**60 Minutes II**                      Tuesdays                      9:00-10:00pm  
This is a CBS network program giving fresh reports on classic *60 Minutes* programs and topical follow-ups. The program is one hour in length, with 8-10 minute segments each.

**48 Hours**                              Thursdays                      10:00-11:00pm  
This is a CBS network program that delves into a single subject, examining it from multiple angles. Anchored by CBS News anchor Dan Rather, the program lasts one hour with 8-10 minute segments.

**60 Minutes**                              Sundays                              7:00-8:00pm  
Premiering in 1968, this CBS network program is a mix of powerful investigative reports, interviews, features, and profiles of people making news today. An hour in length, each segment lasts about 8-10 minutes.

**News Series**                              Monday through Friday                      Within Local News  
Multi-part mini-documentary news series, usually dealing with a singular topic or a series of related topics, are generally aired during CBS 6 News at 5:00, CBS 6 News at 5:30, CBS 6 News at 6:00, and CBS 6 News at 11:00 and occasionally repeated in other newscasts. The duration of the reports usually last two to three minutes a segment.

**Health Team 6** Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:00pm and 5:30pm and CBS 6 News This Morning

This news segment focuses on newest developments in health care and issues concerning the medical care. These wide ranging reports look at health issues affecting both men and women, and their children. From new advances in treatments, to alternative medicine, to proper use of drugs. Each segment is one minute to two minutes in length.

**Buddy Check 6** The 6<sup>th</sup> of every month In each newscast on That date, 5am, 6am, Noon, 5pm, 6pm, & 11pm.

Buddy Check 6 is a proactive report urging women to do self-breast exams on the 6<sup>th</sup> of each month and to call their "Buddy" to remind them to do a self-examination also. The goal is to promote early detection of breast cancer, one of the leading killers of women nationwide.

**Consumer Watch** Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:30pm and CBS 6 News This Morning

This news segment is designed to test one product or similar products on the market against their competitors to show their quality and durability. Each segment is one minute 30 seconds in length and also tells viewers how they can stretch their dollars for the best product for the least amount of money, or products they should be concerned about such as recalls.

**For Kids' Sake** Monday through Friday Within CBS 6 News at 5:00pm & Noon

This news feature focuses on issues and ideas concerning children and families. Each segment is 30 seconds to two minutes in length. The issues pursued here include peer pressure, drugs, parental involvement, child health issues, teen pregnancy, etc.

**Battle of the Brains** Saturday 30-minute program 9:30-10:00 am Every Saturday

This WTVR-produced high school quiz show entertains and educates adolescents and adults aged 12 and up by presenting students from two different public or private high schools in a quiz show format. The students, four from each of the two competing schools, challenge each other's academic acumen and learning recall in areas of math, science, history, geography, and the arts.

**CBS Up To The Minute** Monday through Friday 3:00-5:00am  
**CBS This Morning** Monday through Friday 8:00-9:00am

Two network programs that are a combination of news, weather, and interviews. The programs also offer features on current events.

**CBS Evening News**Monday through Saturday  
Sunday6:30-7:00pm  
6:00-6:30pm

This network gives a wrap-up of the day's news events in the country and around the world, including "Eye on America" a feature on an issue on public concern.

Police searched for Cruz for ten months until evidence finally pointed to Dean Faiello, a childhood friend of the missing woman. Faiello, an openly gay college drop-out who posed as a doctor, is thought to have treated Cruz for a mouth infection the day she vanished. In February 2004, acting on a tip from Faiello's former lover, Greg Bach, authorities found Cruz's body stuffed in a suitcase and buried in the cement in the garage of Faiello's former home in Newark, N.J. Eleven months after Maria Cruz was reported missing, Faiello, already facing charges for practicing medicine without a license, was apprehended in Costa Rica and arrested for murder. Includes an interview with Faiello who was diagnosed as HIV-positive and who remains, without any medical treatment, in a Costa Rican prison awaiting extradition proceedings. (10:00-11:00pm)** - On the morning of July 6, 1993, Mia Zapata's body was found raped and strangled to death on a deserted Seattle street. A lead singer in a popular local band called "The Gits," Zapata was about to start a national tour and was on the verge of signing a record contract. Police conducted an exhaustive investigation, but ultimately came up with few leads and little evidence. A decade later, Seattle's cold case squad, made up of detectives Richard Gagnon and Greg Mixsell, reopened the Zapata murder investigation and with new forensic technology were able to pinpoint the murderer, Jesus Mezquia, through DNA evidence found on Zapata's body. - 07/22/05      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Rescued From The Shadows" (09:00-10:00P)** - 48 HOURS infiltrated the billion dollar business of trafficking in human sex slaves to reveal how easy it is in the 21st Century to purchase a woman and bring her to the United States. Correspondent Peter Van Sant's investigation includes a report on Bucharest, Romania, one of several former Soviet bloc nations that have become hotspots for modern-day slave traders. Many of the girls are lured overseas with the promise of a good job, others are simply abducted. Working with Iana Matei, the director of Reaching Out Romania, Van Sant rescued "Nicoleta," a 17-year-old girl. Also explored are the cases of "Olga," a young woman trapped in a sex slave trafficking ring run by a Russian named Alexander Rashovsky; and a young girl kidnapped by members of the Carreto family of Tlaxcala, Mexico. 07/23/05      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Right Or Wrong" (10:00-11:00P)**- Susan Wright, a 27-year-old stay-at-home mother from Houston, Texas stabbed her husband, Jeff, 193 times. She claims she was a victim of domestic abuse and that on Jan. 13, 2003, her husband attacked her with a knife and she fought back in self-defense. Prosecutors charged that she was a cold blooded killer who lured her husband to bed with the promise of sex, tied him up and then brutally murdered him. They questioned why it took Susan five days to report the crime; why she buried Jeff's body in the backyard; and why she tried to clean up evidence of the death. A jury found Susan Wright guilty of murder and sentenced her to 25 years in prison. Includes interviews with: Susan's sister, Cindy Stewart; the victim's father, Ron Wright and his brother, Ron Wright Jr.; prosecutor Kelly Seigler; and attorneys for the defense Neal Davis and Richard "Racehorse" Haynes. 07/30/05      **48 HOURS MYSTERY: "Secrets Of The Well"**- reports on two separate unsolved murders with strange similarities, both solved by Georgia criminal investigator Clay Bryant:  
1) a report on the murder case of Gwendolyn Moore, a 30-year-old mother whose body was pulled from a well in August 1970. Gwendolyn's husband, Marshall, immediately came under suspicion. Moore, who passed a lie detector test, was not thoroughly investigated at the time because of connections to the local police department. After 30 years Bryant found enough evidence to charge Marshall Moore with the murder of his wife. He will go on trial on March 28, 2005.  
2) In 1987, Fred Wilkerson, a small town fire chief and 49-year-old father, seemingly vanished. Bryant determined that the prime suspect was Wilkerson's ex-lover, Connie Quedans. At the time of the disappearance the estranged couple was involved in a property dispute. Bryant unearthed evidence and Wilkerson's body was found in Quedan's well.
