PROGRAM TYPE: Interview

PROGRAM NAME: Voices For The Animals

DESCRIPTION: Our coverage of the struggling Multnomah County Animal Shelter. Host Michele Coppola talks with Erin Grahek, the newest Director of Multnomah County Animal Services about the challenges the shelter faces, and her plans for improving conditions and operations there. We'll also have an update on Phase 1 of the Multnomah County Board of Commissioners' mandated audit of the shelter.

That comes from a French expert in technology, energy, and climate, Jean-Marc Jancovici. Jean-Marc co-founded Carbone 4 consultancy, and The Shift Project. He advises, writes books, and lectures mostly in French, but his ideas resonate with American writers like Richard Heinberg. This is a world premiere of an English language in-depth radio interview with Jean-Marc Jancovici. He is well known in Europe and beyond. He's a professor, author of several books, the latest being "Sleep Quiet Until 2100, and Other Misunderstandings about Climate and Energy" (French only, translation pending?). Jancovici is also a member of ASPO France, the Association for the Study of Peak Oil.

PROGRAM NAME: Ecojustice Radio

DESCRIPTION: Toxic Exposure: The Monsanto Roundup Trials & The Search For Justice. For years, Monsanto declared that their product Roundup, the world's most widely used weed killer, was safe. But in 2015, scientific studies concluded that glyphosate, the active ingredient in Roundup, is probably carcinogenic. The Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) and Monsanto disagreed with the findings, as scientists worked to understand the link between glyphosate and cancer. Monsanto is now owned by Bayer, one of the largest agrochemical companies in the world. These companies and the EPA downplayed the health dangers of Roundup and the active ingredient glyphosate even after Monsanto lost numerous court cases (owing billions in judgements) and settled out of court for more than \$11 Billion for more than 100K patients. In this interview we discuss the history of Roundup, the dangers of glyphosate, the trial stories and verdicts, and what the everyday person can do to fight for justice against this agricultural behemoth.

Boston-based Rye Development wants to build the largest pumped-storage hydroelectric development in the Pacific Northwest and in the process destroy irreplaceable Tribal Cultural and Religious Resources. Pumped storage is touted as the most efficient way to store solar and wind power and the Goldendale Energy Storage Project touts itself as green energy. But building this project will destroy irreplaceable Tribal Cultural and Religious Resources. And that is why it is facing so much opposition from all the impacted tribes along the Columbia River as well as river and tribal advocates. Now the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC) is considering the project's license application and so far seems poised to approve it.

Martin Prechtel is a leading thinker, writer and teacher in the search for the Indigenous soul in all people. He is a dedicated student of eloquence, history, language and an ongoing fresh approach. DESCRIPTION: Nature-Based and Traditional Approaches to Water/Hydrology from Ecuador. Water security. Water quality. Access to water. The threat of water privatization. Our relationship to water and how we value it. Ours is a future where the preciousness of water is being tested. Every drop counts. Will humanity act as if water is a gift rather than as an entitlement, a right or an exclusive commodity to profit from? Our guest this week, Boris Ochoa-Tocachi, CEO and Senior Hydrologist of ATUK Consultora Estrategica out of Ecuador shares with us his view of creating a positive relationship with water. For millennia, Indigenous peoples worldwide evolved nature-based, resilient, and sustainable ways to ensure water security based on traditional knowledge, lifeways and value systems. Water sowing and harvesting methods including: albarradas in Ecuador, sand dams in Africa, wetland management and infiltration systems in the Andes work with nature to sow water for storage in soils, river sands, and groundwater, making water available for harvesting during times of water scarcity. These traditional systems inherently protected and replenished watersheds thereby creating sustainable cultures, aligned with Nature.

Indigenous peoples are approximately 5% of the world's population, manage at least 25% of the world's land surfaces, 40% of the world's protected areas, and steward about 80% of the world's biodiversity. Each year Indigenous peoples from scores of different nations and cultures across Mother Earth convene at the United Nations Permanent Forum on Indigenous Issues (UNPFII) in the settler colonial city, state, and nation-state New York City, New York, United States. On today's program, we hear from the panelists who participated in UNPFII side event titled "Indigenous Peoples' Health and the Violence of False Solutions", on 4/20/2023. The panel focuses on Indigenous Peoples resisting land grabs driven by extractive industries, human rights violations, and Indigenous environmental defenders resisting false solutions known as: carbon markets, cap and trade, emission trading, carbon offsets, environmental and ecological services and the rebranding of Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Degradation (REDD) to earth-based solutions. The UNPFII side event was sponsored and organized by the Indigenous Environmental Network (IEN).

