PROGRAM TYPE: Interview

PROGRAM NAME: Voices For The Animals

DESCRIPTION: In April of this year, a 9-year-old girl in Northern California who was raising a 4-H goat named Cedar decided that she couldn't go through with giving up her friend to be killed, as the program demands. The fair board, which runs the 4-H program, decided that was unacceptable and sent sheriff's deputies to seize Cedar, then had him slaughtered almost immediately. The story made national news and the case goes to court in October. Every year across America, a growing number of young people in 4-H and FFA programs find themselves in terrible conflict because they become distressed by the prospect of selling the animals they've cared for to be killed. But there is now a thriving crop of alternative programs for students that offer agricultural experience and scholarship opportunities--without the killing. On this episode of Voices For The Animals, we speak with Danielle Hanosh, Executive Director of the LEAP program, which is now available in 16 states (including Oregon).

PROGRAM TYPE: Interview

PROGRAM NAME: First Voices Radio

DESCRIPTION: Russell Charles Means (November 10, 1939 - October 22, 2012) was an Oglala Lakota activist for the rights of Native Americans, libertarian political activist, actor, musician and writer. He became a prominent member of the American Indian Movement (AIM) after joining the organization in 1968 and helped organize notable events that attracted national and international media coverage. Means was active in international issues of Indigenous peoples, including working with groups in Central and South America and with the United Nations for recognition of their rights. He was active in politics at his native Pine Ridge Indian Reservation and at the state and national level. Beginning an acting career in 1992, he appeared on numerous television series and in several films, including "The Last of the Mohicans" and "Pocahontas" and released his own music CD. Means published his autobiography, "Where White Men Fear to Tread," in 1995. He was given the name "Wanbli Ohitka," meaning "Brave Eagle" in the Lakota language. He talks about an array of topic but mostly patriarchy and matriarchy, and what it means to become a "Pow Wow" Indian.

DESCRIPTION: The recent alarming fires in the Amazon rainforest raised the perennial concern of how to protect something that has value to the whole world but is contained within the borders of a few countries; there are tremendous economic pressures behind the blazes. The vast majority of the fires burning in the Amazon right now were started by humans in service of mining, logging, and agriculture. After clearing an area of forest, fires are ignited by farmers using slash-and-burn techniques to help put nutrients in the soil for crops. Others use fires to clear low-level vegetation to more easily access trees and the soil. Fires are also used by illegal loggers and miners to drive indigenous people off their lands. Ender Black plays music from the indigenous people of the Amazon.

DESCRIPTION: It is with a heavy heart that we share that Tokitae, a Southern Resident Orca held unjustly in captivity for 53 years, has passed away. To honor her memory, we are rebroadcasting our episode with Kurt Russo on the People Under the Sea, originally aired in October of 2018. This conversation explores the powerful memory held by Southern Resident orcas, the threats they face from vessel noise, chemical pollutants, and declining Chinook salmon population, the health of the Salish Sea, and the efforts of the Lummi Nation to return SkaliChelh-tenaut (also known as Tokitae/Lolita), from where she was being held captive at Miami Seaquarium, to her natal waters in the Salish Sea. Tokitae's life ended while in captivity, but we hope that her memory may serve to inspire the fight for right-relationship and reciprocity with our more-than-human-kin. Kurt Russo is the executive director of SeSiLe, an Indigenous-led nonprofit dedicated to the perpetuation and practical application of Indigenous ancestral knowledge. Kurt has worked with Indigenous communities since 1978 in the areas of sacred site protection, Indigenous treaty rights, environmental cross-cultural conflict resolution, and the intertextualization of ways of knowing nature. He was co-Founder and Executive Director of the Florence R. Kluckhohn Center for the Study of Values and the Native American Land Conservancy, helped establish the International Indigenous Exchange Program (Northwest Indian College), the Sacred Lands Conservancy, and the Foundation for Indigenous Medicine.

