Indiana Public Radio, consisting of FM radio stations WBST, WBSB, WBSW, and WBSH, has determined that the following issues were of importance to its audience community during the past three months and has aired the following news stories to address these issues:

## Health

7-5-22 Health Officials Awaiting Legislature's New Abortion Laws IPB

Across the state, health officials and legal experts are waiting to see what abortion restrictions will be introduced in Indiana after the U.S. Supreme Court struck down Roe v. Wade.

IU Health Arnett in Lafayette and the Indiana Hospital Association both released statements indicating they plan to work with the legislature to ensure they can continue to provide quality care.

Franciscan Health in Lafayette praised the high court's decision.

But Tippecanoe County Health Officer Dr. Greg Loomis says an abortion ban in the state will have clear, negative impacts on healthcare - particularly on fetal infant mortality. A retired neurosurgeon, Loomis says there will be complications.

"It would be like in my sub-specialty having some law that you can't operate on a human brain until they are about ready to die. That's tying the doctor's hands. That's taking medical decision-making and taking it out of doctors, nurses, and pharmacists' hands and tying them up because of a political ideology."

The legislature is expected to take up the question of abortion bans during a special session later this month.

Hoosiers can now find the newest COVID-19 vaccine on the state's online map, found at our-shot-dot-I-N-dot-gov.

The so-called bivalent booster, endorsed by the C-D-C earlier this month, helps protect Hoosiers against both the Omicron and Delta strains of the virus. Previous boosters only covered COVID's original strain.

In a statement, State Health Commissioner Doctor Kris Box says having a vaccine that specifically targets the current dominant strains of the virus is particularly important heading into the fall and winter, when diseases like COVID are more prevalent.

The Indiana Department of Health encourages residents to either contact a pharmacy or health care provider directly, or on the pharmacy's or provider's website for vaccination appointments ...or call 2-1-1 for assistance.

7-26-22 House Cmte Passes Inflation & Support Bill Thorp (SLW Mix Edit)

A House committee today (Tuesday) passed a bill that includes both inflation relief to Hoosiers ... and financial supports for parents and families.

Republican Sharon Negele [NEY-gull] authored the bill. She says it will provide a 225-dollar check for all Hoosier taxpayers ... while also supporting mothers and children.

To do that, the bill includes a number of tax exemptions for dependent or adopted children. It also expands Medicaid coverage to include labor and delivery services for people likely to qualify. The proposals come as the Senate is moving forward with new abortion restrictions.

Monique Kulkarni (COLE-carny) is a licensed psychologist. She supports the funding the bill puts towards various maternal health services - but says it's not enough.

8/15/22 Indiana Tax Refund Scam Warning

Indiana state officials are warning Hoosiers about scams related to the automatic taxpayer refund and inflation relief payments.

Last year, the state triggered its automatic taxpayer refund law because of unusually large revenue collections. That ultimately meant sending 125 dollars to every Hoosier who filed a tax return last year. And state lawmakers recently approved an inflation relief package that will mean another 200 dollars each to taxpayers.

But with those payments also comes concerns about scams. The money will only come in the form of a direct deposit or a paper check. The state is telling Hoosiers to ignore any texts, emails, or phone calls related to the taxpayer refund or inflation relief payments. That's especially true if the messages contain links ... or request personal or financial information, such as Social Security or bank account numbers.

If you receive one of these messages, you can report it to the Indiana Attorney General's office. You can do so online, by filing a complaint with the office's consumer protection division.

9-09-22 US Secs at Purdue for CHIPS Act investments Ben Thorp (SLW Short Edit)

Members of the Biden Administration joined Governor Eric Holcomb and Senator Todd Young at Purdue University today (TUES) to tout the investments of the CHIPS Act.

The federal act, passed in July, puts more than 50 billion dollars towards bolstering the semiconductor industry in the US. Semiconductor chips are used in numerous electronic devices, including phones, TVs, and even cars.

Earlier this year SkyWater Technology announced a 1-point-8-billion-dollar semiconductor plant in West Lafayette. Funding will come from the CHIPS Act.

U.S. Secretary of State Anthony Blinken says supply chain issues during the pandemic made it clear that the U.S. needed to secure the production of chips.

07/01/22 Northedge Steel buys All Steel Carports SLW

A North Carolina steel company is planning to take over a Yorktown steel structure site built in 2020, but never used. And, it's planning to hire 40 workers.

