#### WUSQ-FM Quarterly Issues/Programs List

WUSQ-FM provides its listeners with programming and public service announcements that address issues of concern to our local community. Among the issues determined to be of most concern to the community during the preceding calendar quarter were:

- Children's Health: Multiple performing artists, doctors, specialists, and families spoke to us about what Children's Hospitals do for our community. Dr. Kurt Newman o four local Children's Hospital, Children's National, talked about the specialized care local children get from Children's National.
- Child Safety: The Child Safe Center's executive director Kelly Bober enlightened us to the way his non profit helps children from our community heal from child abuse, especially timely after local headlines highlighted a sever case in our area.
- Education: Julie Ferrel, the Executive Director of Big Brothers Big Sisters told our listeners of the increased area they now cover, having picked up two new small cities in our station's listening area. She also discussed the new challenges they bring, especially with the focus on tutoring. The Kids Clubs of the Northern Shenandoah Valley has a new focus, which married discounted, affordable after school day care for young students with direct tutoring, in an effort to make students graduation-oriented.
- Early Childhood Education: Tash Demko, the executive director of Cheers School Family explained to our listeners how their approach to early childhood education for all differs from other programs, including their "no income limitations" rule, which so often rules out what many call "the working poor" in our community.
- End of Life Planning: Ernie Carnivale discusses what hospice is, what they do and don't do, and explains Hospice's role in family healthcare. He also explained what Blue Ridge Hospice has done for our community for the last 35 years.
- Homelessness: Director Dan Coig explains how his organization, the Winchester Area Temporary Thermal Shelter literally saves lives on harsh cold nights in the valley. He explained that the population of homeless has grown larger in the past few years, and on sub-zero night, many could perish without shelter. His organization has created a network of churches juggling this population on cold nights with a safe warm place to sleep. Captain Kelly Durant from the Salvation Army came to discuss how many homeless his organization feeds, shelters and clothes, and how donations to the red kettle campaign were down significantly in our area.
- Housing Assistance: The new Executive Director of Habitat for Humanity in our area visited and was happy to announce the creation of an endowment that will help fund habitat builds for years to come, helping create more homeowners, which in turn creates a

more stable community.

- LITERACY: Executive Director Mark Siefert explains the broad variety of programs it directs to help people in need of becoming more literate in our valley. The agency is helps adults with reading proficiency, but also gets them up to speed with computer skills, and teaches English as a second language to local immigrants. It also provides help with citizenship classes.
- MENTORING: Julie Ferrel returned to our studios from Big Brothers Big Sisters to explain the need for more mentors for our at-risk youth. She brought newly released facts and figures showing the growth of youth needing mentoring in our valley, and statistics showing the positive outcomes her agency has helped provide.
- RideSharing: Shenandoah Valley Regional Ride Share executive Director come to discuss how the program is working so far in 2018. Our area recently had exponential job growth from Amazon and a few other large corporations, adding far more cars on our strangled roads than ever before. The rideshare program is needed now more than ever to ease the congestion we're suddenly experiencing.
