

KNCT QUARTERLY ISSUES REPORT

(January, February, March 2022)

This report was compiled by KNCT-FM Program Director Gary Emmert. Below is an example of what KNCT and the news department broadcasts in response to community needs, issues and challenges.

Centex Sustains - Every Monday at 6:15pm, host Christine Luciano discusses different topics of sustainable living for the purpose of educating our listeners on recycling, reusing, and other planet friendly steps everyone can do while also saving money. Each program is approximately five minutes in length.

On the Dock - Every Wednesday and Friday at 6:15pm, our host Rick Smith covers information about fishing, game, wildlife, and other outdoor recreation news in the area. Texas Parks and Recreation works hand in hand with Mr. Smith to create and produce these episodes, which normally last 5 minutes in length.

Public Service Announcements - News and information on prevention and safety warnings for listeners as well as community events for non-profit organizations in Killeen, Fort Hood, Copperas Cove, Harker Heights, Georgetown, Round Rock, and Austin areas. These messages are performed hourly and last about 30-60 seconds each.

The Senior Report - Recorded and produced every week and aired on Saturday mornings at 9:20am, host Joyce Mayer informs local senior citizens and their family members with pertinent news and information about health, education, and recreation in the KNCT-FM listening area. Each program is 30 minutes in length.

The USO Report - Each Sunday at 1:30pm, the Center Director of Fort Hood's USO informs our listeners of events and programs designed to assist Soldiers, Veterans, and their family members in the KNCT-FM listening area. Each episode is approximately five minutes in length.

Voice of Texas Veterans - Every Sunday at 3:30pm, host Julia Conner features services offered by the Texas Veterans Commission, a state agency that offers free services to Veterans in the state of Texas. Each episode is approximately 10 minutes in length.

Weather - Bill Hecke has been KNCT's meteorologist for over 36 years, providing multiple weather reports and hourly updates each day for our listeners. In addition to his expert weather coverage, Bill addresses hot and cold weather safety concerns. He also promotes wellness clinics that offer free healthcare for children in the area and animal shelters that need help finding homes for our four-legged friends. Altogether, Mr. Hecke gives about 40 minutes of weather and public service coverage per day.

Honey Creek Spring Ranch	On the Dock	2/9/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>This episode highlights new conservation protections being added in Comal County thanks to the combined efforts of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), The Nature Conservancy (TNC), and Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) to safeguard Honey Creek Spring Ranch from future development.</p> <p>Owned and operated by Moore's family since its inception in 1871, Honey Creek Spring Ranch has long served as a site of ecological importance. The property is home to endangered golden-cheeked warblers and to black-capped vireos and a number of other species in decline. Honey Creek Cave, the largest cave system in Texas, runs underneath the property—with several miles of underground river emerging from the ranch's namesake spring as the primary source of Honey Creek, an important tributary of the Guadalupe River.</p> <p>The cave is in a drainage area for the Edwards Aquifer, which supplies drinking water to nearly two million Texans and the City of San Antonio. It contains numerous native and threatened species, including the Comal blind salamander and at least six invertebrates found in only a few caves in central Texas. While the conservation easement does not allow for public access, the property's significant natural resources will be permanently protected from future development.</p>

River Awareness	On the Dock	2/16/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>The Texas Park and Wildlife Department invites you to grab a rod and reel and head to Central Texas for a chance to catch one of 30 tagged Guadalupe bass and possibly win a prize in this episode with Rick.</p> <p>From February 4 until August 31, any angler who catches one of the tagged Guadalupe bass from the Lower Colorado River near Austin and Smithville will be awarded a prize package and be entered into grand prize drawings at the end of the seven-month period.</p> <p>This contest is the latest effort to help recognize the ecological and recreational importance of the Lower Colorado River - home to the current state record Guadalupe bass. The tournament is being hosted by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) along with partners, All Water Guides, Cleanup the Colorado, and the Texas River School. The Colorado River flows right through the heart of Central Texas with a proximity close to the urban population center of Austin, yet this river fishery remains an underutilized recreational resource.</p>
Hunter Education	On the Dock	2/18/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>Hunting-related accidents in Texas are at an all-time low since Hunter Education became mandatory in 1988, according to the 2021 Texas Hunting Accident Report released by the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD).</p> <p>Of more than 49,000 certifications in 2021, Texas experienced only one fatality and 11 accidents statewide, according to the report.</p> <p>This marks a significant decrease since 1988, when more than 18,000 Texans received their Hunter Education certification but reported 12 fatalities and 70 accidents throughout the state. As more Texans have taken to the field and obtained their Hunter Education certification, these numbers have greatly improved. Even prior to Hunter Education becoming mandatory in 1988, TPWD has offered hunter education courses since 1972, certifying nearly 1.5 million students.</p> <p>Today, Hunter Education is required for every hunter in Texas (including out-of-state hunters) born on or after Sept. 2, 1971. The minimum age for certification is nine years of age and certification is good for life.</p>

