 This is a CBS network program giving fresh reports on classic *60 Minutes* programs and topical follow-ups. The program is one hour in length, with 8-10 minute segments each.

48 Hours Thursdays 10:00-11:00pm
 This is a CBS network program that delves into a single subject, examining it from multiple angles. Anchored by CBS News anchor Dan Rather, the program lasts one hour with 8-10 minute segments.

60 Minutes Sundays 7:00-8:00pm
 Premiering in 1968, this CBS network program is a mix of powerful investigative reports, interviews, features, and profiles of people making news today. An hour in length, each segment lasts about 8-10 minutes.

News Series Monday through Friday Within Local News
 Multi-part mini-documentary news series, usually dealing with a singular topic or a series of related topics, are generally aired during CBS 6 News at 5:00, CBS 6 News at 5:30, CBS 6 News at 6:00, and CBS 6 News at 11:00 and occasionally repeated in other newscasts. The duration of the reports usually last two to three minutes a segment.

Health Team 6 Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:00pm and 5:30pm and CBS 6 News This Morning

This news segment focuses on newest developments in health care and issues concerning the medical care. These wide ranging reports look at health issues affecting both men and women, and their children. From new advances in treatments, to alternative medicine, to proper use of drugs. Each segment is one minute to two minutes in length.

Buddy Check 6 The 6th of every month In each newscast on That date, 5am, 6am, Noon, 5pm, 6pm, & 11pm.

Buddy Check 6 is a proactive report urging women to do self-breast exams on the 6th of each month and to call their "Buddy" to remind them to do a self-examination also. The goal is to promote early detection of breast cancer, one of the leading killers of women nationwide.

Consumer Watch Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:30pm and CBS 6 News This Morning

This news segment is designed to test one product or similar products on the market against their competitors to show their quality and durability. Each segment is one minute 30 seconds in length and also tells viewers how they can stretch their dollars for the best product for the least amount of money, or products they should be concerned about such as recalls.

For Kids' Sake Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:00pm & Noon

This news feature focuses on issues and ideas concerning children and families. Each segment is 30 seconds to two minutes in length. The issues pursued here include peer pressure, drugs, parental involvement, child health issues, teen pregnancy, etc.

Battle of the Brains Saturday 30-minute program 9:30-10:00 am Every Saturday

This WTVR-produced high school quiz show entertains and educates adolescents and adults aged 12 and up by presenting students from two different public or private high schools in a quiz show format. The students, four from each of the two competing schools, challenge each other's academic acumen and learning recall in areas of math, science, history, geography, and the arts.

48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'Blood Feud' - Nancy Seaman, an award-winning teacher living in Farmington Hills, Michigan, an exclusive Detroit suburb, was accused of the 2004 hatchet/stabbing murder of her husband, Bob. She admits killing him, but says it was self-defense, claiming that he had been mentally and physically abusing her for years. The couple's two sons -- Greg and Jeff -- differ concerning their parent's marriage and the life they all shared. Greg sympathizes with his mother, claiming that his father was abusive and that his mother's life was in danger. Jeff, who testified for the prosecution, denies that his mother was a battered wife. Nancy Seaman was tried and found guilty of murder in the first degree and was sentenced to life in prison. She is appealing her conviction. Includes interviews with: Nancy Seaman; her sons Greg and Jeff; defense attorney Larry Kaluzny; Lisa Ortlieb, prosecutor in the case and director of Oakland County's Domestic Violence Unit; and Dr. Lenore Walker, an expert on abused women. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'Prescription For Murder'' - in Chester, S.C., 12-year-old Chris Pittman fatally shot his grandparents as they slept, stole money, weapons and his grandfather's truck and set fire to the house before fleeing. Having confessed to the crime, Chris was tried, convicted of murder and sentenced to 30 years in prison. Lawyers for the defense claim that the anti-depressant Zoloft, a drug prescribed for the boy shortly before the murders, turned him from a loving grandson into a killer. Includes interviews with: Chris Pittman, now sixteen; Pastor Chris Snelgrove, New Hope Methodist Church, Chester, S.C.; Joe Pittman, Chris' father; Delnora Duprey, Chris' maternal grandmother; his older sister Danielle; Andy Vickery, defense attorney; Barney Giese, prosecutor; and Dr. Lanette Atkins, a forensic psychiatrist. Pfizer, Zoloft's manufacturer, agreed with the jury's guilty verdict for Chris Pittman, denying that Zoloft caused the boy's problems. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'Terror At The Morgue' - Dr. O.C. Smith, a Memphis, Tennessee medical examiner was apparently attacked on June 1, 2002, as he was leaving work. He was found wrapped head-to-toe in barbed wire with a bomb strapped to his neck. Dr. Smith survived but expressed concern that his assailant might attack again. The police at first focused on Philip Workman, a man Dr. Smith's testimony helped keep on death row, but further investigation showed that Workman was not involved in the attack. Having become suspicious of Dr. Smith's account, federal investigators took their evidence to a grand jury which indicted Smith for lying to federal agents and illegal possession of a bomb. Having rejected a plea bargain which involved the admission of guilt, Smith was brought to trial. The judge in the case declared a mistrial when the jury failed to reach a verdict. Although there have no further attacks on Dr. Smith, he still fears for his life and is considering job offers outside the United States. 48 HOURS MYSTERY: 'The Man Who Knew Too Much' - American journalist Paul Klebnikov was shot nine times on July 9, 2004 in a contract killing as he left Forbes magazine's Moscow headquarters. Klebnikov, as editor-in-chief, was working to expose corruption in Russia's new economy, where the rich and powerful often operate outside the law. He made many potential enemies, including one notorious businessman about whom he wrote a book called 'Godfather Of The Kremlin.' In his most recent book, 'Conversation With a Barbarian,' he alleged that a Chechen leader had organized crime connections. Just before his death, Klebnikov was investigating Moscow's real estate business; the auto industry in Toliatti; as well as the murder of another journalist who had exposed fraud at Toliatti. Includes interviews with Klebnikov's sister Anna, his brothers, Peter and Michael, and his wife Helen Train. The Klebnikov family has set up a fund for Russian journalists to pursue Paul's dream of a free press in Russia. High-ranking U.S. government officials are pressuring the Kremlin to find out who was responsible for the journalists murder. 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'Abraham's Children: Reuniting An Old Family'- Abraham of the Old Testament was the founding patriarch of a new monotheistic faith, which included Jews and later Christians and Muslims. One of his sons is historically tied to the founding of Judaism, the other to the founding of Islam. The broadcast visits The Children of Abraham Project, which is an effort by individuals and interfaith organizations in the Detroit area to educate Jews, Christians and Muslims as to their common ancestry, and encourage them to work together for tolerance, peace and civic betterment. The process involves watching a play in which teenage actors, some who helped write the play, act out scenes from the Biblical story.
