Perry March, has gathered a team of lawyers to begin fighting the charges of second-degree murder and tampering with evidence. If acquitted, he plans to fight to regain custody of his children. Having served 25 years in prison for the murders, MacDonald, now 61, still proclaims his innocence and expresses hope that he will eventually be legally vindicated. From the day following the murders 35 years ago, MacDonald has maintained that a group of crazed, drug-fueled hippies broke into his apartment and murdered his wife Collette and daughters -- five-year-old Kimberly and two-year-old Kristen. It took the U.S. Government nine years to make its case against him, but in 1979, a jury convicted MacDonald of three counts of first-degree murder -- a conviction based entirely on circumstantial evidence. Since then, MacDonald and his lawyers have exhausted every avenue of appeal. Married behind bars over two years ago, MacDonald's request for parole was denied. He is hoping that DNA testing being done on hair and blood evidence from the crime scene will confirm that he did not kill his family. Despite the lack of physical evidence, Moore was tried, convicted and sentenced to death row. Eight months following the conviction, Moore's defense attorneys discovered that prosecutors had withheld potentially conclusive information in the case including an FBI report suggesting that Karen was having multiple affairs, and may have known her killer. In a stunning reversal in February 2005, the same judge who sentenced Moore to death released him from prison. Copple, his wife Lily and other family members came to the police station where he was interviewed and made admissions that linked him to the crime. One year later, police can claim that the crime has been solved but the motivation behind the attacks is not yet known. Eric Copple is expected to stand trial next year and could face the death penalty. His wife Lily visits him in prison as he waits trial. Despite concerns over the possible contamination of DNA evidence and the absence of fingerprints, Gary Leiterman, was tried, convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to life in prison. In April 1995, Jim came home from work and found Vickie had been shot to death. For three years there were virtually no leads in the case and no arrests, but in 1998 Gary Henson, a career criminal, told police that his half-brother, Will Phelps shot Vickie by accident while he and an unidentified accomplice were in the process of burglarizing the Barton home. Four months later, Phelps committed suicide. In 2003, a county-wide cold case team was formed to take a second look at Vickie's murder. The squad discovered a portion of audiotape from Jim's 911 call which revealed a discrepancy in his testimony. Subsequently, Gary Henson told police that Jim Barton was responsible for his wife's death because he had sent Phelps to the house to scare Vicki in hopes of driving her to live in town where Jim supposedly needed to live to become police chief. A jury found Jim Barton guilty of involuntary manslaughter and he will serve at least 15 years in prison. He plans to appeal the verdict.