Northedge Steel has purchased All-Steel Carports for more than 5 million dollars. The North Carolina company says it will manufacture and sell carports and steel buildings in Yorktown that will be destined for Indiana, Ohio, Michigan, and Kentucky.

The 11-acre manufacturing facility and sales center was supposed to have been the new home of All-Steel Carports, which began business in Muncie in 2001. But before moving, owner Ignacio Chave zCastillo was arrested on federal immigration-related charges. The government claimed the company was hiring and harboring "illegal aliens" and paying them "grossly reduced wages." Castillo entered into a federal plea agreement and forfeited his business last September.

It plans to begin operating in August.

Most baby boxes are funded through private church donations. In Elwood, an anonymous donor funded the 15-thousand-dollar box installation through the Elwood United Methodist Church.

Naloxone, a medicine used to prevent deaths from opioid overdoses, was patented in 1961 and approved for use in the United States ten years later.

Naloxone, also known by the brand name of Narcan, has saved countless lives over the years. Its benefits are recognized to the point, today, that naloxone nasal spray dispensers are being freely distributed in wall boxes – like so many fire extinguishers or AED units in public buildings and other locations.

As our Stephanie Wiechmann reported recently, Muncie is seeing more so-called "Naloxboxes" throughout the community.

To fill in more details for us we welcome to Morning Edition Sarah Renee and Neil Kring who are with the organization Muncie Folk – a local 501C3 not-for-profit organization that performs harm-reduction work helping those with substance abuse problems. They also work in conjunction with Indiana Department of Mental Health doing street outreach.

Hundreds of thousands of people across Indiana lack internet access at home.

Among households with school-age children, more than 40,000 homes lack a dial-up internet subscription or broadband access at home.

That's according to research from Ball State economist Michael Hicks.

"If you don't have broadband, you're immediately excluded from 15% of all job opportunities that are available in America right now. If you don't have broadband, you're gonna have to go to library just to apply for a job, but you certainly can't work at home."

Internet access isn't federally subsidized like water or electricity.

Billions of federal dollars are headed to Indiana to increase broadband access, but experts say the money won't reach ALL who need it most.

7/26/22 Senate Inflation Relief Clears Cmte Brandon Smith
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Last night, a Senate committee unanimously approved its version of an inflation relief bill. If approved, the average Hoosier household would save about 20 dollars a month for the next six months.

The measure would suspend, for six months, the state sales tax you pay on your utility bills - electricity, water, gas, internet, and phone. It also caps the sales tax on gasoline ... and rolls back a one -penny-pergallon gas tax increase. But those are unlikely to make a difference at the pump.

The rest of the money in the bill would be spent on state construction projects and paying down teacher pension fund debt.

School and teacher organizations applauded the measure. But as David Marcotte (mar-COT) from the Indiana Urban Schools Association told lawmakers, schools could use even more help ... as they deal with inflation and an ongoing teacher shortage.

#### INDOT HALTS PROPOSED MUNCIE BYPASS CHANGE

After much public opposition, the Indiana Department of Transportation says it won't adjust traffic on US-35 at Riggin Road.

INDOT had proposed removing the left-hand turn lanes and the median from US 35, allowing only right turns at the Muncie Bypass. The agency had cited what it called a high number of "incapacitating" crashes and several property damage crashes.

But at a public hearing on the proposal last month, Delaware County law enforcement officials said they didn't remember responding to those accidents.

Governmental bodies in both Delaware County and Muncie submitted letters of opposition to INDOT over the change.

Now the agency says it won't move forward with the change. But, it says it will continue monitoring traffic at the intersection to see if further discussion is needed.

Indiana, Purdue universities plan Indianapolis campus split

Indiana University and Purdue University officials have announced plans to split up control of the Indianapolis campus that the schools have shared for more than 50 years.

The academic division of IUPUI is set to take effect in 2024 ... and new names for the campus will be chosen.

IU will continue to operate much of the 27-thousand-student campus ... and programs in areas like business, science, law, nursing, and liberal arts.

Purdue says it will control engineering, computer science, and technology programs ... with an aim to increase their enrollments and coordinate them more with the main Purdue campus in West Lafayette.

University officials said the changes will allow IU and Purdue to highlight and grow their academic programs and research presence in the state's largest city.

It's a move similar to what happened to the shared university campus in Fort Wayne in 2018. Purdue Fort Wayne now provides most of its academic degrees, with IU largely overseeing health sciences programs.
