ISSUE: Coronavirus outbreak PROGRAM: Life Issues DURATION: 20 min.

AIRED: 3/10/20, 12 PM; 3/14/20, 9:40 PM; 3/15/20, 7 PM

DESCRIPTION: The COVID-19 or Coronavirus was the subject of discussion with Dr. Michael Cohen, Assistant Professor of Medicine at David Geffen School of Medicine in Los Angeles. Dr. Cohen explained what the virus is and how it may be contracted as well as its impact on health. Dr. Cohen discussed ways to protect from being exposed to the outbreak and possibly spreading the virus. Dr. Cohen encouraged listeners to check the CDC website before making travel plans to reduce the risk. Dr. Cohen also explained that people should avoid contact with wild animals, which could also be carriers of the disease. He also warned about flu viruses that also pose a threat and urged the same cautions and practices such as frequent hand washing, avoiding the touching of the face, eyes or mouth and coughing or sneezing in the front of the elbow . Dr. Cohen says there is no cure or proven vaccine for the Coronavirus as of yet.

ISSUE: Evaluating bulls in advance of breeding season

DESCRIPTION: Host Aaron Berger, extension educator, interviewed Karla Wilke, University of Nebraska Cow/Calf Systems and Stocker Management Director about the process of evaluating and preparing bulls in advance of the breeding season. Wilke explained that, much like cows, bull body condition needs to be evaluated as fat cover over the front ribs, brisket, and tail head. Wilke says that during breeding season, bulls may lose 100-200 pounds and that it is important to start evaluating bull body condition scores 90 days before the breeding season will allow producers time to add the necessary weight to bulls before the busy season.

ISSUE: Prisoners reentering the community after serving their sentences
