Issue #2: State Capitol Reporting. KUNC has a reporter stationed at Colorado's capitol. During the legislative session, we report daily to our audiences in Weld, Larimer, Boulder, and several other counties about the legislative session. This is a crucial service to our audience, especially those in rural areas. KUNC is a member of Capitol Coverage, a collaborative public policy reporting project, providing news and analysis to communities across Colorado for more than a decade. Fifteen public radio stations participate in Capitol Coverage from throughout Colorado.

High school students graduating in 2024 would be eligible for about fifteen hundred dollars each, which could be used to pay for an apprenticeship, trade school, community college or university. A second bill would cover the cost of tuition, fees and materials for certain associate degree and industry certificate programs.	
Issue #3: Gun Safety Measures and Mass Shootings. Colorado recently experienced another mass shooting. KUNC reporters and hosts were physically on the scene to keep our audiences in Weld, Larimer, Boulder, and the surrounding counties informed. KUNC also continued follow up coverage with the Colorado legislative session, which included proposals for firearm reform.

There is a measure that would make it easier for gun-violence victims to sue gun stores and manufacturers. Another bill would expand Colorado's red flag laws, also called Extreme Risk Protection Orders, or ERPO laws. A fifth bill would essentially ban assault weapons in the state.

The meeting came after GOP filibusters over gun reform delayed the House's course of business last week.

The study, published Monday in the journal JAMA Pediatrics, relied on data from the 2021 Healthy Kids Colorado Study. It surveyed teens and included the question, "How long would it take you to get and be ready to fire a loaded gun without a parent's permission?" One in 4 teens said they could do so within 24 hours. One in 10 said it would take them less than 10 minutes.