Generally, bluebonnet fields bloom for about six weeks, roughly from late February or March through mid- or late April.</p> <p>The start of the season depends on many factors such as winter weather or soil quality and might differ depending on the area. Mild winters result in early bluebonnet season. The peak</p>

					<p>bloom usually falls in early-to-mid April. Also, on April 24th, a number of towns and cities in Texas celebrate State Wildflower Day.</p> <p>Christine shares a couple of the best spots to see a huge amount of beautiful Texas bluebonnets include Ennis near Dallas and the Texas Hill Country west of Austin.</p>
White Bass	On the Dock	2/23/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>Anglers across the state look forward to hitting the water each spring for the annual white bass spawning run upstream from reservoirs into rivers and creeks. Whether it be fishing on the bank, motorized boat or paddle craft, the white bass run can provide an exciting day on the water for new and seasoned anglers alike.</p> <p>“The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) has received reports that some anglers have started catching white bass since the beginning of February, but the main spawning run does not really get going until water temperatures and flows are just right,” said John Botros, TPWD’s Inland Fisheries River Access Coordinator. “Some good rains this spring would trigger abundant white bass spawning runs. Anglers should make plans to target this species in rivers and creeks upstream of many of our reservoirs from now until early May.”</p>
ShareLunker Updates	On the Dock	2/25/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>Possum Kingdom claimed the first two Legacy Class largemouth bass of the month Saturday, February 12. Steven Davis of Burkburnett, Texas reeled in ShareLunker 615 that morning, which weighed in at 13.20 pounds, followed by Randy Palmer of Arlington, Texas with 13.38-pound ShareLunker 616 later that night. These two Legacy Lunkers bring the 2022 Toyota ShareLunker season total to eight after six came in during the opening month of January.</p> <p>Saturday’s catches were monumental for Possum Kingdom with ShareLunker 615 becoming the waterbody’s first Legacy Class fish since 1991 and fourth overall when ShareLunker 616 capped the day.</p>

Hickory Shad	On the Dock	3/02/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>In just over one year, the same river produces two state record hickory shad. Timmy Woods of Kite, GA was out fishing on the Ogeechee River when he reeled in the new state record hickory shad.</p> <p>“The Ogeechee River is the place to be if you are targeting record hickory shad,” says Scott Robinson, Chief of Fisheries for the Wildlife Resources Division. “The great news is that there are amazing angling opportunities all over the state and plenty of fish to catch, but who will hold the next record? Don’t let someone else do it – it is time to get outdoors and Go Fish Georgia!”</p> <p>In Georgia, the shad spawning run usually begins in January in the southern rivers and fish can be found until May below the New Savannah Bluff Lock and Dam near Augusta. American and hickory shad are commercially harvested in the Altamaha and Savannah rivers. However, these fish can also be targeted by anglers utilizing recreational fishing gear in any of Georgia’s coastal rivers and are primarily caught on artificial lures, such as curl tail grubs.</p>
ShareLunker Updates	On the Dock	3/4/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>If any superstitious anglers are wondering whether the Leap Day weekend is lucky or unlucky for catching the fish of a lifetime, two Texas bass anglers just made the answer very clear.</p>

					<p>Angler Joe Castle caught the first Legacy Class Toyota ShareLunker entry of the weekend – a whopping 15.34-pound, 27.5-inch largemouth bass – on a Senko wacky rig in three feet of water at Lake Nacogdoches while fishing on his Leap Year birthday Feb. 29. ShareLunker 583 is the second Toyota ShareLunker Legacy Class entry of the year and the new pending water body record for the lake.</p> <p>Every angler who loans a 13 pound or larger Legacy Class bass to the Toyota ShareLunker program during the spawning period Jan. 1 to March 31 will receive a Toyota ShareLunker Catch Kit containing branded merchandise and fishing tackle items, a 13lb+ Legacy decal, VIP access to awards programming at the Toyota Bassmaster Texas Fest, a replica of their fish, and an entry into the year-end ShareLunker Prize Drawing to win a \$5,000 shopping spree and an annual fishing license. These anglers will also be entered into the Legacy Class Prize Drawing for a \$5,000 shopping spree and an annual fishing license at the end of the spawning period March 31st.</p>
Texas Disabled Veteran License Plates	Voice of Texas Veterans	3/6/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	A new Texas law is affecting motorists with Texas Disabled Veteran (DV) license plates. You now need to display the ISA symbol to use parking spots marked for the disabled. What is that? You may ask. We talked with a representative of the Texas Department of Motor Vehicles about the new law, he explains what disabled vets need to do, to use disabled parking spaces without getting a ticket.
Bat Exclusion Efforts	On the Dock	3/9/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>To address concerns about the welfare of a large colony of free-tailed bats in a warehouse operated by the Texas Department of Criminal Justice (TDCJ), the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) is working alongside TDCJ staff to develop a safe, slow, and progressive movement (exclusion) of the bats from the building. The exclusion effort will help to minimize potential human-bat conflict.</p> <p>The bat colony has been present in the warehouse since 1997 and has since grown to be one of the largest urban bat colonies in the state, with an estimated 750,000 bats. The bats use this structure as a maternity roost, migratory stopover, and hibernation site. Each night, the bats leave the roost to feed on insects high above Huntsville, sometimes traveling up to 100 miles in search of food.</p> <p>TDCJ has determined that the cotton warehouse where the colony resides needs to be demolished due to multiple occupational health concerns and concerns about the structural integrity of the building. If proactive measures to demolish the building aren't taken, the building could collapse suddenly.</p> <p>The bat exclusion effort will occur in two phases and will primarily take place during the times of year when bats are mobile and therefore not roosting for long periods of time in the warehouse. Additionally, eight bat houses have been constructed and will be maintained to provide a place for the bats to relocate once exclusion efforts begin. It is hoped that the bat houses will keep the bats from relocating in other buildings throughout the area. Input from bat experts, veterinarians, advocacy groups and stakeholders provided to date and throughout this process will be considered.</p>

