ISSUE: The health risks of vaping PROGRAM: The Truth About Vaping

DESCRIPTION: Laurel Sisler, Director at the University of North Carolina tobacco treatment program, discussed the dangers and health risks of vaping, especially to teenagers, young adults and those using e-cigarettes to try to quit smoking. Sisler says the vapors used are not regulated by the FDA so they pose the same health risks that tobacco poses because nicotine levels are not regulated, so users could be exposed to even more nicotine than traditional cigarettes. In addition, Sisler says people who e-cigs to quit smoking are being deceived because facts show that they are not effective in quitting smoking. E-cigarettes can also lead to a condition called "cobalt lungs", an illness that is not treatable.

Boehm explained that recently homeowners in Michigan hacve been especially targeted but it is a growing national problem. He discussed ways to protect from this type of threat.

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, extension beef educator, interviewed Dr. Mary Drewnoski, extension beef systems specialist, about the impact of cold stress on a cow's energy requirements. Drewnoski says cow/calf producers need to have a plan in place, such as having a "body condition score" a plan that considers the threshold at which cattle have to start using energy to maintain their body temperature, known as the "lower critical temperature". Drewnoski also says that getting cows into into good condition early in the winter can be effective in managing risk in bad weather. Additionally, a practical strategy to consider is to put thin cows in a group with the first calf heifers, as both have higher energy requirements in the winter.
