PROGRAM TYPE: Interview

PROGRAM NAME: Voices For The Animals

DESCRIPTION: Horse racing has historically been known as the Sport of Kings. But in the modern day, horse racing is demonstrably rampant with corruption, abusive drugging of horses, catastrophic injuries, and dangerous breeding practices. The Jockey Club's own Equine Injury database reports that over 7200 horses die every year on the track. That includes the 12 that died at Churchill Downs – home of the Kentucky Derby – in just 30 days surrounding the derby. The other sad fact is that many racehorses end their careers in slaughterhouses when they stop making money. On this month's episode of Voices For The Animals, Michele Coppola talks with Susan Kayne, former racehorse owner, trainer, and now the Founder and president of the award-winning Unbridled Thoroughbred Foundation, about why it is time to consider an end to horse racing.

She has a particular personal focus on ending animal vivisection. The Northwest Animal Rights Network (NARN) advocates for the rights of all sentient beings—the right to choose, to be free from oppression and exploitation—by pursuing campaigns, facilitating education, and connecting Pacific Northwest organizations. Their efforts include outreach, demonstrations, litigation, and educational events. They also advocate that veganism is the best and most consistent way to respect the lives of animals; by rejecting the support of products and companies that deny them their inherent rights to live a life of freedom and fulfillment of their interests, it is the living practice of animal rights. NARN holds these values as the core of operating as an organization: Compassion and Respect, Nonviolence, Education, Community, and Action.

How has humanity gotten to such a point? Kurt shares guided wisdom about the realities of commodification, ecocide, and the capacity of the human soul for intentional cruelty.

Born in the Outer Banks of North Carolina and raised in Virginia, Stephany learned about the continued war against wild buffalo in 1996 and has been advocating for them ever since. In response to their struggle, she moved to Montana on New Years Day 2004, where she became the media coordinator for Buffalo Field Campaign, with whom she parted ways after 18 years of service over philosophical differences. Stephany has nearly 20 years of experience standing with the buffalo, is an avid wildlife photographer, backcountry skier, and horsewoman. She is a member of Deep Green Resistance, and co-founder of Roam Free Nation. Stephany trusts that the buffalo have called us not just to help defend them, but to help us save us from ourselves from the unsustainable and selfish creation of industrial civilization.

Tiokasin is the Founder, Host, and Executive Producer of First Voices Radio' for the last 28 years. In 2016 he received a Nomination for the Nobel Peace Prize..

In the region of the Lacandon forest in Chiapas, Mexico, Indigenous peoples throughout the region continue experiencing even more escalated state-military-cartel violence within a systemic and vehement capitalized world. The cartel-state-corporate violence has increased substantially over the past six months and Indigenous peoples are responding. Our guest for today, Richard Stahler-Sholk, a retired Professor of Political Science at Eastern Michigan University, and community activist involved with the School of Chiapas, provides us with an update on numerous critically important issues, such as Andres Manuel Lopez Obrador's (AMLO) administration supporting major capitalistic megaprojects throughout the region (Maya Train Project, plus more); increased destruction of Mayan peoples traditional homelands and the Indigenous peoples themselves, plus our guest articulates how some of the largest Cartels are further entrenching their claims through greater violence over the lands and peoples while maintaining the vast inhuman networks of human trafficking, narco trafficking, and trafficking mostly American-based weaponry.

DESCRIPTION: Reports on Women's Prison: Dysfunctional, Dehumanizing, Demoralizing. Host Karen James speaks with Sarah Bieri, Staff Attorney, and Julia Yoshimoto, Senior Advisor and Director of OJRC's (Oregon Justice Resource Center) Women's Justice Project. They discuss two reports recently released about the dysfunctional and dehumanizing culture at the Coffee Creek Correctional Facility, Oregon's only women's prison. The reports, one commissioned by the Oregon Legislature, describes a system that does not adhere to gender responsive, trauma-informed, evidence-based practices but often operates with punitive, paramilitary and "traditional carceral" approaches. The report cites State leaders' lack of meaningful inquiry and oversight of ODOC (Oregon Department of Corrections) and their acceptance of the agency's deceptive narratives despite evidence showing egregious ongoing problems.