DESCRIPTION: The eyes of Portland's houseless are on the City Council as they deliberate a new camping ban. Guest Jeff Liddicoat has been living on the street for several years and advocating for the rights of the houseless. As the Portland City Council is slated to take up Mayor Ted Wheeler's new public camping ban proposal, the city's houseless and their advocates are stepping up their organizing to oppose it. The proposed ordinance will be discussed at the Council's Wednesday, May 31 session. Jeff Liddicoat's regular job is staffing the Right to Survive Hygiene Station serving the homeless in inner SE Portland. He's been doing that since the start of the pandemic. Prior to that in 2020 he had co-founded Stop the Sweeps Portland, which has since reorganized and will have its first general membership meeting next Thursday from 6-8 pm at the Social Justice Action Center 400 SE 12th Ave. Liddicoat's work on homeless issues in the 90s drew national attention and secured a temporary halt to sweeps. When the sweeps restarted, Liddicoat joined the homeless living on the street. And he is still there, living at his outdoor art studio, information hub, and protest camp at the corner of Southeast 12th and Burnside Road.

In the second half of the show, listeners called in to ask clarifying questions about how the measure would be implemented. This included how it would impact retirees and Social Security payments

DESCRIPTION: Host Althea Billings interviews K. Rambo, the Editor-in-Chief of Street Roots about their new article covering a proposed ordinance before Portland City Council that would ban daytime homeless camping between the hours of 8am and 8pm. It would also restrict where people are allowed to camp, and some specific activities, like using a gas heater or selling bike parts. Additionally, the ordinance would add a new dimension of enforcement by Portland Police - a proactive one. They would be responding and writing warnings for people who appear homeless, regardless of if they are suspected of breaking a law, or if someone has complained. After two written warnings, people would be subjected to a \$100 fine or 30 days in jail. Homeless advocates voiced serious concerns with the ordinance, and believe it violates state law and federal court precedent.

DESCRIPTION: In the call in portion of the show, hosts invite listener calls to discuss the merits of a bill passed by both houses of the state legislature to allow for self service gas stations. Oregon is one of two states in the nation that still relies on gas station attendants to provide this service. Already, self service gas is used in some rural areas, but the bill before the Governor would make half of all gas pumps at each station self serve. It's a big change for Oregonians, and listeners debated the merits of the current attendant system, and what more self-service could mean.

DESCRIPTION: Prison Doula Program. The walkout by Republican Senators during this 2023 Oregon legislative session leaves hundreds of bills in jeopardy. Two bills in limbo provide support and care for children and their incarcerated mothers. HB2731 would codify the Family Preservation Project of YWCA into Oregon Statute until 2031; HB2535 would create a doula program at Coffee Creek Correctional Facility, Oregon's only women's prison. Host Karen James is joined by Jessica Katz, FPP/YWCA director, Vanessa Sherrod, peer wellness specialist with FPP and Alicia Roach, a doula and FPP alum. The Family Preservation Project (FPP) promotes individual and system level change to reduce the collateral consequences of parental incarceration on children, families, and the community.

DESCRIPTION: Community control of police - What's happening in Peru? Eleanor Goldfield hosts this week's Project Censored Show. Her first guest, Max Rameau, looks at policing and explains what genuine community control of police would entail. Later in the program, Eliana Carlin speaks about recent developments in Peru, where the Congress removed President Pedro Castillo from office in December. The government then violently suppressed pro-Castillo protests, leaving scores of Peruvians dead.

Activist Radio covers environmental, human rights, social justice, and antiwar issues. Each program offers some history you didn't learn in high school, some news stories you haven't seen on TV, and some music to help you join the resistance.

PROGRAM NAME: Progressive PDX

DESCRIPTION: In this episode, we spoke with two local political powerhouses, Jason Kafoury, attorney, and KC Hanson, former Chair of the Democratic Party of Oregon. First up, we had a great discussion with Jason Kafoury, a local attorney and member of Honest Elections Oregon (a good governance group) who wants to move forward with Campaign Finance Reform at the state level. Examples of the need include Shamia Fagin's resignation over ethics concerns related to campaign finance. Jason tells us about current Campaign Finance Reform issues, including \$80M in political contributions that impacted our elections in 2022. Kafoury offered us an example of people like Phil Knight taking away the voices of normal Oregon voters. In 2020, Oregonians gave the Oregon State Congress the go ahead with the overall passage of Measure 107 which authorizes the state legislature and local governments to enact laws that curb campaign contributions and expenditures, among other things. The bill passed with over 78% of the vote, yet, Campaign Finance is still a huge issue in our state elections. KC Hanson, former Chair of the Democratic Party of Oregon, talks with us about campaign Equal Right for All - Yes on SJR 33. In the shadow of the abortion rights repeal, Supreme Court Justice Clarence Thomas started talking about taking away voting rights and gay marriage legislation. In January 2023, Oregon legislatures put forward a bill to protect LGBT communities. SJR 33 expands protections for people in communities and affirms marriage equality and transgender care access. The Senate passed SJR 33 in the Rules committee, Right to Life Oregon is fighting passage. The senate walkout has stalled the legislation from being passed, along with others.

The director had already made something of a name for herself as an independent, if more mainstream, filmmaker with the earlier, Hester Street, a portrait of Jewish life in early New York City, and Between the Lines, a surprisingly accurate account of what life is like at an alternative weekly newspaper, with a cast rich in character actors.
