ISSUE: HEALTH CARE & WELFARE

Program: Independently Speaking Broadcast Date/Time: July 7/5:00am

Length: 28:30 Source: Local

Description: Interview with Janice Ballard, executive director of Heart to Heart International USA, to discuss the organizations' health care initiative in Southeast Missouri. Ms. Ballard discusses how the group has developed from a worldwide volunteer organization whose goal is to provide medical assistance and supplies to areas that have been struck by disaster; but the group has begun exploring how to bring better long-term health care to poverty stricken areas. In 2015, Heart to Heart launched a health care initiative in the Missouri bootheel region. Ms. Ballard discusses how they coordinated with local health care providers, community leaders and churches to get a better understanding of the people and their needs. The first step was to create a mobile medical clinic for the area, while the organization continues to gather ideas and information to help achieve the goal of developing a long-term health plan for the region.

She discusses her physical and legal difficulties during the years following the accident, as well as her work with groups who aim to give disabled people more empowerment. She also discusses the books she has written about her experiences and how to better cope with a disability.

During the interview, she offers tips on ways that the disabled person can communicate with the attendant, to help create and maintain a working relationship.

Description: The flu season is near, and health officials are encouraging everyone to get a flu shot. The Illinois Department of Public Health says last year's vaccine was about 40% affective, which may seem low; but officials say it was better than doing nothing. Rhonda Schmidt, Director of Nursing at the Southern Seven Health Department, says not getting a shot could lead to pneumonia or even death, not to mention missing time from work. She also recommends following the three "C's:" clean your hands, covering your coughs, and containing your germs by staying home.

Description: With the 4th of July only a couple of days away, some tips are offered to keep you safe. Rick Hoffman, owner of Hoffman Fireworks, says consumers shouldn't be swayed by colorful packaging, and should instead examine the package first and read all safety instructions. He adds that if any fireworks don't go off, soak them with water and wait until the next day to throw them away. Law enforcement asks you to be courteous to your neighbors when shooting off any fireworks. The McCracken County Sheriff's Department says it doesn't have a noise ordinance; but they will issue disorderly conduct citations if necessary. Violators will only be given one warning, before a court summons is issued.

Description: Union Pacific Railroad is leading an effort to educate motorists on when and how to safely cross railroad tracks. Too often, motorists try to cross as the train is approaching. Matthew Harvard, special agent for the Union Pacific Police, says it's illegal to cross railroad tracks when lights are flashing or the gates are down. While they can write tickets, he would prefer to issue a warning hoping that it would change a driver's bad habit. He says he understands that there are times you may be in a hurry; but it's not worth the risk. He says any time you cross a set of tracks, the motorist needs to slow down, look both ways, and be sure it is safe to cross.

Description: Several Alexander County, II., fire departments are currently short staffed and need volunteers. A few days ago, one department was unable to respond to a mobile home fire due to a lack of personnel. Michael Honey, Fire Chief for the Horseshoe Lake fire department, says they prefer to have a roster of twenty-five firefighters; but currently they only have twelve. He says that their biggest need is daytime volunteers to be available, while the other members are away at work. He adds that all the local department need more people, and he urges anyone ages eighteen to twenty-five to apply; but anyone is welcome.

Description: Missouri is the first state to begin regulating labels on meat substitutes that are made from plants or grown in labs. The law prohibits companies from misrepresenting a product as meat if it doesn't come from livestock or poultry. Becky Brown is the co-owner of Natural Health Organic Foods, which specializes in real meats and plant based substitutes. She says at first she was concerned with the new law; but she found that all of the products she carries were already in compliance. Happily she didn't have to contact any distributors or pull anything off the shelf. The Missouri law is similar to a law recently passed in France, and other states are also considering updating their meat-labelling laws.

Buddy Davis, executive manager of Lawless Harley Davidson, says new Harley models have an option to add anti-lock brakes; but says any motorcycle he owns will have the feature because it makes him a safer rider. Hank Becker, technician at Grass Roots BMW, says anti-lock brakes have been standard for years.
