARTER 2021

ISSUE: Controversy surrounding 1619 Project, 2021 Congressional agenda, 2020 election fraud

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 1/3/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Peter Wood, author of "1620: A Critical Response to the 1619 Project", discussed the initiative to explain U.S History to highlight the consequences of slavery and the contributions of Black Americans at the center of the materials. They discussed the fact that lawmakers in 3 states are seeking to ban the materials and the conflict surrounding both the materials and the actions to try to ban them. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the 2021 Congressional agenda being proposed. Collin Hanna of Let Freedom Ring discussed election fraud in the 2020 election and what is being done to resolve it and to prevent future problems.

ISSUE: Determining annual cow costs

PROGRAM: Beefwatch

DURATION: 30 min

AIRED: 1/10/21, 330 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, University of Nebraska Extension Educator, discussed the factors involved in determining annual cow costs and doing the necessary economic analysis. He outlined the important 3 categories of costs to look at: feed, labor/equipment and cow depreciation. Berger urged cattle operators to take the time to do the careful planning that is necessary to evaluate all of the costs associated with the cow-calf enterprise. Berger says that other expenses will occur, such as breeding expense and veterinary costs, but they tend to be significantly less than the "Big Three".

ISSUE: Wyoming legislative priorities for new session

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon address to Legislature

DURATION: 35 min

AIRED: 1/12/21, 2 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon addressed the legislature, media and Wyoming citizens to outline both budget and policy priorities for 2021. The Gov. emphasized the need for the state to live within its means, defend the energy industry and revitalize education. Gordon said the state successfully distributed 1.25 billion dollars in Federal CARES Act money in response to the COVID-19 pandemic, including nearly 500 million dollars that was delivered to Wyoming small businesses, schools, long term care facilities, hospitals, first responders, local government and to support broadband access. He also stressed the role higher education plays in diversifying Wyoming's economy.

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Paul Preston about the legal issues related to the recall of California's Governor Gavin Newsom and its impact on the state and nation. Scott Parkinson of Club For Growth discussed the impact of the Georgia U.S. Senate elections. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discusses the reasons the GOP lost the Georgia Senate elections and what the party needs to work on for future elections.

ISSUE: Pressures on family caregiver's mental and physical health

DESCRIPTION: Dr. Linda Mintle, marriage and family counselor and licensed clinical worker discussed the difficulties she experienced in providing care to her seriously ill mother. She discussed the pressures of decision making, talking with doctors and the emotional, spiritual and physical issues created by taking care of an ill family member. Mintle says families should attempt to resolve any issues with family members who are receiving care, but to realize some issues may not be fully resolved. She explains that caregivers need help too and also need patience, understanding and grace as they try to honor their parents or other family member they are providing care for. She also stressed the need to carefully and prayerfully enter in to the decision to provide care, as opposed to other options that may be available.

ISSUE: The GOP future, trade policy changes

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Phil Kerpen of American Commitment discussed the impact of business closure orders mandated by certain states and the economic problems the closures create for businesses, consumers and the overall economy. Scott Parkinson discussed the retirement of Ohio Senator Bob Portman and the impact his retirement may have on the balance of power in the U. S. Senate. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the economic impact of President Biden's re-regulation of U.S. Industries and businesses and its effect on future economic growth.

ISSUE: Pandemic's effect on family budgets

DESCRIPTION: Host Dr. James Dobson and Rachel Cruze, author and personal finance expert discussed the fact that many families have been financially blindsided by the 2020 coronavirus pandemic. Cruze and Dr. Dobson outlined steps to take to get back on solid economic footing, how to deal with the anxiety and behaviors toward money and identified biblical principles that need to be applied to becoming economically stable. Cruze also discussed the importance of having a family budget and living by it.

ISSUE: Federal economic policy, proposed COVID-19 relief package, proposed rise in minimum wage

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Dr. Samuel Gregg of the Acton Institute about the crafting of the federal economic policy under President Biden and its impact on the U. S. economy. Scott Parkinson of Club For Growth discussed the proposed COVID-19 relief package and its chance of passing both the House and Senate. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine explained how congressional Democrats plan to change the rules to enact a 15 dollar per hour minimum wage and how it will effect businesses' costs of operation and consumer costs for goods and services.

ISSUE: Nutritional considerations during calving season

PROGRAM: Beefwatch

DURATION: 20 min.

AIRED: 2/13/21, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, Extension educator and Karla Wilke, Cow/Calf Systems and Stocker Management discussed the importance of producers assessing the body condition scores and sending feed samples to a commercial laboratory for nutrient analysis, Wilke says that the drought across the West and Great Plains has made hay scarce for many producers. Additionally, the pandemic has affected oil prices which in turn has impacted the supplementation sources for many beef producers. Wilke says the tight feed supply may have resulted in many pregnant cows entering the calving season with little to no extra body condition reserves. Wilke also says most early spring calving cows are not yet grazing green grass at peak lactation making it necessary to meet their nutrient demands with harvested forages and supplementation. Producers need to be prepared to feed a diet during calving season that will prevent body condition score loss in cows that may not have excess body condition score to give this year. Wilke suggests calving rations to limit BCS loss prior to the 2021 breeding season.