PROGRAM NAME: American Indian Airwaves

DESCRIPTION: The Living Histories of Lahaina and Self Determination for Hawaiian Nation and Cannabis: From Gold Rush to Green Rush. Part 1: The living histories of Lahaina are told through the intergenerational means of passing traditional stories, songs, language, and life from one Kanaka Maoli (Native Hawaiian) generation to the next. Despite the media, national, and international attention on the recent August 8th, 2023, deadly Lahaina fire, many critical questions and concerns are missing from various media reports about the self-determination of the Hawaiian nation in recovery and healing from the violence stemming from United States militarization, the illegal overthrow of the Hawaiian Kingdom by the United States, corporatizing the land and water for tourism, plus more. Through the settler colonial history of what is called Lahaina, the Kanaka Maoli are resilient in survivance and now more than ever are organized in working to ensure that decolonization and healing takes place as part of the recovery from the Lahaina fire. Kep Maly, Cultural Ethnographer - Resource Specialist of Kumu Pono Associates LLC, raised on the islands of Oahu and Lanai. While growing up on Lanai, Kep was taught the Hawaiian language and cultural practices and values by Kūpuna (elders). Kūpuna spoke of, and practiced many aspects of Hawaiian culture, including land and ocean management practices, mele and hula (chants and dances), material culture, traditions, and ethnobotany. Part 2: The long legacy of settler colonial violence against California Indigenous nations, the lands, waters, and more continues in northern California where the informal and formal cannabis industry is harming the Peoples, lands, waters, and more. The Cannabis industry is just one industry out many contributing to systemic forms of colonial violence. From Gold Rush to Green Rush in Indigenous Northern California (2023). The book is the first to cover the environmental consequences of cannabis cultivation in California by foregrounding Indigenous voices, experiences, and histories. It is not intended as an expose of cannabis growers, but rather meant to inform the path toward an alternative future, one that starts with the return of land to Indigenous stewardship and a rejection of the commodification and control of nature for profit.

DESCRIPTION: Keiara Wade on Generations of Black Cowboys. Introducing listeners to her fierce devotion to community and care for the animal world, Keiara Wade, the Compton Cowgirl, considers the ways care work includes the human and more-than-human. Though the connection between humans and animals is often unspoken, it is a vital tie, and Keiara emphasizes the way the specific tie between human and horse can be incredibly therapeutic, healing, and nourishing. Keiara shares her journey with the Compton Cowboys and her experiences as a Black cowgirl. The Compton Cowboys were founded in 2017 by a group of Compton locals who had grown up riding together. Recognizing the importance of intergenerational community and influence, Keiara hopes that this program and connection to the horses can continue for generations to come. Compton Cowboys is about so much more than just riding, and Keiara shares the significance of making spaces for young people to feel heard and valued. The respect and accountability necessary for a good relationship with a horse is also necessary for a good relationship with each other. How might animals be our guides and companions in making the world more equitable?

As we celebrate their birthday -Yuri and MX Revolutionary Friendship highlighted the multi-racial cooperation of the civil rights movement and the broader fight against racial injustice around the world.

In the second half of the show, we discuss recent attacks on DEI initiatives in the workplace, and provide a defense of this type of education. We also make a fiscal argument for the benefits of DEI training. Our Way Black History Fact highlights Loving v. Virginia, the case of a White man and his Black wife that led to the federal government clearing the path for interracial marriage in the U.S.

Following the murder of George Floyd, protests erupted in many cities around the world. Independent photojournalist Teri Jacobs was documenting protests in the streets of Portland, Oregon on August 18, 2020 when police declared an unlawful assembly and ordered the crowd to disperse. Teri was struck repeatedly until she fell to the ground and when she looked up, Portland Police Officer Corey Budworth bashed her in the face. There was no justification for the excessive use of force against Teri Jacobs and she sued the City of Portland. Teri was awarded a \$50,000 settlement, and received an apology from Officer Budworth.

DESCRIPTION: Challenging Fox's broadcast licenses / stripping and sex work from a labor perspective. Media scholar Steve Macek joins Mickey Huff for a look at a case from Philadelphia, where media activists are challenging the broadcast-license renewal of the local Fox TV station. Macek says the abundant evidence that Fox executives ordered the airing of stories they knew to be false (notably the purported "theft" of the 2020 presidential election), together with other offenses, shows that Fox has failed to serve the public interest and therefore does not deserve to continue its use of the public airwaves. Then Eleanor Goldfield hosts the second half of the show; her guests, two long-time sex workers, look at sex work and strip clubs from a labor perspective, addressing issues such as the difference between being treated as independent contractors and as employees. They also call for the decriminalization of sex work, and an end to the social and legal ostracism of sex workers.

First, the DOJ is suing Texas over an illegal "floating border" in the Rio Grande. It's basically a drowning device. Just when you think Abbott won't go lower, he starts digging. Then, on to the local -- the Portland Ombudsman's Office finds that 1-800-BOARDUP overcharged businesses by quite a bit. But was it knowingly or unknowingly? The program director leaves Portland Street Response, but there are 10k signatures to save the program. And Willamette Week reports on the "turf war" between Portland City Commissioners Carmen Rubio and Mingus Mapps over getting to be the one to change the broken permitting system. Mapps says there are "thousands and thousands of micro-irrationalities" in the city code governing the permits, hence the title of the show. Then in the second half, we open up the phone lines to discuss the Barbie movie, and aliens being real.