Your vacation has been great — and it's about to get even better, thanks to a charter fishing trip, which you hope helps you check some exotic species off your bucket list. Gardens have emerged in the past year as an integral part of enrichment, building connections outdoors, while providing environmental awareness.</p> <p>Each garden has a growing number of volunteers who are creating positive change. With the help of the Fort Hood Girl Scouts, the revitalization of the Montague community garden has grown into more helping hands from Family Housing, the Directorate of Public Works Environmental Division and 504th Military Intelligence Brigade.</p>
National Archery in Schools	On the Dock	3/23/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>In the 16th year offering a state tournament opportunity for Texas schools participating in the National Archery in the Schools Program (NASP), a record 3,100 students from 148 schools will meet March 22-23 at the Bell County Expo Center in Belton. Students will have a chance to contend for awards and qualify for the NASP® National Tournament in Louisville, Kentucky.</p> <p>National Archery in the Schools competitions are unique in that teams are mixed gender by rule. Females comprise 45 percent of participants registered this year in both the state qualifying tournament and the state tournament.</p> <p>“The National Archery in the Schools Program fits all students regardless of gender or athletic or academic ability,” said Burnie Kessner, Archery Coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD). “Students come to compete from throughout the state, from the Rio Grande Valley to the Panhandle to inner-city Houston and they all use the same equipment. They also use school-owned bows with no sights and no mechanical accessories so it’s all about their abilities, not the gear.”</p> <p>Participating schools also vary greatly in size, from small to large, from public to private. The state tournament will be attended by students from small rural schools, large urban campuses and even homeschooled students.</p> <p>A total of \$30,000 in college scholarships will be awarded at the tournament. The Texas-NASP state tournament has awarded over \$180,000 to the top high school student archers since the inaugural state tournament in 2006. For those competing, college scholarships will go to the top five male and top five female high school archers, along with trophies, medals, and new bows and arrows in all categories. First place male and female archers in each division receive Genesis bows, and the high scoring male and female archer will receive a limited-edition Genesis bow. Door prize drawings will take place throughout the days.</p>
Fishing Fools Day	On the Dock	3/25/2022	6:15pm	5 minutes	<p>The Texas Freshwater Fisheries Center (TFFC) is the perfect place to kick off the month of April with “Fishing Fools Day,” an event celebrating all things fishing.</p> <p>“There is something for everyone, whether it be a first-time angler or long-time fishermen looking to try something new, like fly fishing or bowfishing,” said Kate Barkalow, TFFC Education and Interpretation Coordinator.</p> <p>Anglers can test their skills on a casting course and get fishing tips from the experts. In addition, attendees can learn more about some of the Inland Fisheries Division’s fish sampling techniques such as electrofishing.</p> <p>The TFFC is located in Athens and includes a working fish hatchery, 300,000 gallons of aquariums focusing on underwater wildlife in the state, recreational fishing ponds and fisheries science exhibits. It is home to the Toyota ShareLunker program, which invites anglers to donate 13-pound-plus-sized largemouth bass for research and breeding purposes. The TFFC also houses the Texas Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame which honors individuals and organizations that have made significant contributions to freshwater fishing in Texas.</p> <p>The Texas Game Warden Museum, where visitors can learn about the history of the organization and current Texas Parks</p>

					and Wildlife Department game warden operations, is also located at the TFFC. In addition, the TFFC also facilitates the annual Fish Art Contest in Texas, which is part of a conservation education program designed to spark the imaginations of students while providing valuable lessons about fish and the importance of conserving Texas' aquatic resources.
Vietnam War Veterans Day	Voice of Texas Veterans	3/27/2022	3:30pm	10 minutes	<p>Spend time with the Vietnam veterans in your life on Vietnam War Veterans Day, March 29.
