Grocery Prices Economy

6a-9a 30-sec A report from Consumer Affairs says Pennsylvania had the highest increase in grocery prices over the last year than any other state in the country. The commonwealth reportedly saw more than eightpercent increase this year alone, compared to an average of a five-percent most everywhere else. Consumer Affairs used data from 150-thousand stores in 50 states and D.C. to come up with the numbers. Colorado had the lowest price hike noted.

Leaders of a regional trade group say the hardest-to-fill jobs right now are for machinists, toolmakers and maintenance workers. The York Manufacturers' Association says in its annual wage growth survey that jobs for manufacturing workers in Central Pennsylvania grew five percent over the past year. However, the organization's member companies said in a

survey that they're still having trouble finding skilled production workers. A third of them report that even though hiring has bounced back after the pandemic, some of their open jobs are taking more than three months to fill.

Crime	Copper Theft	12/22	6-9a	30-sec	Several law enforcement agencies are sharing their ongoing efforts to crackdown on the theft of copper wire in West Virginia. Many phone and internet outages have been traced back to stolen copper wire, which is then cashed in at recycle plants. County sheriff offices and police departments are now working together with the Secretary of State's Office to investigate the theft and illegal scrapping.
Crime	Porch Pirate Law	12/21	6-9a	30-sec	People who are caught stealing packages from people's property will soon face stricter fines and jail time. A first offense, where the value of the mail is less than 200-dollars will be considered a summary offense. If the mail is worth more than 200, the crime will be a misdemeanor. A third offense of mail worth more than two-thousand dollars will be a felony. Pennsylvania is now among eight other states that have made porch pirating a felony. The new law goes into effect in 60 days.
Crime	Shootout Sentencing	12/18	6-9a	30-sec	A Hagerstown man is heading to prison for eight years for a shooting in April that left a bystander with multiple gunshot wounds. Prosecutors say 20-year-old Dajor Javon Walden has been sentenced after he pleaded guilty this month to a charge of first degree assault. Walden also pleaded guilty to possession of

an assault weapon and possession of fentanyl with intent to distribute. Attempted murder charges were dropped against Walden as part of the plea deal.
