CONSUMER PROTECTION

ABC7 News Thursday, February 8, 2024

As autonomous driving advances, incidents arise in San Francisco involving passengers and a cyclist. A Waymo ride turned alarming when sensors were tampered with, leaving passengers feeling trapped. Waymo advises riders to stay inside during such incidents. Meanwhile, a cyclist collision prompts safety concerns amid AV expansion debates by advocacy groups.

ABC7 News Friday, February 9, 2024

Some North Bay PG&E customers remain without power five days after a winter storm caused extensive damage. Patrick Morse in Sebastopol recounts a fallen redwood tree damaging power lines, leaving him reliant on a backup generator. PG&E crews are working to restore power, offering affected customers credits on future bills.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 14, 2024

A new state law aims to protect consumers from surprise ambulance bills, ensuring they won't be charged more than their in-network cost. The law also caps charges for uninsured individuals at Medi-Cal or Medicare rates. It provides safeguards against adverse credit and wage garnishment, offering transparency and peace of mind.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 14, 2024

North Bay couple has over \$4,000 seized from tax refund by EDD due to a scammer's phony jobless claim. Despite reporting fraud years ago, EDD pursued repayment from the victim. The agency claims difficulties in verifying addresses. After intervention, EDD returned the funds. EDD faces ongoing fraud risks despite reforms.

ABC7 News Friday, February 23, 2024

Amazon introduces smart shopping carts at Whole Foods in San Mateo, allowing customers to skip checkout lines. The carts track purchases, requiring users to log in via Amazon or Whole Foods app. Equipped with scanners and scales, they offer real-time receipts and store navigation. Payment is automatic upon exit.

ABC7 News Saturday, February 24, 2024

A North Bay man grieving wife's death finds her image on fake GoFundMe campaign as scammers hijacked his Facebook page for donations. Despite his considerable efforts, Facebook refuses to remove hacker. Seven on your Side alerted GoFundMe, which shut down the fraud, but Facebook's automated responses frustrate efforts to regain control. Meta plans subscription security service.

ABC7 News Friday, March 1, 2024

Zelle, a popular quick pay app, faces mounting scams despite promises to enhance security and reimburse victims. Eileen Loughran, a Bay Area woman, lost thousands to an imposter scam. Although Zelle vows refunds for such scams, ambiguity in policies and lack of fraud protections raise concerns. Banks, including Wells Fargo, struggle to address victims' claims.

ABC7 News Monday, March 11, 2024

California's overwhelmed EV rebate program cancels a Bay Area man's \$7,500 rebate because he applied one day too soon for his Tesla Model 3 purchase. Despite eligibility, no notification was sent, and the mistake couldn't be rectified. Critics blame lack of communication and staffing issues. Program now closed; thousands miss out.

ABC7 News Thursday, March 14, 2024

Rohnert Park mother discovers someone filed a tax return in her name, claiming nearly \$9,000. Despite IRS intervention, refund blocked due to lack of personal identification. She faces a lengthy process to reclaim funds, with concerns over her and her children's compromised information. IRS flags over a million suspicious returns annually.

ABC7 News Friday, March 15, 2024

KGO's "7 On Your Side's" consumer unit hosted its annual Tax Chat LIVE throughout our evening newscasts in partnership with the United Way Bay Area. Questions sent in online by our viewers were each personally answered by a trained tax professional volunteering their time for this community event. Popular tax-related questions about changes to the tax law, new deductions, deadlines, and much more were addressed.

Education

ABC7 News Wednesday, January 17, 2024

California Governor Gavin Newsom announced his intention to veto any bill completely banning youth tackle football, emphasizing a commitment to improving safety while preserving parental choice. The proposed legislation aims to set a minimum age for tackle football, citing concerns about brain trauma. Debates around the bill highlight parental rights and the sport's risks.

ABC7 News Friday, February 23, 2024

High school students organized Silicon Valley's first congressional primary debate. Six candidates participated, including those vying to replace Representative Anna Eshoo. Organizer Maulik Dhakal expressed surprise at candidates' receptiveness to youth. Despite lacking voting rights, students emphasized their voice's importance in holding representatives accountable. The event was streamed via social media.

