ISSUE: Harvesting a market animal at home

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 11/28/20, 330 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, Nebraska Extension Educator, Brianna Buseman, Youth Meat Extension Educator and Carol Schwarz, Nebraska Extension Educator discussed things to consider when looking to buy market animals to harvest at home. They explained that food safety is a priority so consideration should be given to insure you can properly cool the carcass and keep it clean and to prevent bacteria from growing. They also discussed the need to ensure humane handling, harvesting the animal the animal without impacting the meat quality and ensuring that you have the equipment and facilities to work efficiently, safely, in a cool environment ane have the ability to store the final product. The gusts pointed out that, although it may seem like a simple task, home harvest is very labor intensive and requires a lot of planning.

ISSUE: Packing the Supreme Court, potential pandemic relief package, climate change policy

DESCRIPTION: Host Lownam Henry and Thomas Jipping of the Heritage Foundation about the potential Democratic plan to pack the U.S. Supreme Court and how it could influence future court rulings. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the potential of a COVID-19 relief package and the chances of it being passed before 2021. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine talked about climate change policy and how it could drastically change under a Biden administration and its impact on fossil fuels, coal and other industries.

ISSUE: Health concerns during the holiday season

PROGRAM: Life Issues DURATION: 26 min. AIRED: 12/6/20, 7 pm

DESCRIPTION: Host Don Wight and Lori Shemek, nationally known speaker, TV guest and author of "Fire Up Your Fat Burn" and "How To Fight FATflamation" discussed the challenges people face in making healthy eating choices during the holidays and when times are stressful. Dr. Shemek also explained the serious problems that inflammation caused by too much unhealthy sugar can cause, such as diabetes, heart disease and cancer. Dr. Shemek explained the negative tie between brain chemistry and sugar intake. She also discussed the addictive nature of sugar and that it is a form of addiction that is as destructive as other forms of addiction. Dr. Shemek suggests that moderation, especially during the holidays can be contained by making firm decisions to limit sugar and committing to making firm decisions ahead of time and to have a plan to do healthier things when being tempted to eat sugar when tired, depressed or when feeling like a victim that needs to be rewarded.



ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its effect on Wyoming

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 40 min. AIRED: 11/13/20, 11 am

DESCRIPTION: Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon his concerns with the recent rise in coronavirus cases in the state which is taxing health care workers and hospitals.. He also announced that out of state health care workers are being brought in from other states to help handle the caseload. Gov. Gordon says he has been meeting with Wyoming business leaders who are asking for help from the state to keep businesses open and to do so safely, as well as maintaining a healthy workforce The Gov. passionately expressed that he believes Wyoming residents are not doing enough to stop the virus and said he will be considering new, stricter health orders in the next week to ten days if case numbers keep rising. He announced that he is extending the current health orders for the time being. Wyoming Director of Public Health Mike Ceballos says some community spread are coming in areas where outbreaks are rampant. He urged residents to stay vigilant in practicing the things that have been uged throughout the pandemic such as social distancing, wearing face masks and avoiding larger gatherings. Gov. Gordon says he is working with schools to make sure they continue to remain open and safe while maintaining the balance between in person and online classes.

The at-home test is a test where a person can collect a sample and test the sample at home. The test gives results in 30 minutes or less. The accuracy of any diagnostic test depends on many factors, including whether the sample was collected properly. For PCR tests, which are typically analyzed in a laboratory, test results may be affected by the conditions in which the test was shipped to the laboratory. Colin Hanna from Let Freedom Ring, USA discussed the growing importance of the the U.S. Senate runoff race in Georgia.

ISSUE: Divorce and the impacts on children and blended families

PROGRAM: Daily Bible Study

DURATION: 27 min. AIRED: 11/2/20, 12 pm

DESCRIPTION: Pastor Don Wight discussed the biblical instruction on divorce and the importance of attempting to resolve conflicts in marriage, especially when the impact effects children. Drawing on the instruction in 1 Corinthians 7, Ephesians 5-6, and 1 Peter 3, Pastor Don explained the need to have proper order and proper treatment of one another in marital relations and the proper treatment of children toward their parents and parents toward their children. He urged couples to reach out for help in troubled times in their marriages. He also discussed the importance of making the extra effort needed to help children in blended families function well together and handle discipline and conflict issues constructively.

ISSUE: Barriers and benefits of manure use in fields

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 11/7/20, 330 pm

DESCRIPTION: University of Nebraska Extension Educator Aaron Berger and a panel of experts discussed the benefits and problems that can be encountered in using manure in cropping systems. They also discussed a survey and input from 957 farmers and their advisers to get their perpesctive on this issue. A wide range of challenges associated with animal manure, such as the cost of transporting manure were discussed. They pointed out that as manure is moved greater distances costs can exceed manure value. Berger and the experts encouraged farmers to carefully plan out and weigh the overall costs when making management decisions about using manure and fertilizer. The survey revealed that planning a fertility program that takes advantage of the strengths of both manure and fertilizer improves the opportunity for yield gains for new users of manure.

