ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its effects on Wyoming residents

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 min. AIRED: 7/1/2020, 3 PM

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon updated the press on the coronavirus pandemic, explaining that Wyoming has had an increase in cases in the last two weeks. Gov. Gordon said he was reluctant to go back to heightened restrictions after reopening businesses and services. He urged state residents to take personal responsibility so the state does not have to issue mandates. State Health Officer Dr. Alexia Harrist outlined contact tracing procedures and emphasized the need to continue to social distance and wear masks. Supt. of Public Instruction Jillian Ballow discussed school reopening plans and said new health protocols would be a major point of emphasis during the school year.

ISSUE: Health care costs, U.S. Supreme Court decision on school choice, racial equality

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 7/5/20, 10 PM

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Dave Chase of Health Rosetta about the rising healthcare costs on municipal government and how those costs can be better managed and reduced. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine and Corey DeAngelis of the Reason Foundation discussed a recent Supreme Court ruling in favor of school choice and its effect on students,, parents and communities. Dr. Paul Kengor of the Institute for Faith and Freedom at Grove City College discussed issues related to racial equality and how Marxists are attempting to hijack the narrative and politics of the movement.

ISSUE: Managing small grain silage

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 25 min. AIRED: 7/4/20, 2:30 PM

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, extension educator and guests Brad Schick and Ben Beckman, extension specialists discussed using cover crops small grains such as wheat, triticale, barley, oats or rye for seeding to cover the bare soil, collect incentive payments from government agencies after a cash crop is harvested, to have grazable feed, hay, silage or a combination. Schick and Beckman said producers should make sure when making small grain silage with a cash crop that compliance with crop insurance is maintained. They explained that small grain silage can result in high quality feed and have good animal performance if put up correctly.

ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its effects on Wyoming residents

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 min. AIRED: 7/8/20, 3 PM

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon once again explained the concerns surfacing with the trend in higher numbers of diagnosed coronavirus cases. He also explained that the current health orders will remain in place for the time being, but could revert backwards if cases continue to rise. State Health Officer Alexia Harrist explained the basis for quarantines and the need for residents to cooperate to stop the spread of the virus. State Supt. Of Public Instruction Jillian Ballow outlined the "Smart Start Program" for fall implementation in Wyoming Schools, featuring a 3 tiered program of operation for public schools. Gov. Gordon also explained the application process for state funds available to businesses effected economically by the pandemic.

ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and it's impact on Wyoming residents

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 Min. AIRED: 7/28/20, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Gordon updated information on the coronavirus and its impact on Wyoming, expressing concern that case numbers continue to rise. The Governor also urged residents to wear masks, social distance and limit participation in large public gatherings where exposure to the virus could be greater. Gordon also explained further budget cuts that will be necessary and stated that Wyoming must become more economically diversified and less dependent on mineral tax revenue. He also explained the State Land and Investment Board's decision to bid on the Oxidental land purchase and its benefits to the state's economy should the bid be accepted. Dr. Alexia Harrist, State Health Officer also updated pandemic statistics and also expressed concern stemming from rising case numbers.

ISSUE: New stimulus package, pandemic price gouging

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Shaun Flanaganof of the Legatum Institute and Scott Parkinson from the Club For Growth about the new stimulus package being negotiated in Congress. They discussed different proposals and their potential impact on the the U.S. economy and family budgets hit hard by financial effects of the coronavirus pandemic. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine and Ryan Young of the Competitive Enterprise discussed reports of price gouging on items needed during the pandemic, the economic hardship it is causing and what can be done to stop it from happening.

Colin Hanna of Let Freedom Ring discussed the senate hearings on the growing issue of civil unrest sweeping through the country and what steps should be taken to restore order, especially in cities impacted by violent protests

ISSUE: U.S. Economy reopening, coronavirus impact on schools reopening

PROGRAM: American Radio Journal

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 8/2/20, 10 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the need for the U.S. Economy to fully reopen and steps that need to be taken by states to fully implement the reopening. They also discussed the negative economic impact of not reopening. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine talked about the issue of schools reopening and about the role teachers union demands will play in the decision making and planning for school districts. Col. Frank Ryan, USMC (Ret.) discussed the issue of mask wearing and its effectiveness, as well as the conflicting information being presented.

ISSUE: Christian schools and the plans to reopen for the fall semester

PROGRAM: Life Issues DURATION: 30 min.

AIRED: 8/11/20, 12 pm; 8/16/20, 7 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Don Wight talked with Jen Verburg, Administrator of Heritage Christian School about the importance of Christian education, the effect the coronavirus pandemic had on schools and the reopening plans for the fall semester. Verburg explained the benefits of Christian schools as an alternative to public schools. She also discussed fall semester reopening plans and health protocols that will be put into place to protect students and teachers as well as an alternative plan for small group and online virtual classes should schools be forced to close in the event of a health department mandate resulting from a future outbreak of the coronavirus or other outbreaks.

ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its effect on Wyoming economy and schools

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 min. AIRED: 8/12/20, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon gave an update on progress being made in the battle against the coronavirus pandemic. State Health Officer Alexia Harrist explained that while there are currently 407 active confirmed cases of the virus, the numbers are on the decline. She urged Wyoming residents to take health recommendations seriously by following health department guidelines. Supt. of Public Instruction Jillian Ballow discussed plans being implemented by schools should they experience covid outbreaks during the new school year beginning with the fall semester. Ballow also explained health protocols for schools as they reopen and combine in school learning with virtual learning for those who may be effected by the virus.

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry and Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the details and impact of the President's COVID-19 economic relief executive orders would have on businesses and workers as well the unemployed in the U.S. Eric Boehm and C.J. Ciarmella of Reason Magazine talked about the 2020 Presidential election campaign and the recent announcement of California senator Kamala Harris as Joe Biden's Vice Presidential nominee and how the race is shaped by this event.

ISSUE: Determining actual pounds of meat on a beef animal purchased

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 20 min. AIRED: 8/22/20, 1:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Extension Educator and host Aaron Berger, Randy Saner, Nebraska Extension Educator and Brianna Buseman, Extension Assistant Professor at University of Nebraska Lincoln discussed how many pounds of beef can be expected by consumers from a beef animal purchased from a local cattle producer or 4-H member for custom processing. Saner and Buseman pointed out that dressing percentage is an important term as it represents the portion of the live animal weight that transfers to the hot carcass weight, the weight of the unchilled carcass in pounds after the head, hide and internal organs have been removed. The dressing percentage formula is calculated as hot carcass weight divided by the live weight times 100. Buseman explained that when consumers who know these factors they can be much more informed buyers.

ISSUE: Mental health in adolescents PROGRAM: Family Talk Weekend

DURATION: 26 min. AIRED: 8/29/20, 6:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Dr. Tim Clinton and guest Dr. Matt Stafford discussed the growing stress and anxiety and its overwhelming impact on on today's youth, from pre-teens to young adults. Dr. Clinton and Dr. Stafford talked about the mental health issues that are affecting young people. They offered insights into the special needs this age group and what parents, families, churches and concerned people can do to help bring hope and stability to today's youth in crisis. Making sure youth have a sense of connection and a door open to express their particular stresses ane issues are key recommendations for those who are providing care and friendship to this age group.

Kirk also explained the need for community leaders and professionals to serve on committees and fill board positions.