ABC7 News Saturday, January 27, 2024

Students at Junction Avenue K-8 School in Livermore spend a school day writing kind messages on coffee sleeves, delivering 1,000 with messages like "Your outfit slays" and "Always think positive." Organized by counselor Jordan Key, it's part of the Great Kindness Challenge, spreading positivity and joy throughout the community.

ABC7 News Thursday, February 15, 2024

Oakland Unified School District faces a \$23 million budget deficit for the upcoming 2024-2025 school year. To address this shortfall, district leaders are considering cost-cutting measures, including staff reorganization and reductions in discretionary spending. The teachers' union opposes potential cuts, arguing they would negatively impact students and questioning the district's financial claims.

ABC7 News Tuesday, February 20, 2024

Julian Prince Dash initiated the Holy Stitch Factory Fellowship, a nonprofit sewing school in San Francisco. Inspired by his own upbringing, Dash aims to mentor those lacking father figures. Through sewing, he imparts life lessons and fosters community. Supported by donations, Dash focuses on building lasting relationships to facilitate personal growth and positive change.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 21, 2024

Two East Bay Catholic schools, including "St. Anthony Catholic School," are closing due to various factors, including rising crime and human trafficking operations near the campus. Enrollment decline and overwhelming financial challenges were cited. Parents express concerns about finding safe alternatives. Another school, "Our Lady of Guadalupe" in Fremont, is also closing.

ABC7 News Sunday, March 3, 2024

San Francisco Unified School District plans to potentially close schools within two years due to a significant decline in student enrollment. Superintendent Matt Wayne's strategy aims to tackle a loss of 10,000 students since 2015. Specific schools to be shuttered by fall 2025 remain undisclosed amidst budgetary challenges and payroll system issues.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 28, 2024

UC Berkeley students Daniella Lake and Gia White created a self-guided Black History Tour to illuminate the university's significant Black history. The tour includes landmarks like the MLK Student Union and Memorial Stadium, highlighting trailblazers and moments of resilience. It aims to foster a sense of belonging and understanding on campus.

ABC7 News Sunday, March 3, 2024

San Francisco Unified School District plans potential school closures within two years due to a loss of 10,000 students since 2015. Superintendent Matt Wayne's proposal aims to address budget shortfalls and a faulty payroll system. Specific schools aren't named yet. The plan could shutter undisclosed schools by fall 2025.

Health

ABC7 News Saturday, January 13, 2024

A San Francisco sheriff's deputy is praised for administering Narcan, saving lives amid the fentanyl crisis. Exclusive footage shows Deputy Barry Bloom's heroic actions. Reporter Tara Campbell interviews him to understand his motivation and impact, shedding light on his crucial role in combating overdoses on the streets.

ABC7 News Thursday, January 18, 2024

San Francisco Mayor London Breed advocated for Proposition F to combat the city's fentanyl crisis, hosting discussions with community leaders and advocates. Prop F mandates addiction treatment for continued cash assistance. While Breed asserts it will facilitate access to treatment, opponents argue coercion doesn't work. Its fate hinges on public support.

ABC7 News Tuesday, January 30, 2024

San Mateo County becomes the first in the U.S. to declare loneliness a public health emergency, citing a 45% increase in loneliness since the pandemic. Supervisor David Canepa leads the effort, urging further action and proposing a state-level Minister of Loneliness position to address mental health challenges and provide resources.

ABC7 News Wednesday, January 31, 2024

UCSF doctors Ari Johnson and Jessica Beckerman spearheaded Muso, a nonprofit providing healthcare in Mali despite conflict. With Mali's government, they offered free, accessible care, significantly reducing child mortality rates amidst escalating conflict. Their success highlights the effectiveness of community-based healthcare, challenging fatalism in conflict zones.

ABC7 News Saturday, Thursday, February 1, 2024

A report from Contra Costa County Health Services reveals Martinez Refining Company employees were unaware of chemical releases during the 2022 Thanksgiving incident. Issues stemmed from a failed air system component, exacerbated by long shifts and inadequate training. Concerns over employee fatigue and refinery management's responsibility prompt calls for transparency and accountability.