ISSUE: The surge in Bitcoin, child welfare policy

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the surge in Bitcoin use and demand and how it is reshaping the way people do business and make money. They discussed the risk involved in Bitcoin investments. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine talked about the proposed reforms to child welfare policy that are being proposed by the new administration and how the changes can impact children, families and supporting agencies and care providers. Colin Hanna of Let Freedom Ring discussed the impeachment process in the Senate and its impact on future presidents as well as President Trump's legacy.

ISSUE: Mental health effects of the coronavirus pandemic

PROGRAM: Pandemic Mental Health Interview

DURATION: 15 min.

AIRED: 2/21/21, 7 pm

DESCRIPTION: Ken Duckworth, Chief Medical Officer of the New Hampshire Alliance on Mental Illness, stated that the pandemic has created a mental health crisis, pointing out that 4 in 10 people have had their mental health effected by the pandemic. He said that multiple stresses have converged on many people, such as unemployment and the threat of unemployment, as businesses and industries face uncertain futures. The unemployment and its economic impact on families also has effected the physical health of many. A record number of suicides, including drug overdoses has actually caused the American life expectancy to decrease. Duckworth said more people are struggling with addictions, depression and growing fears of even leaving their houses for fear of getting sick. Duckworth said that the bright side of the pandemic's effect on mental health is that more people are becoming more empathetic, caring and sensitive toward those who are struggling with mental health issues. He urged agencies, individuals and churches to be creative in delivering services and reaching out to those in mental health crisis during the pandemic.

KLWD/KWCF ISSUES/PROGRAMS- 1ST QUARTER 2021

ISSUE: Unreliability of solar power, impact of the presidential impeachment vote, asset forfeiture reform efforts.

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 2/21/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Gregory Whitestone from CO2 Coalition discussed the unreliability of wind and solar power as a replacement for traditional power sources, such as coal. They talked about the high future energy costs that could result from heavy dependency on renewable energy sources. Scott Parkinson of Club For Growth talked about the impact of the latest presidential impeachment vote on the future of the presidency and the ability for lawmakers to be able to work across party lines to enact meaningful legislation. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine gave an update on proposed asset forfeiture reform efforts in Arizona and New Mexico, as well as other states who are considering reform.

ISSUE: Relaxation of coronavirus governmental mandates

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 2/26/21, 2:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Wyoming Gov. Mark Gordon held a press conference to announce the removal of a health order that applied to the operation of personal care services, as well as a continued relaxing of COVID-19 protocols. The Governor said the improvement of Wyoming's metrics allows the relaxation of restrictions on barber shops, nail and hair salons, personal care services and an increase in attendance limits on indoor and outdoor gatherings. The governor said that if improvement continues more restrictions will be lifted and that vaccination efforts will continue to expand, making further relaxation of restrictions likely. The changes apply to the March 1-15 time period, after which time another review will be made.

ISSUE: Wyoming mask mandate and further relaxation of health mandates

PROGRAM: Governor Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 3/8/21, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon announced the lifting of the statewide mask mandate and other relaxation of health orders, effective March 16<sup>th</sup>. The Governor said the decision reflects the state's continually improving health metrics and is consistent with the Governor's approach of balancing public health with protecting livelihoods. In addition to the lifting of the face mask mandate other indoor and outdoor gathering restrictions will be lifted as well. Gordon says the face covering protocol will remain in place for K-12 schools as a safety measure to ensure that classroom learning and all student activities can continue to occur safely. The Governor said nearly 100,000 vaccines have been administered and 19 percent of the state's residents have received at least one dose of the vaccine.

ISSUE: The challenge of parents staying connected with teens in a digital age

PROGRAM: Family Talk

DURATION: 27 min.

AIRED: 3/12/21, 7:30 am

DESCRIPTION: Host Tim Clinton and guest David Eaton, author and founder of Axis, a non-profit organization that helps more than 200,000 parents and teenagers communicate and understand one another, despite age and technology barriers, discussed the challenges of establishing values and staying connected to teens in the midst of the cultural dangers of sexting and pornography. Eaton says the Axis website has over 300 parent empowering resources to establish an ongoing conversation to stay connected to teens. Eaton says parents need to expand their communications skills in expressing the potential dangers of online and phone sex, sexting and the high risk of danger and erosion of values that can be the result of engaging in these practices. Eaton urges parents to invest in relationships with teens to help them make healthy decisions.

ISSUE: Anti-price gouging laws, pork barrel spending impact on economy

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 3/14/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Gavin Roberts discussed the impact of anti-price gouging laws, especially during the pandemic and the impact it may have on free market, laws of supply and demand and government intervention into the price of goods and services. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the "Restore America Act", providing unrestricted direct cash support for small businesses with smaller gross receipts and less than 50 employees as well as self employed and charitable organizations. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the pork barrel spending contained in the COVID-19 act and its impact on the economy.

ISSUE: The impact of the "Pro Act" on workers, possible end to the senate filibuster

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 3/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry and Liya Palagashvili from the Mercatus Center at George Mason University discussed the "Pro Act", the Protecting The Right To Organize Act and its impact of workers, especially in "right to work" states. The act also would impact the "gig economy", the free market system in which temporary positions are common and organizations hire independent workers for short term commitments. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the impact of the possible end to the Senate filibuster, the process of slowing or stopping legislation through a series of delays and procedural roadblocks to enacting bills. Col. Frank Ryan, USMC (Ret.) explained the difference between income inequality and wealth inequality and how it is impacting the U.S. Economy.
