ISSUE: Infrastructure deal impact on economy, January 6 impact, problems with U.S. Postal Service

PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 7/4/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Veronique DeRugy of the Mercatus Center at George Mason University about the impact of the infrastructure deal and its effect on the economy and services that would be provided by the deal. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the political implications of the January 6th congressional investigation. Parkinson questioned the motivations that may not lead to any progress in coming to conclusions regarding the Jan. 6th riot. Eric Boehm and Christian Britschgi of Reason Magazine looked into problems plaguing the U.S. Postal service, both economic and business practices.

ISSUE: Summer forage quality for cattle producers

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 7/11/21, 10:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, extension educator, alog with guests Kacie McCarthy, University of Nebraska Cow-Calf Specialist and Travis Mulliniks, University of Nebraska Beef Nutritionist, discussed the forage quality and impacts on intake and animal performance during summer months and the fact that the rapid change brought on by factors like rainfall, excess temperatures and other factors. They discussed the fact that because of environmental challenges and dynamic changes in forage quality, a good supplementation plan may be needed to meet performance goals. If forage quality is low, a high protein supplement is recommended as an effective way to increase forage digestibility and intake.

ISSUE: President Biden's "Promoting Competition Plan", upcoming battle over federal budget, vaccine

mandates

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min AIRED: 7/18/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry and Alden Abbott from the Mercatus Center at George Mason University discussed President Biden's "Promoting Competition Plan" and its effect on growing businesses and consumers alike. While promoting free and fair competition, the plan could create a new level of unwanted government oversight and challenge the free enterprise it is attempting to promote. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the upcoming battle over the federal budget and its prospects of being passed. Dr. Paul Kengor from The Institute for faith and Freedom at Grove City College talked about the growing COVID-19 vaccine mandates being imposed by some employers and industries and the possibility of future government attempts to mandate vaccinations.

ISSUE: COVID-19 mask mandates for schools PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon Press Conference

DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 9/4/21, 3 pm

DSESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon announced that he will not issue a mask mandate for schools and said he is committed to standing behind local school districts as they make decisions on how students can safely return to their classrooms. The Gov. said he will not require districts to implement mask mandates. He said he will work with the Wyoming Department of Education and the Wyoming Department of Health to ensure districts are prepared to respond to changes in local conditions with equipment, testing and expertise. The Governor also encouraged people to get vaccinated and said he firmly supports the rights of private businesses to operate in the manner they deem best and issued a directive preventing entities, including local governments and private businesses, not to impose vaccine mandates.

ISSUE: U.S. Prosperity index, federal budget, defunding police

PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 8/8/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry and Shaun Flanigan of the Legatum Institute discussed the 2021 United States Prosperity Index, a tool that the Legatum Institute has provided to measure the condition of the economy in states and in local counties. Scott Parkinson discussed the federal budget and how it is being used by Speaker Nancy Pelosi for political messaging. Dan Alban of the Institute for Justice talked about potential new regulations banning independent tax preparers and making minimum standard for paid preparers to meet and may require them to take continuing education to maintain right to operate. Dr. Paul Kengor from the Institute for Faith and Freedom at Grove City College about the drive by some cities to defund the police and the negative impact it would have and is already having of the safety of citizens.

ISSUE: Blue-Green algae impacts on cattle

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 8/8/21, 1030 pm

DESCRIPTION: Aaron Berger, University of Nebraska Extension Educator and Amy Timmerman, Extension Educator, discussed the importance of identifying Blue-Green algae that blooms commonly on stagnant ponds or dugouts where there is a potential of having high nutrient levels. Timmerman says producers should monitor their grazing cattle and look for signs of toxicity, such as weakness, staggering, difficulty breathing, paddling, convulsions and death, all that can occur within 2-4 hours following ingestion. Timmerman says copper sulfate may be added to the pond or dugout to control blue-green algae growth

ISSUE: Role of moms in developing manhood in their boys

PROGRAM: Family Talk Weekend

DESCRIPTION: Dr. James Dobson and guest Rhonda Stoppe, author of the book, "Moms Raising Sons To Be Men" discussed the important role mothers play in helping to develop manhood and maturity in their sons. Stoppe warned of the fact that "it is possible for a mother to deny a boy his manhood as he grows up" Stoppe gave practical suggestions to prevent this from happening. Stoppe discussed how to guide a son without hovering or smothering, ways to communicate so a boy will listen and be heard and explained that a mom's role is to partner with God in developing maturity and manhood in their boys.