ABC7 News Friday, February 16, 2024

More than 25 students fell ill at Napa's Vintage High School, with five hospitalized. The cause remains unknown despite tests ruling out gas or carbon monoxide. Concerned students are wary of returning. School officials assure safety, conducting further tests, and offering support. Investigations continue to determine the cause of the illness outbreak.

ABC7 News Tuesday, February 20, 2024

San Francisco's Health Department brings medical care to homeless encampments weekly, treating severe conditions like mental illness and addiction. Patients like Julianna Amos rely on these visits, preferring them over crowded shelters or SROs. Outreach teams work tirelessly, with success stories like Joseph Peterson, now housed and giving back at a specialized clinic.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 21, 2024

Lightfully Behavioral Health is opening a 6-bed residential treatment program in Redwood City to aid teens with mental health issues. With a warm, home-like setting, it offers clinical oversight, therapy sessions, and a focus on early treatment to alleviate relapse. The program caters to adolescents aged 12-17 for 30-45 days.

ABC7 News Thursday, February 22, 2024

A proposed California bill aims to provide health insurance coverage for wigs, inspired by Mountain View High School student Miranda Huang, who advocates for those affected by alopecia areata. Supriya Surrender, diagnosed with the condition, supports the bill, emphasizing the emotional impact of hair loss. Dermatologists affirm the medical necessity.

ABC7 News Wednesday, February 28

11-year-old Jesus Roman Ramirez, recovering from Guillain-Barre Syndrome at UCSF Benioff's Children's Hospital, finds solace in the music therapy program with Arnie, a facility dog. Arnie, alongside his trainer Erica, aids patients in physical and emotional recovery. Supported by donations, the program aims to expand, offering healing to more children like Jesus.

Climate & Environment

ABC7 News Saturday, January 13, 2024

King tides return to the Bay Area, offering insight into future sea level rise impacts. Experts study these unusually high tides, which can be 1-2 feet above average, to understand flooding risks and infrastructure vulnerabilities caused by climate change. Public photo submissions aid in modeling flood scenarios and planning mitigation strategies.

ABC7 News Saturday, January 27, 2024

The U.S. Army Corps of Engineers proposes a \$13 billion project to elevate the Embarcadero and install flood barriers, aiming to protect San Francisco from rising sea levels and seismic risks. Supported by Speaker Emerita Nancy Pelosi and Mayor London Breed, it awaits congressional approval and public input.

ABC7 News Monday, January 29, 2024

Navier, led by CEO Sampri Bhattacharyya, introduces America's first all-electric hydrofoil boat, the N30. It offers eco-friendly, efficient water transportation, soaring above waves silently. A pilot program launches in the Bay Area, partnering with Stripe, aiming to alleviate congestion and emissions while revolutionizing maritime travel and stimulating economic growth.

ABC7 News Monday, February 5, 2024

Sea otters, deemed environmental heroes, play a vital role in restoring Elkhorn Slough near Moss Landing. By preying on destructive species like striped shore crabs, they mitigate erosion and maintain ecosystem balance. Researchers observe their impact on marine life and consider their reintroduction to aid kelp forest conservation efforts elsewhere.

ABC7 News Thursday, February 22, 2024

Stanford researchers track loggerhead sea turtles equipped with satellite devices, finding evidence of a climate-driven pathway to California coast. Turtles follow warm water bands, but some break away, possibly through a Thermal Corridor, indicating an El Nino effect. Research aims to understand how climate change impacts migration patterns of marine life.

ABC7 News Thursday, February 29, 2024

Valley Water in San Jose constructs flood walls along Coyote Creek, spanning 9 miles to shield residents from potential floods like the devastating 2017 incident. With reinforced steel below and walls up to 10 feet tall, the project aims to mitigate flood risks for communities along the creek.

ABC7 News Monday, March 4, 2024

Researchers at Stanford deliberately burned debris in Portola Valley to manage wildfire risk. With the rainy season ending, they aim to reduce fuel and mitigate fire risk by 60%. The controlled burns also serve as educational tools for studying fire impacts and furthering research, education, and conservation efforts in California.