DESCRIPTION: The Edges in the Middle, part VII with Bayo Akomolafe, accompanied by Saed Atshan, Cecilie Suratsky. Starting from the premise that all people belong and all lives are grievable, Bayo, Cecile, and Saed will explore how honoring each other's grief may allow us to reclaim each other's humanity and perhaps shed light on a path forward to belonging in Israel-Palestine, for Muslims, Jews, and Christians, and for all people. Bayo, Saed, and Cecilie will journey into what it might be like to glimpse at the world through tears: what visions are possible when we postpone the compulsion to see everything clearly? These limited episodes have been adapted from Bayo's work as the Global Senior Fellow at UC Berkeley's Othering & Belonging Institute. In this role, Bayo has been holding a series of public conversations on issues of justice and belonging for the Institute's Democracy & Belonging Forum, which connects civic leaders in Europe and the US who are committed to bridging across difference to strengthen democracy and advance belonging in both regions and around the world. Bayo's conversations encourage us to rethink justice, hope, and belonging by sitting amidst the noise, not trying to cover it up with pleasant rhythms.

DESCRIPTION: The No-Knock Warrant at Anjanette Young's Apartment / 62 Year Old Black Deacon Tased to Death by Black Officer. Join us with Dr. Camilla Westenberg. In the first part of our show, we share the story behind a viral video showing the traumatic interaction of police officers and an older Black woman after a no-knock warrant was mistakenly served at her apartment. We talk about the trauma she endured and the disrespect and abuse she was made to feel by the officers. We also discuss how events like these erode trust in police and the ripples created throughout the community. In the second half of the show, we discuss a traffic stop that resulted in the death of an elderly church deacon at the hands of a Black officer. We discuss how White supremacist institutions can often have a Black face, and how police often criminalize Blackness. Our Way Black History Fact uncovers the racist origins of the famous holiday song Jingle Bells.

With the mass shooting in Maine and the Supreme Court preparing to hear a case challenging a federal law that prohibits people who are under domestic violence restraining orders from possessing firearms, LTAR revisits our Gun Violence in America show. Hope is a thing with feathers: The Success of Unions in 2023. We are examining the drug crisis in America - primarily fentanyl and opiates. We will look at the Racial and Ethnic Disparities in how drug use is viewed and prosecuted in America, and the impact of harm reduction strategies. And how the approach to the overdose crisis has changed? Let's Talk About Race (LTAR), is an intergenerational, roundtable discussion of independent, national journalists featuring rigorous conversations and analysis of news coverage and the role race plays in politics, government, economy, education, and health.

When Platt set out on her journey to live with less, she never intended to become "The Afrominimalist". She just wanted to tame the chaos in her closet! But after struggling with the austerity and whiteness of mainstream minimalism, Christine realized why minimalism often seems unattainable for so many: the emphasis on all-white, barren aesthetics distracts from the practice of living with intention. And so, she decided to do things her way by curating a life-of-less influenced by the African diaspora. In The Afrominimalist's Guide to Living With Less, Christine gets right to the heart of how childhood experiences and expectations manifest in adulthood, the delicate dance between needs and wants, and the complicated weight of familial and societal pressures.

PROGRAM NAME: Prison Pipeline

DESCRIPTION: ACLU Debunks Myths about Measure 110. Host Karen James speaks with Emily Hawley, Senior Policy Associate with ACLU Oregon, who discusses “Solutions for Safe and Just Communities”, a report she co-authored with Jessica Maravilla, that debunks the myths and misinformation about Measure 110. The report says Oregonians deserve real solutions and must oppose efforts to rollback Measure 110. ACLU urges lawmakers to support evidence-based solutions that prevent crime by addressing the root causes, like affordable housing, mental health and addiction services, and economic growth. When Oregonians approved Measure 110 in 2020, they voted against incarceration and harsher penalties for drug use and demanded access to drug treatment and housing. They said No to War-on-Drug policies and agreed that we cannot arrest our way out of homelessness, drug use or poverty.

DESCRIPTION: Suppressing pro-Palestinian voices / censoring reporting on Palestine. Eleanor and Mickey speak with two veteran investigative journalists, about the issue of Israeli influence in U.S. media and society. In the first segment, James Bamford explains Project Butterfly, a multimillion-dollar campaign begun in 2015 to undermine pro-Palestinian advocacy in the U.S., especially on campuses. He asks why U.S. authorities have never investigated Israeli agents connected with Project Butterfly, the Trump campaign, and other domestic activities. Then, Peter Byrne tells Mickey about an article he wrote on assignment for the North Bay Bohemian, which the Bohemian then declined to publish. Byrne believes this happened because the article was about a protest against the Israeli massacres in Gaza. He also speaks more generally about Israeli efforts to tilt U.S. public discourse about the Middle East.

He also co-edited the book *A Shared Struggle Stories of Palestinian and Irish Hunger Strikers* (2021). Over the years, he has spoken at various forums and platforms to highlight the plight of Palestinians living under Israeli military occupation and apartheid.