ISSUE: End of the war in Afghanistan, congressional spending bills

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 8/22/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Lowman Henry talked with James Carafano of the Heritage Foundation about the chaotic Biden administration's withdrawal from Afghanistan and the political, economic and humanitarian crisis that has been created. They also discussed the ongoing negative effect on the people who are now under Taliban rule. Scott Parkinson of the Club for Growth discussed the spending bills working through Congress and their impact on the U.S. Economy. Liz Nolan Brown of Reason Magazine discussed the U.S. Postal service social media snooping program that the federal government has been covertly using to inform government agencies across the government of inflammatory posts and information and as a way to get information about planned anti government rallies or protests.

ISSUE: COVID-19 face mask mandates, Wyoming COVID numbers

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon media conference

AIRED: 8/16/21, 3 pm DURATION: 15 min.

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Gordon discussed the question of mask mandates coming from his office in light of the rising COVID case numbers. The Governor says he will not impose any new requirements for face masks. He repeated earlier statements that he leave the issue of face masks and new restrictions that may be need up to local government entities. The Governor dis express growing concern over the rising COVID numbers in Wyoming and again urged residents to choose to get a vaccine. He pointed out that 34 percent of Wyomingites have been vaccinated. He stated that getting people vaccinated would insure businesses can stay open and help keep Wyoming's economy healthy.

ISSUE: Kids and bullying PROGRAM: Family Talk DURATION: 26 min. AIRED: 9/2/21, 730 am

DESCRIPTION: Dr. James Dobson and Dr. Tim Clinton, along with a panel of children and their parents shared their stories and perspectives on bullying experiences in schools and on social media. Parents also explained that, while the schools tried to work out better protections for students against bullying, the parents of the victims and aggressors do not always want to get involved in the solution or administer parental discipline. Dr. Dobson challenged all parties, including school officials to get involved. Dobson also reminded children of their value in God's eyes and urged parents to stay in touch with their children on a daily basis and encouraged them to discuss bullying issues with them and not try to stay silent.

ISSUE: Government's broadband plan, school choice, future of Social Security and Medicare.

PROGRAM: American radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 9/5/21, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Phil Kerpen about the federal government's plan to provide broadband services across the country. Kerpen says the plan infringes on free enterprise and stated that broadband development should be the role of private businesses, investors and entrepreneurs to avoid government control and provide competition in the marketplace. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the growing support for and interest in School Choice, arguing that public schools should not be the only option for parents and children. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine talked about the rapidly approaching insolvency of Social Security and Medicare and what Congress should be doing to make sure the programs stay funded.

ISSUE: Reducing pinkeye in cattle

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 9/12/21, 1030 pm

DESCRIPTION: Aaron Berger, Nebraska Extension Educator and Conner Biehler, Extension Cattle Educator discussed the contributing causes of bovine keratoconjunctivitis or pinkeye in cattle. Biehler explained that rainfall and humidity effect forage production, contributing to a fly problem that creates an environment for the rapid spread of pinkeye. Biehler says the focus for producers to prevent an outbreak is to control the fly population, such a s pour-ons, fly tags, sprays or dust bags. Biehler also suggested that producers could use other methods, such as clipping mature seedheads to reduce dust or foreign objects, provide plenty of shade for cattle and provide proper vaccination protocols.

ISSUE: Affordable housing PROGRAM: Life Issues DURATION: 28 min. AIRED: 9/19/21, 530 am

DESCRIPTION: Host Don Wight and Brenda Kirk, Energy Capital Habitat for Humanity Executive Director, discussed the plans to continue with home repair projects for community residents in need. Kirk said the area Habitat for Humanity non profit organization has completed several projects and has now selected a family for a new home build. Kirk says several leadership and volunteer positions are available to qualified individuals in administration, organization, construction and general laborers who can provide building skills in the current and upcoming projects. Kirk also explained that financial support for the projects and home build are appreciated will help provide more affordable and liveable housing for those in need.

Bob encouraged those struggling with addictions to reach out for help through programs and people available in their area and to see isolation and keeping addictions secret as an enemy to recovery.