ABC7 News Thursday, March 7, 2024

Rising sea levels threaten coastal cities like San Francisco, sinking due to subsidence. A triple threat of sea level rise, rising groundwater, and extreme storms exacerbates flooding risks. Adaptation efforts, including levee improvements and elevating structures, are underway, with an estimated \$110 billion needed for infrastructure upgrades to prevent \$230 billion in damages.

ABC7 News Thursday, March 7, 2024

Oakland city workers inspect trash bins to ensure proper sorting, following SB 1383 guidelines to combat climate change. They scan bins, noting correct sorting and leaving feedback for businesses. Correct sorting reduces methane emissions from landfills. Residents urged to read labels for correct disposal, emphasizing the impact on the environment.

ABC7 News Thursday, March 14, 2024

Study reveals 7,000 humpback whales may have starved to death in the Northern Pacific due to a deadly marine heat wave, impacting 20% of the population over roughly a decade. Warming ocean temperatures disrupt the food chain, pushing whales closer to shore and increasing risks of ship strikes and entanglements.

ABC7 News Saturday, January 6, 2024

Governor Gavin Newsom announces a high-tech research park in Los Angeles, a collaboration with UCLA, repurposing a former mall. Meanwhile, San Francisco sees Adidas closing its store amid rising mall vacancies and record office vacancies. Leaders contemplate repurposing downtown, potentially for innovation centers, housing, and universities, despite challenges like homelessness and crime.

ABC7 News Thursday, January 18, 2024

California Attorney General Rob Bonta announces charges against three suspects in an organized retail theft ring responsible for numerous robberies in the Bay Area. The suspects face nearly 50 felony and 10 misdemeanor counts, including organized retail theft, burglary, and vandalism, resulting in over \$650,000 in losses to businesses.

In-N-Out Burger near Oakland Airport closes due to rising crime, citing car break-ins, property damage, theft, and armed robberies affecting customers and staff. Despite added police patrols and crime reduction efforts, significant increases in burglaries and robberies prompt closure, impacting Oakland's economy and airport visitors' experiences.

Following community complaints, Safeway in San Francisco's Fillmore District will stay open until January 2025, Mayor London Breed announces. The decision allows time for exploring future options like housing and a new grocery store. Though welcomed by residents, concerns remain about long-term solutions post-closure.

ABC7 News Tuesday, February 6, 2024

San Francisco extends Mission Street street vendor ban for six more months after initial 90-day effort to curb illegal operations. Vendors express dismay, relying on sidewalk sales for livelihood. Despite positive impacts on safety, concerns arise over housing insecurity and fairness for permitted vendors. City plans continued enforcement and potential night inspections.

Uber drivers in San Francisco protested for fair pay and transparency, part of a national day of action. Over 100 drivers gathered, expressing frustration over low earnings, abrupt terminations, and lack of fare transparency. Uber defended itself, stating drivers misunderstand profit calculations. The protest aimed to draw attention to driver grievances and demand dialogue with Uber's CEO.

San Francisco extends "First Year Free" program, waiving \$2.5M in fees for new and struggling businesses. Andrea Becerra, owner of El Mil Amores restaurant, benefited, crediting the city's support. Mayor London Breed announces program extension, emphasizing its positive impact on community and economy. Despite aid, some businesses like The Scarlet Sage Herb Co. still struggle due to decreased foot traffic and crime.

SF officials and business owners clash over the Powell St. Promenade Refresh plan. While some see it as vital for Union Square's revitalization, others argue it ignores more pressing issues like vandalism and street behavior. Disagreements highlight the struggle to balance improvement efforts with addressing citywide challenges affecting tourism and perception.

Despite concerns over businesses leaving downtown San Francisco, two restaurants are expanding in the area. China Live will now serve lunch due to high demand, while Boichik Bagels plans to open three new locations, expressing optimism about the city's future despite struggles in the Financial District post-pandemic.

San Francisco will receive \$12 million from a government funding package, announced by Nancy Pelosi. The money will aid various community programs including affordable housing, overdose prevention, facilities modernization, and urban agriculture. Pelosi stated the funding will support crucial projects addressing hunger, homelessness, healthcare, and veterans' services, benefiting San Franciscans.

A fair housing report by Fair Housing Advocates of Northern California reveals discrimination against Latino renters and families with children in Marin, Solano, and Sonoma Counties.