DESCRIPTION: Host Lowman Henry talked with Thomas Jipping of the Heritage Foundation about the Supreme Court nominee Amy Coney Barrett's judicial philosophy and the changes of Senate confirmation. Scott Parkinson of the Club For Growth discussed the impact of the first Presidential debate. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine explained why Pennsylvania could be the Florida of 2000 in

the 2020 election in reporting election results and how it may need to be resolved.

ISSUE: Coronavirus' impact on Wyoming.

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 min. AIRED: 10/5/20, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Gov. Mark Gordon expressed concerns about Wyoming's rising coronavirus case numbers and the rise in hospitalizations in the state. He says he expects Wyoming residents to act reasonably and abide by in place state and federal health advisories and CDC guidelines. Dr. Alexia Harrist explained the critical need for cooperation and expressed warnings from health care providers and hospitals. She announced that the state would make available free saliva tests that can be administered at home. Harrist also announced new guidance for nursing homes to allow for visitation of residents by family members. She also warned that Halloween could be a potential virus spreader and urged residents to consider and prepare for the potential risks. Gov. Gordon also gave an upate on the Mullen fire ikn the Medicine Bow National. Forest, which is only 14 percent contained.

ISSUE: Frosted forage dangers for cattle and cattle producers

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 10/10/20, 2:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Nebraska Extension Educator Aaron Berger discussed the dangers that exist for grazing cattle when some forages are frosted. Berger explained that when grazing alfalfa in the fall, bloat remains a potential problem to cattle, especially during the first 3-5 days after alfalfa has been exposed to freezing temperatures. Berger says when grazing sorghums, forage or grain, sorghumsudangrass hybrids, and sudangrass, certain conditions may cause livestock to be poisoned by prussic acid. Frost is one of these conditions. Berger says producers should remove cattle before a frost and then wait 5-7 days after the frost to turn livestock onto these plants. Another option is to wait several days after the entire plant and shoots are killed by subsequent frost before grazing.

Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine talked about complicating factors that may cause the general election results to be delayed.

ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its effect on Wyoming residents

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 60 min. AIRED: 10/21/20, 3 pm

DESCRIPTION: Wyoming Governor Mark Gordon provided an update on the pandemic, expressing concern that case numbers and hospitalizations are continuing to rise. He also thanked health care workers for their front line service. He also discussed the economic impact the virus is having on Wyoming workers and businesses. Dr. Alexia Harrist, State Health Officer stressed the need to follow safety guidelines, wear masks and social distance. Harrist also urged residents to avoid larger gatherings where the virus is easily spread. Secretary of State Ed Buchanan explained safety precautions and procedures that are being taken for the upcoming election. Dr. Ken Thorell, CEO of Wyoming Regional Medical Center in Cheyenne discussed the impact the pandemic is having on the hospital and its staff and pleaded with residents to take the safety guidelines seriously so that Wyoming hospitals can continue to handle the caseload.

ISSUE: Potential election fraud, U.S. Senate races and the future of the Supreme Court

ISSUE: Coronavirus pandemic and its impact on Wyoming residents

PROGRAM: Gov. Mark Gordon press conference

DURATION: 30 min. AIRED: 12/7/20, 2 pm

DESCRIPTION: Wyoming Gov. Mark Gordon, citing rising COVID-19 hospitalizations and deaths, announced a new statewide indoor face mask order and further restrictions on gathering sizes and reduced hours for certain businesses. The order goes into effect Dec. 9th and extends to Jan. 8th. Dr. Alexia Harrist, State Health Officer, explained that 16 Wyoming counties already have a mask mandate and expressed hope that the further measures being taken will slow the case rate as well as hospitalizations and deaths in the state. Gov. Gordion explained that Wyoming counties can opt out of the restrictions as COVID-19 transmission rates fall below benchmarks designated by the White House guidelines. Gordon also said federal COVID relief dollars from the CARES Act will expire at the end of the month. He urges businesses needing to participate in the program to move as quickly as possible in applying.

Scott Parkinson talked about the importance of the Georgia U.S. Senate special election and its impact on the Senate balance of power. Eric Boehm of Reason Magazine discussed the minimum wage hike in New York and the debate in other states considering hiking minimum wage pay rates and its impact on small and medium size businesses.

ISSUE: Beef replacement heifer value for 2020-2021 production season

PROGRAM: Beefwatch DURATION: 15 min. AIRED: 12/26/20, 3:30 pm

DESCRIPTION: Nebraska Extension Educators Aaron Berger, Randy Saner, T.L. Meyer and Matt Stockton discussed the factors involved in determining a respectable heifer value for the coming 2020-21 production season. They discussed the four factors that affect value for both retained and purchased replacements; longevity, costs vs. value, genetic and phenotypical compatibility with herd mates and operator goals and management styles. They also pointed out that producers must know two things about their operation; the annual cost of production per cow and the replacement rate, the number of heifers needed to replace culled cows.
